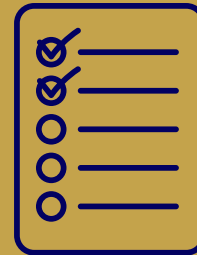

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS MONTH

The Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) has developed this toolkit to help you share important messaging about Emergency Preparedness Month 2025 with your community. The toolkit includes key messages, which can be tailored to write local press releases or talking points, as well as sample social media posts and graphics that can be used or adapted for your community.

PREPAREDNESS FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH ACCESS AND FUNCTIONAL NEEDS

- **Language Access:** MEMA has both physical and digital copies of general disaster preparedness flyers translated in seven languages, which are available here: [Mass.gov/ready](https://www.mass.gov/ready)
- **Access & Functional Needs:** Be sure to include alternative text for your graphics on social media, and consider that not everyone in your community uses social media. Reaching individuals with access and functional needs is especially important since this population may need to take extra steps to ensure they are prepared for emergencies. Consider reaching out to or posting emergency preparedness messaging within the following: places of worship, senior/community centers, housing authorities, public transportation (i.e. bus shelters).

KEY MESSAGING

Top 3 Preparedness Messages

Stay Informed: Every family should have multiple methods for receiving emergency alerts. Learn more about different types of alerting and information tools including the Emergency Alert System, Wireless Emergency Alerts, NOAA Weather Radio, Social Media & Traditional Media, Mass 211, Local Notification Systems

Create a Family Emergency Plan: Create and review your [family emergency plan](#).

- A family emergency plan includes establishing meeting points, developing an emergency contact plan, learning how to receive emergency alerts, and planning how to evacuate or shelter in place.
- **Consider practicing your own plan, as well as learning about other plans that may be relevant to you (such as at your workplace or children's school).**

Create an Emergency Kit: Build an [emergency kit](#) for disasters that contains items that will sustain you & your family's specific needs if you are not able to leave your home.

Get Involved in your Community's Emergency Preparedness: There are many great opportunities to make important contributions, including volunteering, donating, helping your neighbors, and being an active bystander.

Emergency Preparedness for Individuals with Disabilities and Access and Functional Needs: If you or someone close to you has a disability or other access or functional need, you may need to take additional steps to prepare yourself and your family. Create a Family Emergency Plan and Kit that address the specific health and safety needs for you and your family. Your Family Emergency Plan, should account for any specific medical support, transportation, and/or communication needs for you and your family. In your emergency kit, consider adding those specific items that both you and your family members will need in order to maintain health, safety and independence.

Emergency Preparedness for Pets and Animals: Pets are important members of many households, and like people, they are affected by disasters. If you have pets, you should add animal supplies to your emergency kit and consider their needs in your **Family Emergency Plan**.

Safety Tips for Evacuations: Know what to bring with you when you evacuate, how you will communicate with family and friends, where you will go, and how you will receive critical information from public safety officials. Public safety officials will communicate the need to evacuate through various means, including the media, social media, and alerting systems.

Safety Tips for Sheltering in Place: It may be safer to stay where you are. In these cases, public safety officials will provide guidance on the necessary protective actions you should take. This could be as simple as remaining at home while officials clear a hazard nearby, or it could require more protective measures in emergencies involving contaminated air. Gather necessary supplies in case you lose power and water for several days.

Prepare Your Home for Emergencies: Preparing and strengthening your home can not only protect your property during disasters — it can also add value to your home.

- **Prepare for possible power outages**
- **Find out whether your property is in a flood-prone or high-risk area by reviewing the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) flood maps**

Know Your Zone: Learn if you live in a hurricane evacuation zone

Protect your property with insurance. Check your policies to see that you have adequate coverage. Flood losses are not typically covered under renter and homeowner's insurance, so consider purchasing flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Plan (NFIP). Document the inventory of your home and keep this document, as well as insurance documentation, in a safe place.

Prepare Your Business for Emergencies: Planning for emergencies today will help support your employees, customers, and even your community. It will also protect your investment and give your company a better chance for survival.

- Prepare and build the resiliency of your business by creating a planning team to identify hazards that could impact your business.
- Create a communication plan.
- Keep your employees safe.
- Coordinate plans with the local emergency management director for your city. Specify the conditions under which the plan will be implemented

Know Your Hazards: Residents can be impacted by a range of severe weather, natural hazards, and man-made threats. Learn about the types of emergencies likely to impact Massachusetts and your area and how to prepare for them.

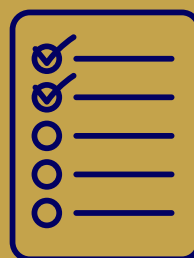

Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEAs) on cell phones save lives! Check your phone's settings to ensure that emergency alerts are enabled to be able to receive important alerts to stay safe. www.ready.gov/alerts #ReadyMA

Check flashlights, batteries, and conditions & expiration dates of your emergency supplies. Restock or replace any items as necessary. Re-think your emergency kit needs every year & update as your needs change. <http://bit.ly/MEMAEmergencyKit> #ReadyMA

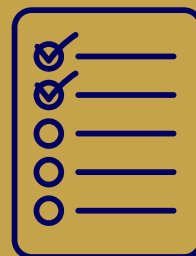
