IPPC Inc., IPPC of New York LLC, and Innovative Pharmacy LLC (collectively “IPPC”) writes to inform you of an incident that may involve some of your information. IPPC is a long term care pharmacy that provides services to long term care settings and communities. This letter provides an overview of what happened, our response, and the resources available to you, should you feel it is necessary and appropriate to take additional action.

What Happened? IPPC became aware of suspicious activity involving our technical network. We promptly took systems offline and began an investigation. The investigation determined that the network had been accessed by an unknown actor between September 18, 2025, and September 19, 2025, and during this time files were copied and potentially viewed. As a result, IPPC conducted a detailed review of the files to determine the type of information present and to whom it relates. This process was completed on or around February 9, 2026.

What Information Was Involved? The review of the files identified information including [REDACTED]. IPPC is not aware of any identity theft or fraud relating to this information as a result of this incident.

What We Are Doing. We take this incident and the security of information in our care very seriously. We moved quickly to respond and investigate the suspicious activity, assess and further secure our network, and notify potentially impacted entities and individuals. As part of our ongoing commitment to information security, we are currently reviewing our policies and procedures and enhancing our security measures as appropriate to further protect the security of information in our possession. We also notified federal law enforcement and will be notifying relevant regulators.

As an added precaution, we are also offering 24 months of monitoring services at no charge through Cyberscout, a TransUnion company. Individuals who wish to receive these services must enroll by following the below enrollment instructions, as we are unable to enroll you.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements, explanation of benefits statements, and monitoring free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Suspicious activity should be promptly reported to relevant parties including an insurance company, healthcare provider, and/or financial institution. STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO PROTECT PERSONAL INFORMATION

Enroll in Monitoring Services

To enroll in Credit Monitoring services at no charge, please log on to <https://bfs.cyberscout.com/activate> and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services: [REDACTED]. In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.



Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. Please note that in order to file a report with law enforcement for identity theft, consumers will likely need to provide some proof that they have been a victim.
