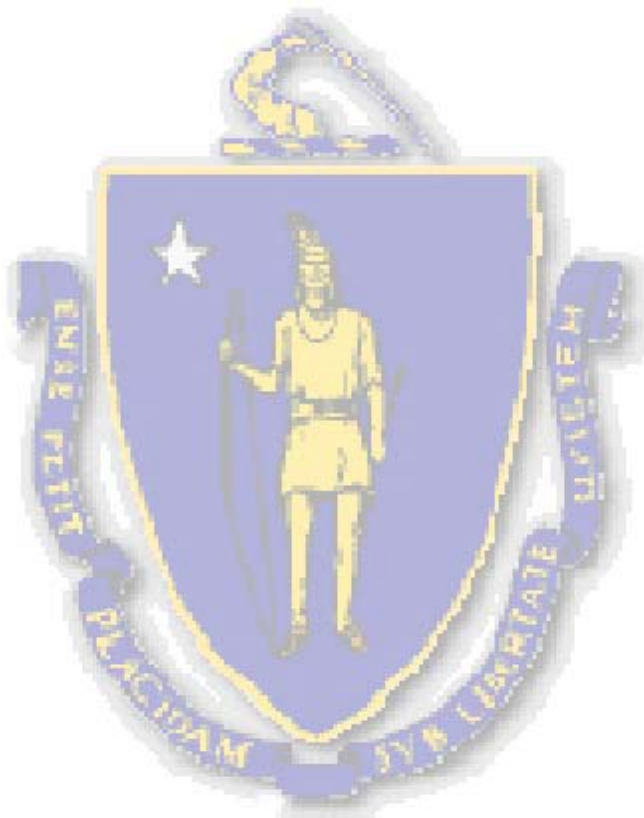

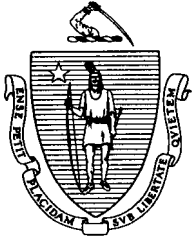

Important Definition

January 1st, 1999 - 2006 reports.

DOC jurisdiction population:

The population covered in this report is the Massachusetts Department of Correction (DOC) criminally sentenced population on January 1, 2006 incarcerated in DOC facilities *as well as* DOC inmates serving time in correctional facilities outside of the DOC (Massachusetts Houses of Correction, other states' correctional facilities and the Federal Bureau of Prisons).

Old Definition: January 1st, 1998 and prior reports.

DOC custody population:

The former definition includes criminally sentenced inmates in DOC facilities *only*, and does not include criminally sentenced DOC inmates serving time outside of the DOC in Massachusetts Houses of Correction, other states' correctional facilities and the Federal Bureau of Prisons.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Descriptive Overview of the January 1, 2006 JURISDICTION Population (Criminally Sentenced Only)

Number and Gender of Jurisdiction Population

- There were 9,405 criminally sentenced inmates in DOC population on January 1, 2006. This represented an increase of 5% from the January 1, 2005 population of 8,979.
- The breakdown by gender was 8,802, males and 603 females representing 94% and 6% of the total population, respectively.

Race, Ethnicity and Place of Birth

- The largest racial/ethnic group represented was White (67%), followed by Black (31%). This is the fifth year Hispanic ethnicity is shown in a separate table. Twenty-seven percent of the population reported Hispanic ethnicity.
- Ten percent of the January 1, 2006 population reported being born outside of the United States.

Age

- The mean age of the population on January 1, 2006 was 37.7 years, 37.9 years for males and 35.9 years for females, ranging from 17 to 89 years of age. The median age of the population was 36.0 years for both genders.
- The mean age at time of incarceration was 32.0 years for the jurisdiction population, 31.9 for males and 33.9 for females. The median age at incarceration was 30.0 years for the total population, 30.0 for males and 33.0 for females. Age at incarceration ranged from 15 years to 81 years.

Marital Status

- Excluding cases where information was not reported, 63% of the population reported a marital status of Single, 16% reported that they were Divorced and 14% reported their marital status as Married. Four percent reported being Separated and 2% as Widowed.

Language

- The majority of the population on January 1, 2006 reported English as their primary language (87%). However, 12% reported a primary language as Spanish. The proportion of those reporting English as their primary language was slightly higher for females (88%) than for males (87%).

Offense

- Sixty-three percent of the population was incarcerated for a violent offense, including 48% for a Person offense and 15% for a Sex offense. Another 23% were incarcerated for a Drug offense, 8% for a Property offense, and 5% for an "Other" offense.
- There were significant differences between males and females in the types of crimes for which they were incarcerated. Males were more than twice as likely to be incarcerated for a violent crime (66%) as compared to females (32%).
- Ninety-nine percent of the inmates incarcerated for sex offenses were male (N=1,419) versus female 1% (N=13).

- For incarcerated females, the largest number of offenses fell into the Drug offense category (31%), followed by Person Offense (30%), while the largest category for incarcerated males was Person offenses (49%).
- Seventy-four percent of drug offenders were serving a mandatory sentence. Seventy-six percent of those serving a mandatory drug sentence were male and 56% were female.
- Fifty-one percent of incarcerated females were serving a County sentence and 48% a State Prison sentence. In comparison, 98% of males were serving a State Prison sentence.

Sentence Length

- For males, the largest portion of minimum sentences fell into three categories: Life sentences (19%), sentences in the “3 to less than 4 year” range (15%) and “5 to less than 6 year” range (12%). For females, the largest portion fell into three categories: sentences “3 to less than 4 years” (23%), “5 to less than 6 years” (14%) and Life sentences (13%).
- There were significant differences between males and females regarding maximum sentence. For males, 29% had maximum sentences of “20 years or more”. Nineteen percent of those males are serving a Life sentence. Fifty-six percent of the female offenders, on the other hand, had maximum sentences less than 3 years.
- Nineteen percent of the jurisdiction population was serving a Life sentence: 851 for First-Degree Life and 842 for Second-Degree Life sentences. Ninety-eight percent (N=1,654) of those serving Life sentences were male: 50% for First-degree Life and 50% for Second-Degree Life. Only 2% (N=39) of females were serving a Life sentence: 19 for First-Degree Life and 20 for Second-Degree Life.
- On January 1, 2006 the majority (69%) of the jurisdiction population were incarcerated in medium security level facilities (previously designated as security levels 4 and 5). Fifteen percent were housed in a maximum security facility (level 6). Another 12% were housed in lower security level facilities (previously designated security levels 1 - 3). The remaining 4% of the minimum or pre-release population were housed in other jurisdictions’ facilities (212 inmates in Massachusetts county facilities and 121 inmates in other state or federal facilities).

Highlights and Trends in the January 1st CUSTODY (Criminally Sentenced) Population

Number and Gender of Inmates in Custody

- Ten year trends in DOC January 1st Custody population show a two-year period of growth (1997 to 1999), followed by a six-year period of decline in population (2000 to 2005). The DOC Custody population increased 5% from 2005 to 2006.
- The January 1, 2006 DOC Custody population of 9,072 inmates has shown an increase from the previous year's population of 8,620 inmates.
- The January 1, 2006 male DOC Custody population increased by 440 inmates, or 5%, from January 1, 2005. The female custody population increased by 12 inmates, or 2%.

Race and Ethnicity

- From 1997 to 2006, the proportion of Caucasians to the total DOC Custody population decreased from 48% in 1997 to 44% in 2006, and the percentage of African American inmates decreased from 29% in 1997 to 27% in 2006. Meanwhile, the proportion of Hispanic inmates increased from 22% to 27% during this same ten-year period.
- The number of Native American inmates increased from 31 in 1997 to 46 in 2006. The number of Asian inmates grew 20% during this period, from 90 to 108. However, as a proportion of the total DOC custody population, these populations changed little in the ten-year period. Native Americans grew from 0% to 1% of the total DOC Custody population from 1997 through 2006, while the Asian population remained at 1% of the total during this same period.

Age

- The median age of inmates in DOC Custody population has increased from 33 years in 1997 to 36 years in 2006. Mean age shows an increase from 34 years in 1997 to 38 years in 2006.
- Inmates 19 years and younger showed the greatest rate of decline (62%) during the ten-year period 1997 to 2006: 172 in 1997 to 65 in 2006. Inmates 20 to 29 years showed a 30% decline during the same period (3,540 to 2,468), with a corresponding 8% decline as a proportion of the total population. Inmates 30 to 39 years showed a 25% decline (3,774 to 2,813), with a 6% decline as a proportion of the population.
- The aging of the criminal population was pronounced during the ten-year period 1997 to 2006. Inmates age 40 to 64 years increased 39% (2,542 to 3,545), with a corresponding increase of 14% as a proportion of the population during this period, while inmates over 65 years increased 99%, from 91 in 1997 to 181 in 2006. As a proportion of the total DOC population, inmates over 65 have almost doubled, comprising 2% of the total DOC custody population on January 1, 2006.

Offense

- Over the past ten years, the percentage of the DOC Custody population representing each offense category has remained relatively stable. The percentage of inmates incarcerated for Person offenses fluctuated between 45% and 50% during this time span. Sex offenses represented 16% to 19% of the DOC Custody population, while Drug offenses made up between 21% and 23%.

- Sex Offenses reached a ten-year low in the 2006 DOC Custody Population. There were 1,411 inmates incarcerated for a Sex offense in 2006, representing 16% of the custody population. The ten-year high was in 1998 with 1,872 inmates, representing 18% of the custody population.
- Offenses in the “Other” offense category increased 27% from 386 in 1997 to a ten-year high of 490 in 2006. The ten-year low was in 2002 with 313 inmates, representing 3% of the custody population
- The percentage of inmates incarcerated for crimes of violence, defined as any offense which falls under person or sex categories, declined 11% over the ten-year period (6,493 to 5,763), but as a percentage of the total DOC Custody population, remained stable at (64% in 1997 and in 2006).

Sentence Length *

- The number of inmates serving sentences with “no minimum term” declined 63% during the ten-year period 1997 – 2006, from 1,230 to 455, which represented a decline from 12% in 1997 to 5% in 2006 as a proportion of the total. The number of inmates with minimum sentences of “less than 5 years” increased 25% from 1997 to 1999, declined 23% from 1999 to 2005, and increased 13% from 2005 to 2006.
- The proportion of inmates with maximum sentences of “less than 5 years” increased each year from 16% in 1997 to 25% in 2006, a 39% increase in the number serving less than 5 year sentences, during this ten-year period. Maximum sentences of “10 to less than 20 years” decreased 43% from 1997 to 2006, representing 30% of the total DOC Custody population in 1997 and 19% of the total in 2006.
- There has been a 25% increase in the number of inmates in the DOC Custody population serving Life sentences from 1997 to 2006, with a 43% increase in First-Degree Life sentences and an 11% increase in Second-Degree life sentences. The proportion of the total DOC Custody population serving a Life sentence has increased from 13% at the beginning of the ten-year period to 18% in 2006 (see Table 32).

*On January 12, 1994, the Governor signed into law an Act to Promote the Effective Management of the Criminal Justice System, St. 1993, c. 432, generally known as the “Truth in Sentencing” Law. Sentencing for offenses committed after June 30, 1994 are significantly affected by this law. For further discussion on some of the changes due to Truth in Sentencing refer to “Sentence/Sentence Type” earlier in Glossary

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Introduction

This publication marks the **eighth year reporting the jurisdiction population**. This definition includes the Massachusetts Department of Correction (DOC) criminally sentenced population on January 1, 2006 incarcerated in DOC facilities as well as DOC inmates serving time in correctional facilities outside of the DOC (Massachusetts Houses of Correction, other states' correctional facilities and the Federal Bureau of Prisons). This population is referred to as "DOC jurisdiction population" in this report. **Since the change in this definition in 1999, all trend tables and discussions are based on the prior definition, that is, criminally sentenced inmates in DOC facilities *only*, herein referred to as "DOC custody population".**

The information in this report is a "snapshot" composition of the inmate jurisdiction population on January 1, 2006. Throughout the rest of the body of this report, the phrase "in 2006" is substituted for "the DOC jurisdiction population on January 1, 2006".

The population described in this report is comprised of inmates incarcerated as a result of a *criminal* commitment. This includes **county, federal, and other states'** inmates transferred to a DOC facility who were in DOC *custody* on January 1, 2006 (N = 392). The breakdown of the total DOC criminally sentenced *custody* population (inmates *in* DOC facilities) is as follows:

Additionally, inmates criminally sentenced by the courts to the DOC, but serving time in federal, county, or other states' correctional facilities are **included** in this report. Individuals falling outside of the "custody" population, but within DOC "jurisdiction" on January 1, 2006 represented in this report are:

Excluded from this report are individuals in DOC facilities on January 1, 2006, who were *not* serving a *criminal* sentence (civil commitments and pre-trial/awaiting trial detainees). The civil commitment population was excluded because the reporting system is not as extensive as for criminal commitments. Consequently, most of the data for civil commitments would fall in the “not reported” categories of the tables.

Individuals that are pre-trial or awaiting trial are not sentenced. Also, limited information is available about this population. They are not sentenced, therefore their offense and sentencing information is not applicable.

This report is organized into two main sections. The first section presents tables and charts describing the January 1, 2006 DOC *jurisdiction* population. This section depicts inmate demographic characteristics, information about criminal offenses for the inmate population, and data regarding sentencing, such as court from which committed, type of sentence, and sentence lengths. A table that shows the placement of DOC inmates by facility and security level is also included. Trend tables comprise the second section of the report and are based solely on the DOC *custody* population. This allows for consistent comparison to previous years.

Tables and charts are presented in each section of the report. The trend tables have been expanded from previous years' reports to cover the 1997 to 2006 period, when possible. If data is unavailable for certain years, it is denoted by “NA” (not available) in the table.

Please note that due to rounding, some of the tables may not add to 100%.

The Glossary beginning on page 31 provides definitions of terms used in this report and addresses some methodological issues.

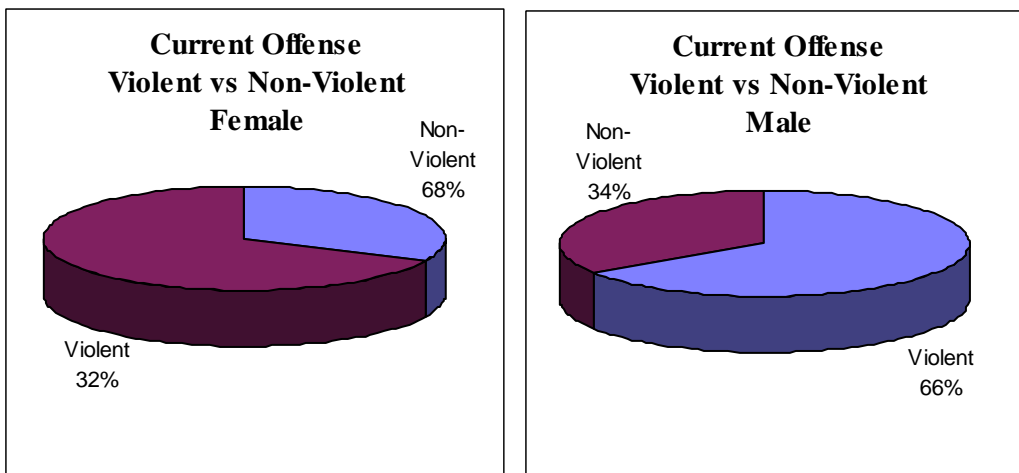

A violent offense is any offense that falls under the Person or Sex Offense categories, p. 35.

In 2006, fifteen percent of the population was incarcerated for a Sex offense. Males made up the majority with the most common offenses being Rape and Abuse of a Child (31%) and Rape of a Child with Force (21%). There were 13 females incarcerated for a sex offense, with the most common offenses being Rape of a Child with Force (n = 3) and Sex Offenses involving a Minor (n = 3).

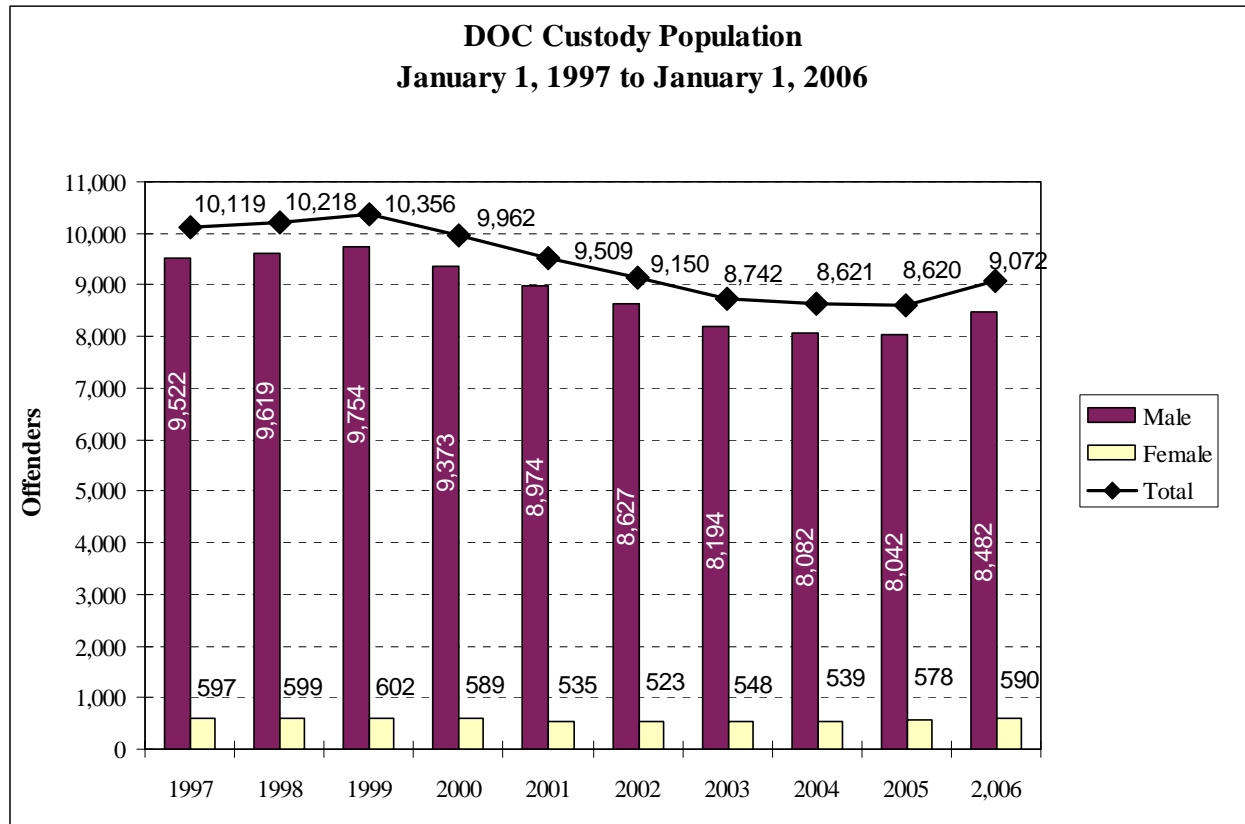

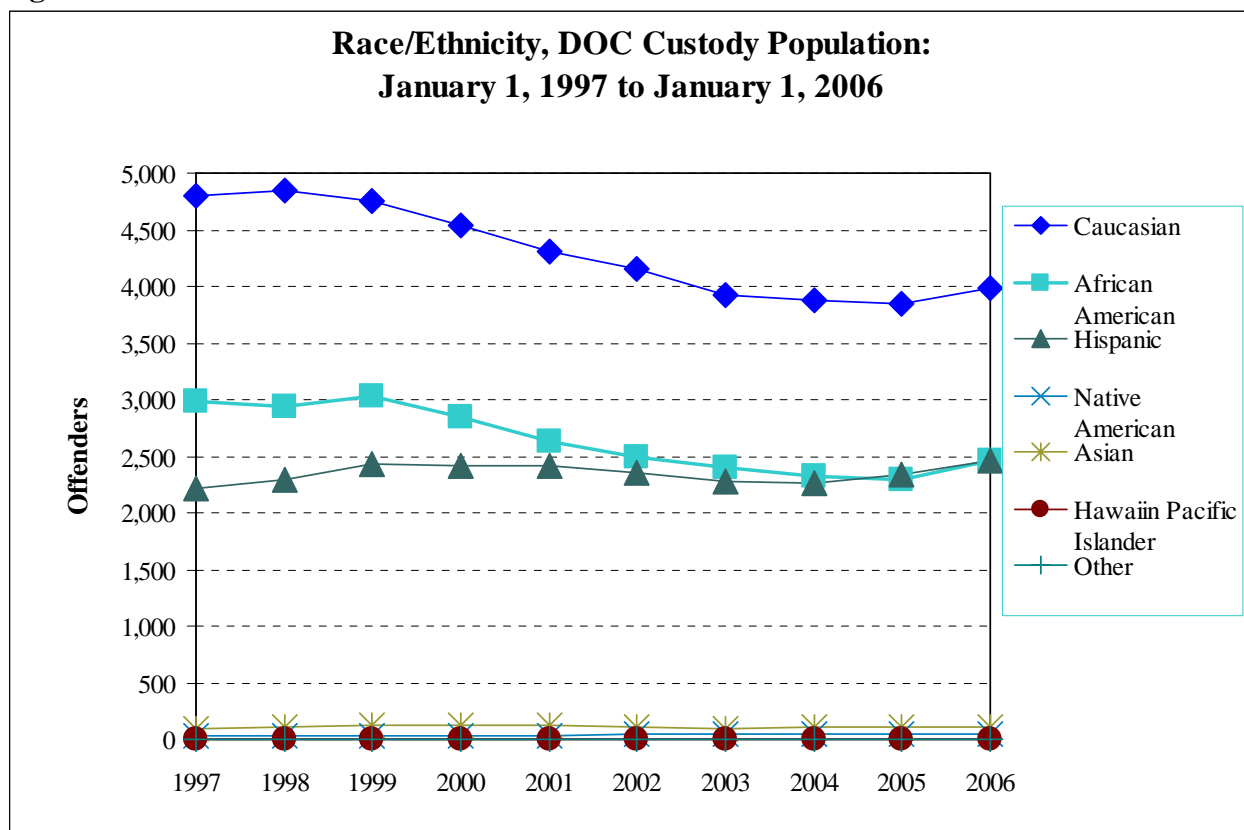

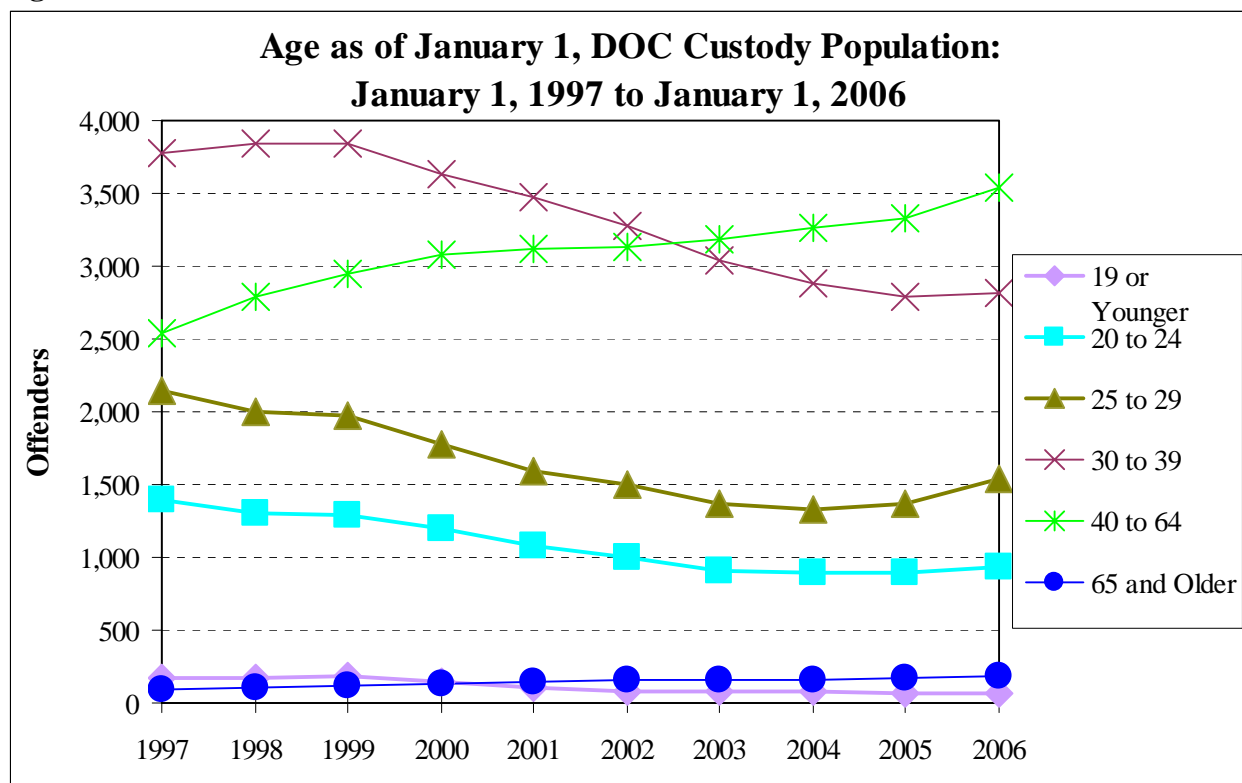


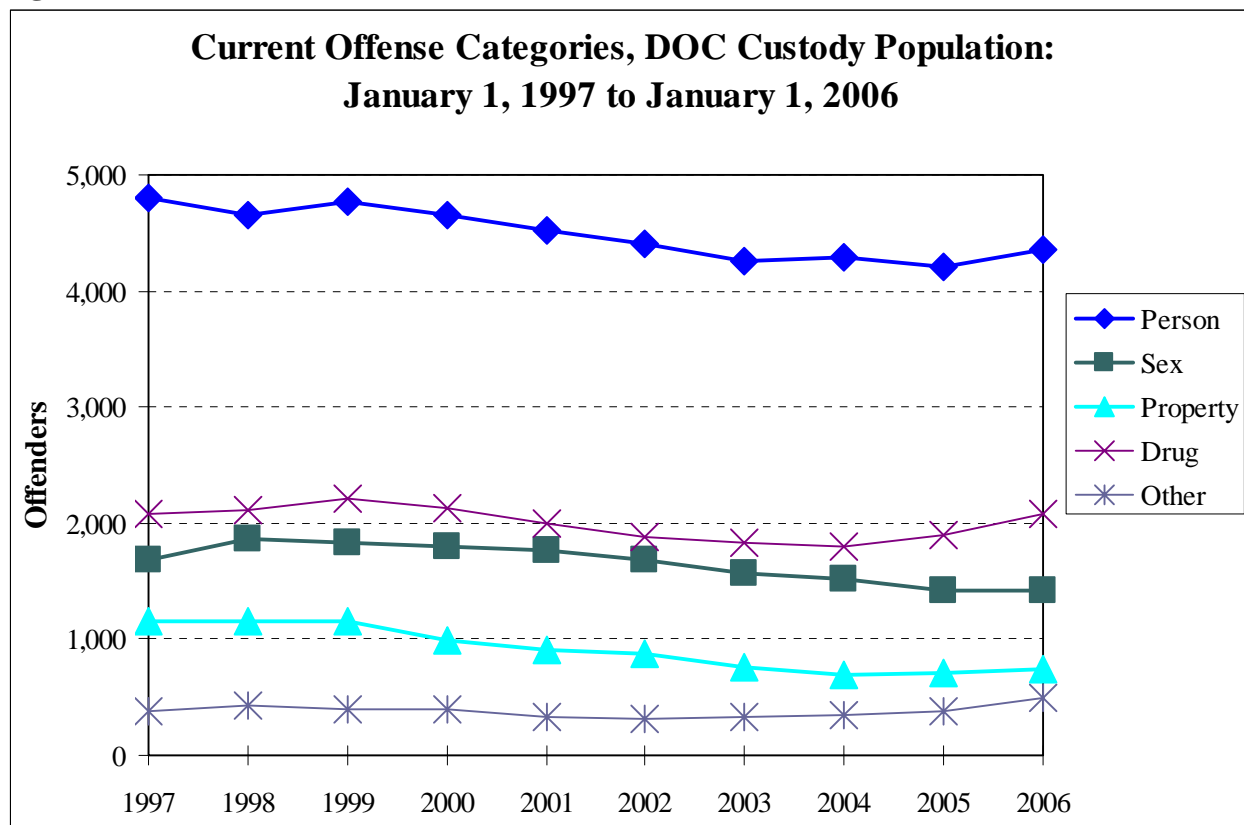

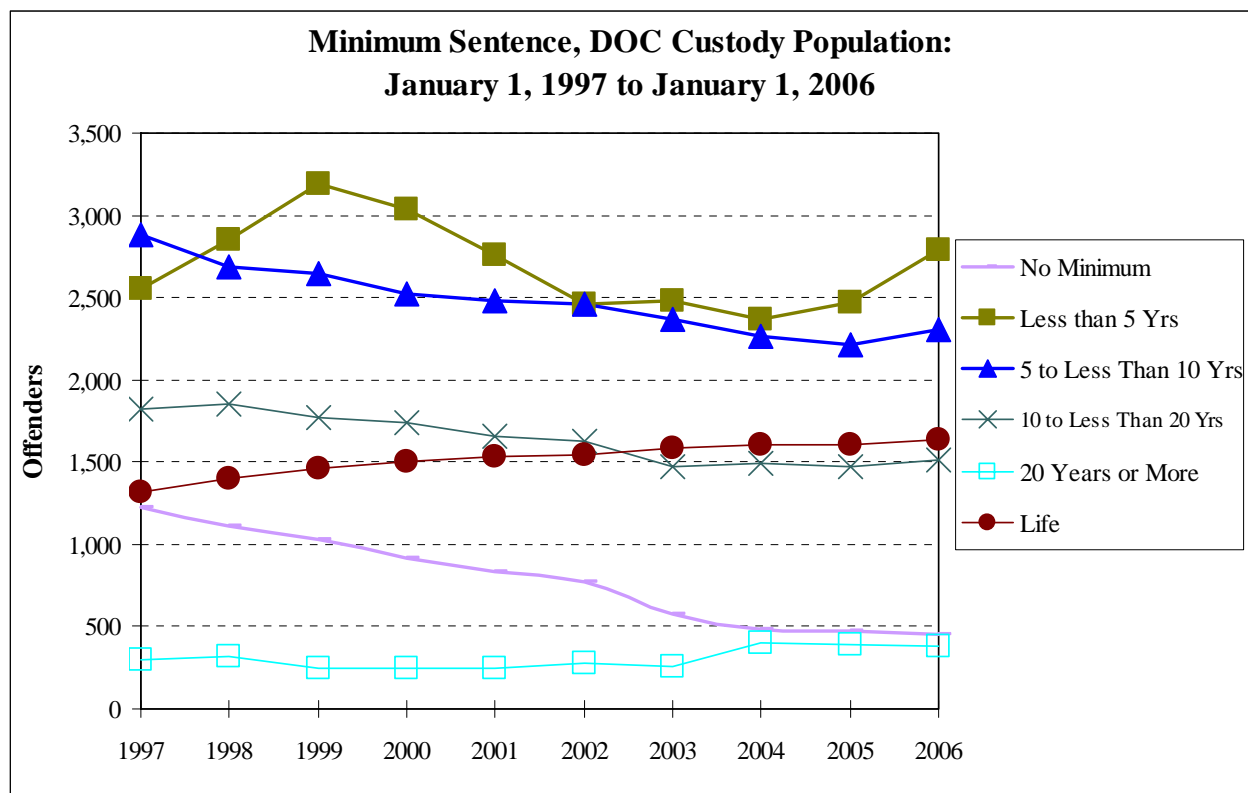

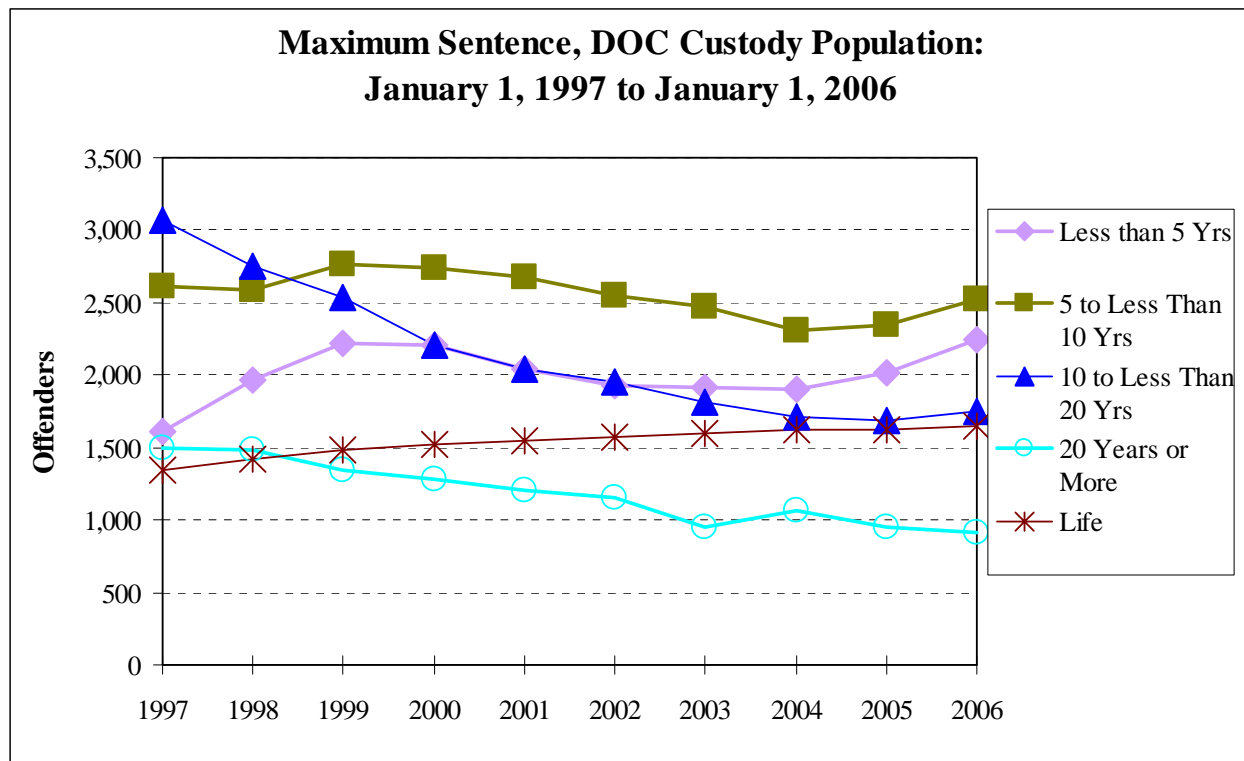

Sentence/Sentence Type

State Prison Sentence

Prior to the Massachusetts “Truth in Sentencing” law, if an offender is sentenced to the State Prison, except for life or as an habitual criminal, the court shall not fix the term of imprisonment, but shall fix a maximum and minimum term for which he/she may be imprisoned. The minimum term shall not be less than two and a half years. All sentences which have a finite maximum term are eligible to have the term reduced by statutory good time, except for most sex offenses, crimes committed while confined and certain “mandatory” sentences.

In the “new law”, all Massachusetts state sentences have a minimum and a maximum term, unless an inmate is sentenced for life or as a habitual criminal. The minimum term is used to determine parole eligibility, and the maximum term is used to determine discharge.

Under both the “old” and “new” sentencing systems, an inmate is discharged from his/her sentence at the expiration of his term, less any statutory or earned good time. Under the “new” system none of the reduction will be attributable to statutory good time.

Reformatory Sentence

Prior to the Massachusetts “Truth in Sentencing” law, males and females can be sentenced to a Reformatory sentence, an indefinite term, indicated by a maximum term.

For MCI- Concord, a male not previously sentenced for a felony more than three times, convicted of a crime punishable by

imprisonment in any correctional institution of the Commonwealth or by imprisonment in a jail or House of Correction may be sentenced for an indefinite term. Concord may confine misdemeanor offenders as well as those who commit felonies.

A female convicted of a crime punishable by imprisonment in a House of Correction may be sentenced to the Massachusetts Correctional Institution-Framingham. In addition to those women who commit felonies, MCI-Framingham may confine female misdemeanor offenders.

The “new” law eliminates “Concord” (or Framingham) sentences to the state reformatory.

House of Correction Sentence

Also known as a “County Sentence”. Prior to the “Truth in Sentencing” law, if an offender is sentenced to the House of Correction, the term shall be two and a half years or less. Parole eligibility and discharge are based on the maximum term of a sentence.

Under the “new” law, discharge on this sentence will change because of the elimination of statutory good time. There is no change in the parole eligibility date.

Other State, Federal

This category is used for inmates who were received by the DOC from another state correctional agency or the Federal Bureau of Prisons and are not sentenced under Massachusetts General Law.

Truth in Sentencing Indicator

On January 12, 1994, the Governor signed into law an Act to Promote the Effective Management of the Criminal Justice System. St. 1993, c. 432, generally known as the “Truth in Sentencing” Law. Sentencing for offenses committed after June 30, 1994 are significantly affected by this law. This field indicates whether the “Current Offense” was committed prior to or after June 30, 1994. For further discussion on some of the changes due to Truth in Sentencing refer to “Sentence/Sentence Type” earlier in Glossary.

Type of Sentence

In past reports, this variable has represented the type of sentence received by the court such as Aggregate, Concurrent, Fine, Forthwith, From

and After, Simple, or Split. Due to changes in the database, the Type of Sentence is no longer available in such detail, consequently it is no longer reported. This variable is different from "Sentence Type" which is presented in this report and defined earlier in the Glossary.

Violent Offense

Any offense that falls under the Person or Sex Offense categories.

Receiving Stolen Goods	Includes receiving and buying stolen goods; common receiver of stolen goods (habitual).
Shoplifting	Includes shoplifting as a third offense
Theft of Motor Vehicle or non-Motor Vehicle	Removal of motor vehicle with intent to defraud insurer; theft of motor vehicle or trailer; concealment of motor vehicle or trailer thief; unlawful taking or use of transportation media
Unarmed Burglary/Breaking and Entering	Includes unarmed breaking and entering in night time; breaking and entering a building, vessel or vehicle in night time with intent to commit a misdemeanor or felony, entering by daytime or breaking and entering by night time a building, vehicle or vessel with intent to commit a felony; entering dwelling in night time or breaking and entering in a building, vehicle or vessel in daytime with intent to commit a felony; breaking and entering or entering railroad car with intent to commit a felony; breaking and entering trucks, tractors or trailers.
<u>Sex Offense</u>	Sex Offenses Against the Person. Consist of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 265 (Crimes Against the Person) and Chapter 272 offenses (Crimes Against Chastity, Morality, Decency and Good Order).

Assault With Intent to Commit Rape	Includes attempts to rape
Assault with Intent to Rape, Child < 16	Assault with Intent to Commit Rape, Child Under 16 Years.
Crimes Against Nature	The abominable and detestable crime against nature, either with mankind or beas
Indecent Asslt & Battery on Child Under 14	Indecent Assault and Battery on Child Under 14. Includes indecent assault and battery on a minor
Indecent A&B on Mentally Retarded Victim	Indecent Assault and Battery on Mentally Retarded Victim
Indecent Asslt & Battery on Victim 14 or Older	Indecent Assault and Battery on Victim 14 or Older.
Other Sex Offenses	Includes adultery, fornication, open and gross lewdness and lascivious behavior, drugging persons for unlawful intercourse, dissemination of obscene matter.
Rape	Age of victim not specified, or does not fall under a rape of child category.
Rape and Abuse of a Child	Statutory rape, victim under 16 years old.
Rape of a Child with Force	Rape of a Child with Force
Sex Offenses Involving a Minor	Includes enticing person under 16 away for marriage, inducing person under 18 to have sexual intercourse, inducing a minor into prostitution, prostitutes deriving support from a child, distribution of obscene articles to minors, child pornography, dissemination of materials of child in state of nudity, dissemination of visual materials of child engaged in sexual conduct, knowingly purchasing or possession of visual material of child depicted in sexual conduct
Sexual Assault - Out of State/Federal Inmates	Used for sexual assault cases for out-of-state or federally sentenced inmates whose offense does not fit in another sex offense category
Unnatural Acts	Includes unnatural acts, lascivious acts, assault to commit unnatural sex acts
