WORK RULES



DTA sends notices to people who must meet the ABAWD Work Rules to keep SNAP. For more information, see <u>Mass.gov/SNAPWorkRules</u>.

If DTA tells you that you must meet the ABAWD Work Rules, you must:

- Work (paid or unpaid) and/or do an approved Employment and Training (E&T) activity 20 hours per week or 80 hours per month; or
- 2. Volunteer at a non-profit or public organization for a certain number of hours. The amount of community service hours depends on your monthly SNAP benefit amount.

What YOU Need to Know

If you are age 18 through (and including) age 54, able to work, and don't have any dependents, you might need to meet the Able-Bodied Adults Without Dependents (ABAWD) Work Rules to get SNAP for more than 3 months. You must meet these rules during the current time limit, which is January 1, 2024 until December 31, 2026.

DTA has to screen you for exemptions before deciding if you have to meet the ABAWD Work Rules. You can be exempt from meeting the ABAWD Work Rules if you are:

- Disabled or have a hard time working because of a health problem
- Homeless or at risk of becoming homeless
- Caring for a child younger than 6, or an individual who needs your care (even if the individual or child is not in your home)
- Getting or have applied for unemployment benefits
- Earning \$217.50 per week (before taxes) or making less than this but working 30 or more hours per week
- Going to school, college, or a training program at least half time
- Receiving TAFDC or EAEDC benefits. (Apply at <u>DTAConnect.com</u>)
- In a substance use treatment program
- Living with someone under age 18, even if that person does not receive SNAP
- Pregnant
- Have served in any of the US armed services or are a Veteran (including the Reserves or as a commissioned officer at certain agencies) regardless of the conditions of discharge or release
- 24 or younger, and were in state foster care on or after your 18th birthday

Remember: If you earn more than \$217.50/week (even if that is less than 20 hours of work), tell us! If you do, you are exempt from the ABAWD Work Rules.

Already participating in an E&T Activity or Volunteering?	Let us know as soon as possible! If you are already volunteering at a public or nonprofit organization, ask the volunteer coordinator to fill out and submit the <u>ABAWD Work Program Participation Report</u> Form (WPPR) so that DTA can verify that you are meeting the ABAWD Work Rules by volunteering. If you are already participating in an employment and training program that DTA doesn't know about, ask your training provider to fill out and submit the <u>ABAWD Training Program Information Request Form</u> (TPIR), so that DTA can determine if your participation in the program meets the ABAWD Work Rules.
