Hi Gerard.

I sent some of my comments and reflected a bit more on it.

One of the points I made was the profits made on APR transfers that were not apparent and why they were as interested in the process beyond the good work that they do. In essence they hold the APR rights in the interim and they issue a tax credit to the farmer for his property. Then they sell to the state and have a substantial windfall. This was something that I was not aware of and feel that they certainly have a role to play but also would like to help preserve the farmer and not just the farm.



I also said that there might be a place for execute orders to expedite some of the issues where time was of the essence while being aware of the problems and pitfalls of precedence.

The next issue is that when an APR was transferred, that there is some sort of protocol that is followed to ensure that the farmer selling the APR rights, is made very aware of the pitfalls and opportunities presented. Almost in thinking about a lot of what it's.

Then following the transfer some sort of follow up when an APR farmer is crafting a business plan or has received monies towards that end. There have been many improvements in that direction.

The most significant comment was what I had already forwarded to you.

Comments about the Listening sessions on the APR Program

The most significant comment came at the session at Essex Tech. Dave Dumaresque aka Farmer Dave talked about investing in the APR property and due to the structure of how things are mandated, we are condemning the program to failure from the standpoint that investing in an APR property in terms of business development and infrastructure. Right now, the rules and regulations have you investing on property that is not APR as on an APR property there is not a clear way to recoup your investment. He gave the example of former Soviet Georgia and Moldova who have different approaches to land ownership. The net result is that Moldova has an abundance of production to the point that they export food and Georgia is buying in food as they cannot produce enough for themselves.

This fact is so unbelievably important for the continuance of the program's success and the farms solvency and I suggest that we form a task force to investigate and come up with a new approach. This would be seen as cutting edge and ahead of the curve. I am not sure what the answer is but knowing the issue is the first step in finding a solution.

I strongly suggest that both the ALPC and The Ag Board look into this approach.
