If you can, I would read the email Brita sent on 2/9, it's her resignation letter officially saying she won't renew he coordinator contract, and does list a lot of specific problems she has been having. Although the program has been a success, or coordinator has really been holding it together, and it looks like she is now leaving the program at the end of July. That's what has me, and a bunch of other people associated with the program, very concerned. Brita did include you in that email chain, but I'll attach it if you haven't seen it. I'm sorry if I kinda blindsided you at the meeting last Tuesday, but thought you have seen some of the emails chains were more in the loop than maybe you were, my bad on that.

I don't feel like the steering committee has the personnel to find her replacement. I'm not sure if that's how it's supposed to work, but it seems to me that the state commission or council has the high powered people within these state agencies to find us someone to continue managing the program going forward, rather than creating a new full time position, etc.

I need to call some of my steering committee members as well as Kelley Freda on Tuesday. Maybe we could plan to do a quick teams chat this coming Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday.

I am writing to let you know that I will not be renewing my contract when it is completed at the end of July. If the State Commission, Envirothon Council, and Steering Committee want me to continue functioning as the de facto executive director of this program, then they need to compensate me as such with full time, benefited employment.

MA Envirothon is a program which is internationally known for its successes and which regularly receives inquiries from other states interested in learning from those successes. However, it saddens me that MA Envirothon does not receive commitment and attention from the State commensurate with its accomplishments and prestige. Instead, I have steadily and reliably picked up task after task discarded as Steering Committee members have left. Increasingly over the last 15 years, I have been the stable center which has held this program together. This is well beyond the role in my job description and although I am proud of the program that we have built, I am not being adequately compensated for the additional level of responsibility that I am expected to manage.

One example of the mismatch between my contract and my duties is with respect to the DEI initiative. Here, the Steering Committee has delegated to me basically all of the organizing, planning and now even the role of supervising another contractor. Please take a look at the expectations being placed on me as a contractor asked to perform this job. In contrast to any part time employment at a non-profit organization or agency, my years of service as a contractor don't even count towards student loan forgiveness programs. It is ironic that I am being asked to run the DEI initiative for the benefit of our participants in this manner which is quite inequitable for me.

Arguably, MA Envirothon is not set up to be run by an executive director. It is supposed to be a collaboration of state agencies under the supervision of the state commission with leadership coming from within this network. The Coordinator position was initially set up to handle the administrative tasks of the Steering Committee and be a liaison with teachers, which was easily accomplished in a few hours a week. However, while many members are doing their best to keep their areas of the program strong and vibrant, there is no central leadership and no guidance from the upper levels of the state leaving the program adrift. Now, in order to cover all the tasks abandoned by a dwindling committee, the workload regularly necessitates over 32 hours a week. This lack of other's capacity to do the work has led to my engaging experience, skills and abilities well beyond the qualifications for a Coordinator -- duties and talents arguably commensurate with that of an Executive Director.

I am no longer willing to try to keep the program moving forward at the expense of myself and my family. I am forced to confront the fact that at the level of leadership and management with which I am currently tasked, I could easily acquire a less stressful and more financially stable job. The cracks are no longer small. I am giving you fair warning that I am no longer willing to plug my fingers into the proverbial dike as a part-time independent contractor.
