# **Authority**

This hearing was conducted pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapters 118E and 30A, and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.

#### Jurisdiction

Through a notice dated February 7, 2023, MassHealth denied the appellant's request for prior authorization of comprehensive orthodontic treatment (Exhibit 1). The appellant filed a timely appeal on March 8, 2023 (130 CMR 610.015(B); Exhibit 2). Denial of a request for prior approval is a valid basis for appeal (130 CMR 610.032).

# **Action Taken by MassHealth**

MassHealth denied the appellant's request for prior authorization of comprehensive orthodontic treatment.

#### Issue

The appeal issue is whether MassHealth was correct in determining that the appellant is ineligible for comprehensive orthodontic treatment.

# **Summary of Evidence**

MassHealth was represented at hearing by an orthodontic consultant from DentaQuest, the MassHealth dental contractor. The evidence indicates that the appellant's provider submitted a prior authorization request for comprehensive orthodontic treatment, together with X-rays and photographs, on February 4, 2023. MassHealth reviewed the prior authorization request and determined that appellant is 21 years old, which is past the maximum age for MassHealth to pay for comprehensive orthodontic treatment. On February 7, 2023, MassHealth notified the appellant that the prior authorization request had been denied on this basis.

The appellant appeared at the hearing and testified on her own behalf through a Cape Verdean interpreter. She confirmed that she turned 21 in November 2022, but stated that her orthodontist told her MassHealth may nevertheless pay for her orthodontic treatment because she is still a student. She added that her orthodontist advised her to bring photographs and other information to show that she needs braces.

## **Findings of Fact**

Based on a preponderance of the evidence, I find the following:

- 1. On February 3, 2023, the appellant's orthodontic provider submitted a request for MassHealth coverage of orthodontic treatment.
- 2. On February 7, 2023, MassHealth denied the prior authorization request on the basis that the appellant does not meet the age requirements for coverage.
- 3. On March 8, 2023, the appellant filed a request for a fair hearing.
- 4. The appellant turned 21 years old in November 2022.

## **Analysis and Conclusions of Law**

Pursuant to 130 CMR 420.431(A), MassHealth pays for orthodontic treatment as follows:

The MassHealth agency pays for orthodontic treatment, subject to prior authorization, service descriptions and limitations as described in 130 CMR 420.431. The provider must seek prior authorization for orthodontic treatment and begin initial placement and insertion of orthodontic appliances and partial banding or full banding and brackets prior to the member's 21st birthday.

In this case, MassHealth denied the appellant's prior authorization request for coverage of comprehensive orthodontic treatment on the basis that the appellant is past her 21<sup>st</sup> birthday. As there is no dispute that the appellant was 21 years old at the time of the PA request, MassHealth's action was correct. This appeal is therefore denied.
