This notice may be supplemented if any new significant facts are learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Mattapan Community Health Center ("MCHC") does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Massachusetts law or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

MCHC recently concluded its investigation into unusual activity related to an employee email account. Upon learning of the suspicious activity on June 11, 2019, MCHC immediately took steps to secure the email account and began working with outside computer forensics experts to determine the nature and scope of the incident. On August 14, 2019, the investigation determined that an unknown intruder accessed the email account of a MCHC employee between June 11 and June 12, 2019. A comprehensive review of the information stored in the email account at the time of incident was performed to identify any personal information that could have potentially been viewed by the intruder. Once this exhaustive review was complete, MCHC then worked diligently to confirm the impacted individuals to whom that information related. On or around October 1, 2019, MCHC confirmed the identities of the individuals who may have had information affected by this incident.

The personal information impacted by this event may include the following: name, Social Security number, driver's license image and number. There is no evidence this information was accessed by the unknown actor, and MCHC is providing notice in an abundance of caution.

Notice to Massachusetts Residents

On October 25, 2019, MCHC began providing written notice of this incident to affected individuals pursuant to Massachusetts law, which includes seven (7) Massachusetts residents. Written notice was provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*. We note that MCHC also provided notice to additional Massachusetts residents solely pursuant to HIPAA requirements.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the potential unauthorized access to the email account, MCHC moved quickly to identify those that may be affected, put in place resources to assist them, and provide them with notice of this incident. MCHC is also working to implement additional safeguards to protect the security of information in its system, including the implementation of multifactor authentication for certain sensitive email accounts, including the account impacted by the incident.

MCHC is providing written notice to those individuals who may be affected by this incident. This notice includes an offer of complimentary access to 24 months of credit monitoring and identity restoration services through TransUnion and the contact information for a dedicated assistance line for potentially affected individuals to contact with questions or concerns regarding this incident. Additionally, MCHC is providing potentially impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud. MCHC is also providing written notice of this incident to other state and federal regulators, as necessary.

Mattapan Community Health Center ("MCHC") is writing to inform you of an event that may affect the privacy of some of your personal information. While we are unaware of any actual or attempted misuse of your information, we take this event very seriously and are providing you with information and access to resources so that you can protect your personal information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

The confidentiality, privacy, and security of the information in our care is one of our highest priorities. MCHC is reviewing our existing policies and procedures and implementing additional safeguards to further secure the information in our systems.

As a safeguard, we have arranged for you to enroll, at no cost to you, in an online credit monitoring service (myTrueIdentity) for two years provided by TransUnion Interactive, a subsidiary of TransUnion, ® one of the three nationwide credit reporting companies.

How to Enroll: You can sign up online or via U.S. mail delivery

- To enroll in this service, go to the myTrueIdentity website at www.MyTrueIdentity.com and, in the space referenced as "Enter Activation Code," enter the 12-letter Activation Code
 <Insert Unique 12-letter Activation Code>> and follow the three steps to receive your credit monitoring service online within minutes.
- If you do not have access to the Internet and wish to enroll in a similar offline, paper-based credit monitoring service, via U.S. mail delivery, please call the TransUnion Fraud Response Services toll-free hotline at 1-855-288-5422. When prompted, enter the six-digit telephone passcode 697562 and follow the steps to enroll in the offline credit monitoring service, add an initial fraud alert to your credit file, or to speak to a TransUnion representative if you believe you may be a victim of identity theft.

You can sign up for the online or offline credit monitoring service anytime between now and **January 31, 2020**. Due to privacy laws, we cannot register you directly. Please note that credit monitoring services might not be available for individuals who do not have a credit file with TransUnion or an address in the United States (or its territories) and a valid Social Security number. Enrolling in this service will not affect your credit score.

ADDITIONAL DETAILS REGARDING YOUR 24-MONTH COMPLIMENTARY CREDIT MONITORING SERVICE:

- Once you are enrolled, you will be able to obtain two years of unlimited access to your TransUnion credit report and credit score.
- The daily credit monitoring service will notify you if there are any critical changes to your credit file at TransUnion, including fraud alerts, new inquiries, new accounts, new public records, late payments, changes of address, and more.
- The service also includes access to an identity restoration program that provides assistance in the event that your identity is compromised and up to \$1,000,000 in identity theft insurance with no deductible. (Policy limitations and exclusions may apply.)

We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft, to review your account statements, and to monitor your credit reports and explanation of benefits forms for suspicious activity. Under U.S. law you are entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also contact the three major credit bureaus directly to request a free copy of your credit report.

You have the right to place a "security freeze" on your credit report, which will prohibit a consumer reporting agency from releasing information in your credit report without your express authorization. The security freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a security freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a security freeze on your credit report. In order to request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- 1. Your full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. If you have moved in the past five (5) years, provide the addresses where you have lived over the prior five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, military identification, etc.);
- 7. If you are a victim of identity theft, include a copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft;

The credit reporting agencies have one (1) to three (3) business days after receiving your request to place a security freeze on your credit file report, based upon the method of the request. The credit bureaus must also send written confirmation to you within five (5) business days and provide you with the process by which you

may remove the security freeze, including an authentication mechanism. Upon receiving a direct request from you to remove a security freeze and upon receiving proper identification from you, the consumer reporting agency shall remove a security freeze within one (1) hour after receiving the request by telephone for removal or within three (3) business days after receiving the request by mail for removal.

As an alternative to a security freeze, you have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on your file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years.
