Re: Notice of a Security Breach

The protection and privacy of your personal information is one of Dixon Foods Group, Inc.'s highest priorities. Because of this, I am writing to make you aware of a recent data security incident.

What Happened? On or around March 20, 2020, the PaperlessPay Corporation ("PaperlessPay") notified us of a security incident that it had recently experienced. PaperlessPay is the company that we work with for the provision of online bi-weekly paystubs and W-2 tax forms. According to PaperlessPay, on February 19, 2020, the Department of Homeland Security ("DHS") contacted PaperlessPay and notified it that someone was purporting to sell access to the PaperlessPay client database on the dark web. In response, PaperlessPay shut down its web server and SQL server to prevent unauthorized access. It then worked with the FBI and retained a cybersecurity firm to conduct a forensic investigation. That investigation revealed that someone accessed PaperlessPay's SQL server on February 18, 2020. We worked with PaperlessPay to obtain additional information regarding the incident, including what, if any, information may have been acquired. On May 6, 2020, we received from PaperlessPay a complete list of individuals whose information was in its system. We understand that there is no evidence that the incident resulted in the unauthorized acquisition of any of our employees' personal information, but PaperlessPay also could not definitively rule out the possibility that someone viewed or acquired our employees' information; therefore, we are providing this notification and have arranged for complimentary identity theft protection services for potentially impacted employees.

According to PaperlessPay, it rebuilt a new domain controller, a new web server, and a new SQL server from scratch. It then restored database files to the new SQL server from backups. It assigned new IP addresses to all the new servers, changed all passwords for users and administrators, implemented a setting that requires clients to change their passwords when they login for the first time, and disabled all remote access capabilities to the new web server and SQL server.

What Information Was Involved? The PaperlessPay server holds pay stubs and W-2 tax forms that contain information, including your name, address, pay and withholdings, part of the bank account number (first 5 digits are masked) if you have multiple accounts, and Social Security number.

What We Are Doing? Although we are not aware of any instances of fraud or identity theft, we are offering a complimentary two-year membership of Experian Identity Works Credit 3B. This product helps detect possible misuse of your personal information and provides you with identity protection services focused on immediate identification and resolution of identity theft. Identity Works Credit 3B is completely free to you, and enrolling in this program will not hurt your credit score. Additional Important Information

You should also promptly report any fraudulent activity or any suspected incidents of identity theft to proper law enforcement authorities, including the police and your state's attorney general, as well as the Federal Trade Commission ("FTC").

Under Massachusetts law, you have the right to obtain any police report filed in regard to this incident. If you are the victim of identity theft, you also have the right to file a police report and obtain a copy of it. Massachusetts law also allows consumers to place a security freeze on their credit reports. A security freeze can be placed without any charge. A security freeze prohibits a credit reporting agency from releasing any information from a consumer's credit report without written authorization. However, please be aware that placing a security freeze on your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prevent the timely approval of any requests you make for new loans, credit mortgages, employment, housing or other services.

To place a security freeze on your credit report, you must send a written request to each of the three major consumer reporting agencies by regular, certified or overnight mail at the addresses below or, if available, comply with the consumer reporting agencies' online security freeze request procedures:

In order to request a security freeze, you may need to provide the following information:

- 1. Your full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security Number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. If you have moved in the past five (5) years, provide the addresses where you have lived over the prior five years;
- 5. Proof of current address such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, military identification, etc.);
- 7. If you are a victim of identity theft, include a copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft;
- 8. If you are not a victim of identity theft, include payment by check, money order, or credit card (Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover only). Do not send cash through the mail.

The credit reporting agencies have three (3) business days after receiving your request to place a security freeze on your credit report. The credit bureaus must also send written confirmation to you within five (5) business days and provide you with a unique personal identification number (PIN) or password, or both that can be used by you to authorize the removal or lifting of the security freeze.

To lift the security freeze in order to allow a specific entity or individual access to your credit report, you must call or send a written request to the credit reporting agencies by mail or, if available, comply with the consumer reporting agencies' online procedures for lifting a security freeze, and include proper identification (name, address, and social security number) and the PIN number or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze as well as the identities of those entities or individuals you would like to receive your credit report or the specific period of time you want the credit report available. The credit reporting agencies have three (3) business days after receiving your request to lift the security freeze for those identified entities or for the specified period of time.

To remove the security freeze, you must send a written request to each of the three credit bureaus by mail or, if available, comply with the consumer reporting agencies' online procedures for removing a security freeze, and include proper identification (name, address, and social security number) and the PIN number or password provided to you when you placed the security freeze. The credit bureaus have three (3) business days after receiving your request to remove the security freeze.

Credit Reports: You may obtain a free copy of your credit report once every 12 months from each of the three national credit reporting agencies by visiting http://www.annualcreditreport.com, by calling toll-free 1-877-322-8228, or by completing an Report Annual Credit Report Request Annual Credit Request Form and mailing it to Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA 30348. You can print a copy of the request form at https://www.annualcreditreport.com/cra/requestformfinal.pdf.

Alternatively, you may elect to purchase a copy of your credit report by contacting one of the three national credit reporting agencies. Fraud Alerts: You may want to consider placing a fraud alert on your credit report. An initial fraud alert is free and will stay on your credit file for at least 90 days. The alert informs creditors of possible fraudulent activity within your report and requests that the creditor contact you prior to establishing any new accounts in your name. To place a fraud alert on your credit report, contact any of the three national credit reporting agencies using the contact information listed above. Credit and Security Freezes: You may have the right to place a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, so that no new credit can be opened in your name without the use of a PIN number that is issued to you when you initiate the freeze. A credit freeze is designed to prevent potential credit grantors from accessing your credit report without your consent. If you place a credit freeze, potential creditors and other third parties will not be able to get access to your credit report unless you temporarily lift the freeze. Therefore, using a credit freeze may delay your ability to obtain credit. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a credit freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. Since the instructions for how to establish a credit freeze differ from state to state, please contact the three major credit reporting companies using the contact information above.

Individuals interacting with credit reporting agencies have rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
