Carolina Behavioral Health Alliance, LLC (CBHA) is a third-party administrator which is contracted with [REDACTED] to manage certain medical benefits for individuals. We are writing in order to inform you of an incident that may have involved your child's personal information. We take the security of your child's information seriously, and want to provide you with information and resources you can use to protect their information.

What Happened and What Information Was Involved:

On March 20, 2022, we detected and stopped a sophisticated ransomware attack, in which an unauthorized third party accessed and disabled some of CBHA's computer systems. We immediately engaged third-party forensic firms to assist us with securing the network environment and investigating the extent of any unauthorized activity. We also notified law enforcement.

Our investigation determined an unauthorized third party may have accessed certain individual personal information during this incident on March 19, 2022 and March 20, 2022. We advised [REDACTED] of this incident on May 9, 2022 and have been working diligently to identify which individuals and what information were potentially impacted.

We found no evidence that your child's information has been misused; however, it is possible that the following information could have been accessed by an unauthorized third party: Name, Address, Health Plan ID#, Gender.

What We Are Doing:

Data security is one of our highest priorities. Upon detecting this incident, we moved quickly to initiate a response, which included conducting an investigation with the assistance of IT specialists and confirming the security of our network environment. We also wiped and rebuilt affected systems and have taken steps to bolster our network security. We also reviewed and altered our policies, procedures and network security software relating to the security of our systems and servers, as well as how we store and manage data.

What You Can Do:

We are providing the parents of impacted minor dependents with access to **Cyber Monitoring** services for you and your minor child for twenty four (24) months at no charge. Cyber Monitoring will look out for your and your

child's personal data on the dark web and alert you if your personally identifiable information or your child's is found online. These services will be provided by Cyberscout through Identity Force, a TransUnion company specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services.

Once you have enrolled, you can enter the information for the child that you are wanting to be included in the monitoring in the online dashboard. Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to your file is limited; you must give your consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; you may limit “prescreened” offers of credit and insurance you get based on information in your credit report; and you may seek damages from violators. You may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
