Subject: Notice of Data Security Incident

Dear Sample A. Sample:

I am writing to inform you of a data security incident experienced by a vendor of US Wellness that may have affected your personal information. You are receiving this letter because US Wellness is a vendor of Blue Cross Blue Shield of Arizona (BCBSAZ) and may have provided health screenings or flu shots to you.

What Happened? On January 31, 2023, our vendor experienced a security incident that disrupted access to certain of our systems. Our vendor discovered the incident that same day. In response, we took immediate steps to secure our systems and promptly launched an investigation. Our vendor engaged independent digital forensics and incident response experts to determine what happened and to identify any information that may have been accessed or acquired without authorization as a result.

On February 9, 2023, we learned that your personal information may have been impacted in connection with this incident. Please note that we have no evidence of the misuse or attempted misuse of any potentially impacted information. However, out of an abundance of caution, US Wellness has worked to identify all potentially affected individuals in order to provide notice of the incident and resources to help with credit and identity protection.

What Information Was Involved? The information potentially impacted in connection with this incident included your name, address, date of birth, member ID number, where the service originated, and address of the service location.

What Are We Doing? As soon as we discovered this incident, we took the steps described above. In addition, we implemented measures to enhance the security of our environment in an effort to minimize the risk of a similar incident occurring in the future.

Although we have no evidence of the misuse of your information, we are offering you 24-month complimentary credit and identity protection services through Experian's IdentityWorks.

This service provides you with superior identity detection and resolution of identity theft. To activate your membership and start monitoring your personal information please follow the steps below:

- Ensure that you enroll by: 6/30/23. (Your code will not work after this date.)
- Visit the Experian IdentityWorks website to enroll: https://www.experianidworks.com/credit

Please note that this Identity Restoration support is available to you for 24 months from the date of this letter even if you do not sign up now for credit monitoring services. 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STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO HELP PROTECT YOUR INFORMATION

Review Your Account Statements and Notify Law Enforcement of Suspicious Activity: As a precautionary measure, we recommend that you remain vigilant by reviewing your account statements and credit reports closely. If you detect any suspicious activity on an account, you should promptly notify the financial institution or company with which the account is maintained. You also should promptly report any fraudulent activity or any suspected incidence of identity theft to proper law enforcement authorities, your state attorney general, and/or the Federal Trade Commission (FTC).

Copy of Credit Report: You may obtain a free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit reporting agencies once every 12 months by visiting http://www.annualcreditreport.com/, calling toll-free 1-877-322-8228, or by completing an Annual Credit Report Request Form and mailing it to Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Fraud Alert: You may want to consider placing a fraud alert on your credit report. An initial fraud alert is free and will stay on your credit file for at least one year. The alert informs creditors of possible fraudulent activity within your report and requests that the creditor contact you prior to establishing any accounts in your name. To place a fraud alert on your credit report, contact any of the three credit reporting agencies identified above. Additional information is available at http://www.annualcreditreport.com.

Security Freeze: You have the right to put a security freeze on your credit file for up to one year at no cost. This will prevent new credit from being opened in your name without the use of a PIN number that is issued to you when you initiate the freeze. A security freeze is designed to prevent potential creditors from accessing your credit report without your consent. As a result, using a security freeze may interfere with or delay your ability to obtain credit. You must separately place a security freeze on your credit file with each credit reporting agency. In order to place a security freeze, you may be required to provide the consumer reporting agency with information that identifies you including your full name, Social Security number, date of birth, current and previous addresses, a copy of your state-issued identification card, and a recent utility bill, bank statement or insurance statement.

Additional Free Resources: You can obtain information from the consumer reporting agencies, the FTC, or from your respective state Attorney General about fraud alerts, security freezes, and steps you can take toward preventing identity theft. You may report suspected identity theft to local law enforcement, including to the FTC or to the Attorney General in your state.
