Introduction and Procedural History of this Appeal

The claimant appeals a decision by a review examiner of the Department of Unemployment Assistance (DUA) to deny the claimant benefits following her separation from employment on September 8, 2020. We review, pursuant to our authority under G.L. c. 151A, § 41, and we affirm in part and reverse in part.

On February 11, 2021, the agency initially determined that the claimant was not entitled to unemployment benefits. The claimant appealed the determination and participated in the hearing; the employer did not participate. In a decision rendered on July 15, 2021, the review examiner affirmed the agency determination, concluding that the claimant voluntarily left employment without good cause attributable to the employer or urgent, compelling, and necessitous reasons and, thus, was disqualified under G.L. c. 151A, § 25(e)(1). The Board accepted the claimant's application for review.

Ruling of the Board

After considering the recorded testimony and evidence from the hearing, the review examiner's decision, and the claimant's appeal, we conclude that the review examiner's decision that the claimant's separation from employment is disqualifying under G.L. c. 151A, § 25(e)(1), is based on substantial evidence and is free from any error of law affecting substantive rights. However, we disagree with the review examiner's decision to subject the claimant to a full disqualification from the receipt of benefits. We take administrative notice of the information in the DUA UI Online electronic record-keeping system, which shows that the claimant filed a claim for unemployment benefits effective February 9, 2020. Because the claimant began working for the instant part-time employer on July 27, 2020, this employment constitutes benefit year employment.

When a claimant separates from a part-time employer during her benefit year for disqualifying reasons, she is not rendered ineligible for her entire weekly benefit amount. Rather, she is merely subject to a constructive deduction from her weekly benefit rate. 430 CMR 4.76(1)(a)(2) and 430 CMR 4.78(1)(c). Here, based on the earnings information in the DUA UI Online system and the dates of employment in the findings, the claimant's average weekly part-time earnings were \$332.27. Accordingly, \$332.27, minus the earnings disregard, shall be deducted from the claimant's weekly benefit amount. Since the claimant's earnings disregard is \$274.33, the constructive deduction shall be in the amount of \$58.00.

We, therefore, affirm the part of the review examiner's decision which concluded that the claimant's separation from the instant employer during the week ending September 12, 2020, was disqualifying. However, we reverse the portion of the decision which subjected the claimant to a full disqualification from the receipt of benefits. The claimant is only subject to a constructive deduction, and her weekly benefit amount shall be reduced in the amount of \$58.00.
