Bureau of Special Investigations FY 2006 Quarterly Report July 1, 2005 – September 30, 2005

Introduction

The Office of the State Auditor's Bureau of Special Investigations (BSI) is charged with investigating fraudulent claims for or wrongful receipt of payments or services under public assistance programs. BSI receives referrals from various state and federal agencies, the general public and the State Police. The majority of these allegations involve suspected fraud in the Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA) cash assistance and Food Stamp Programs and the Division of Medical Assistance (DMA) MassHealth program.

When an investigation results in identified public assistance fraud, the case is referred to the appropriate legal authority for criminal prosecution or the appropriate agency for civil recoupment of illegally obtained benefits or services. BSI examiners work closely with District Attorneys offices and/or appropriate agency personnel to assure the recovery of lost funds. These entities establish settlement restitution payment amounts and are responsible for the actual collection of these payments.

First Quarter Activities and Accomplishments

At the start of the first quarter of FY 2006, BSI's caseload included 2992 cases in various stages of investigation. During the period of July 1, 2005 through September 30, 2005, BSI received 311 new allegations of public assistance fraud.

During the same period BSI completed the investigation of 38 cases. In 23 of these investigations, BSI examiners found illegal activities that resulted in \$289,566.94 of fraudulently obtained public assistance benefits and services. Each of these cases has been referred to the appropriate agency for either criminal prosecution or civil recoupment of lost funds.

Currently, BSI has a number of cases of identified fraud pending in various stages within the court system and is working with the appropriate District Attorneys to prosecute these cases. During this quarter, three cases of previously identified fraud have resulted in convictions and repayment of fraud. BSI investigations have led to the indictments of four individuals, three in federal court involving conspiracies to illegally obtain narcotic prescription drugs through the MassHealth program and one in Norfolk County Superior Court involving child care fraud. Additionally BSI has filed charges in Essex County against a recipient who allegedly used an EBay site to sell stolen merchandize while receiving housing and cash assistance from the Commonwealth.

The total caseload of open investigations on September 30, 2005 totaled 3265 cases.

Summary of BSI Investigative Activities

The charts below provide a summary of caseload activities and the amounts of identified fraud by program of assistance.
