





School and municipal buses are used as mass transit for many students. While data shows the safest way to arrive and depart school is the school bus, each type of bus or van has unique characteristics. Understanding how to share the road with buses and negotiate their frequent stops makes travel safer for all students.

SAFETY GUIDELINES FOR DRIVING AROUND ALL BUSES



Dedicated bus lanes, whether at a school or on a road, help make bus travel safer and more efficient for passengers, pedestrians, and other people on the road.

Stay alert for bus passengers boarding or exiting.

After a person exits a bus, they become a pedestrian. Massachusetts' new Vulnerable User Law requires motorists to give four feet to pass pedestrians and people on bikes.1



Be prepared to stop behind a bus at rail crossinas.

All buses, with and without passengers, must come to a complete stop at all railroad crossings, where the driver opens the passenger door to check for oncoming trains.2



Don't tailgate. Keep a safe distance and be prepared for frequent stops.

Buses need extra space to operate safely. Maintain a comfortable following distance to prepare for frequent stops.

Give buses space to safely leave stops and merge back into traffic.

Your courtesy in yielding to buses at stops supports a smoother traffic flow and helps buses stay on schedule.3



Never pass a bus on the right.4

Large vehicles often need to shift left before making a wide right turn, and if you're beside a truck or bus, you could be in their blind spot.



School and municipal bus passengers range from the very young to the elderly. Be patient so that all can board or exit safely.

SCHOOL BUSES AND THE LAW

DRIVING AROUND SCHOOL BUSES REQUIRES EXTRA ATTENTION!



STOP when flashing lights are activated.

It's the law! Vehicles must stop when a school bus or van has its lights flashing and a stop sign extended. Violations begin at a \$250 fine and may result in license suspension.5

DO NOT CROWD the bus.

It's the law! In Massachusetts, vehicles must stay 100 feet behind school buses.6 This extra distance allows the bus driver to see students boarding and exiting the bus.

KEEP BACK 100 FEET



RESPECT school zone speed limits.

It's the law! The speed limit in a school zone is 20 mph.7

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY DISTINCTIONS

- Only school buses, along with fire, police, and ambulances, can stop traffic.
- School buses are the only vehicles that wait for a student to cross the street safely. When a school bus stops with its lights flashing, students are present and have not yet safely unloaded or crossed the street.
