What is Byrne SCIP?

- The Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program (Byrne SCIP) is a federal funding initiative that supports crisis intervention strategies to reduce gun violence and enhance public safety.
- OGR secured Byrne SCIP funding through a competitive process held by the Bureau of Justice Assistance.
- Through competitive solicitations, OGR awarded \$1,868,802 in subgrants to municipal law enforcement and state agencies to prevent or reduce acts of gun violence through the implementation of evidence-based strategies and promising programming.
- An additional \$150,000 in Byrne SCIP funding was awarded to the Statewide Research Partner to provide technical assistance to other sub-recipients.

Sub-Recipient Strategies

1. **Virtual Reality (VR) Training for Police Officers** – Seven grantees plan to implement VR-based training programs to improve officers' skills in de-escalation, crisis intervention, and use-of-force decision-making.
2. **Crisis Intervention and Mental Health Support** – Many agencies are emphasizing Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training, mental health awareness, and collaboration with clinicians to improve responses to individuals experiencing mental health crises.
3. **Gun Violence Reduction and Community Outreach** – Departments are focusing on community-based interventions to reduce gun violence through targeted youth programs, crisis response, and social services.

Sub-Recipient Strategies


- 4. Firearm Safety and Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) Awareness** – Several initiatives are geared towards educating the public about ERPO laws and distributing gun locks to prevent unauthorized firearm use.
- 5. Youth Intervention and Crime Prevention** – Agencies are funding programs to divert at-risk youth from gang involvement and criminal activities through mentorship, mental health support, and life skills training.
- 6. Enhanced Training and Equipment Procurement** – Various agencies are using funds to improve their training infrastructure, hire additional personnel, and purchase equipment such as laptops, VR headsets, and software to enhance law enforcement efficiency.

- Download and save a PDF copy of your PMT reports

SRP Scope of Work

- Assist OGR with required data collection and reporting efforts
 - Share reporting information with grantees, send reporting reminders, summarize PMT and quarterly reports
- Provide technical assistance (TA) to local and state sub-recipients
 - Sharing of relevant research and opportunities via quarterly newsletters
 - Hosting quarterly TA sessions

Virtual Reality for Crisis and De-Escalation Training

Police officers must be prepared to respond to unpredictable, ambiguous, and rapidly shifting crisis situations that carry great risk of harm to both themselves and the public. Emerging evidence suggests that for crisis and de-escalation training, virtual-reality scenario-based training (VR SBT) may be as effective as live-action scenario-based training (LA SBT).^{15,16} VR training also allows for practice with a wide range of customizable, unique scenarios. As with any intervention, departments should monitor and evaluate VR trainings to ensure that they are effective.



Virtual reality trainings should be **immersive enough to replicate stress that would be encountered in the field, without being so stressful that they cause harm or interfere with learning retention**. There is no one-size-fits-all answer to exactly how much stress is ideal; stress levels will vary according to the situation and the individual.¹⁷ However, some stress measures can still help ensure that participants are moderately, but not extremely, stressed by the VR scenario.

Stress levels can be approximated through self-report using a short validated stress scale such as the STAIS-5, shown at right.^{18,19} Stress may also be measured physiologically by testing for elevated heart rate and heart rate variability.

SRP Deliverables
