RE: **Cambridge Health Alliance: Addition of Inpatient Psychiatric Beds**

Dear Ms. Szent-Gyorgi:

In accordance with the Updated Guidance dated November 24, 2020 issued by the Determination of Need Program (the "Updated Guidance"), Cambridge Public Health Commission, d/b/a Cambridge Health Alliance ("CHA"), an acute care hospital, hereby notifies the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (the "Department") that CHA intends to add inpatient psychiatry beds at its existing facilities as described in Section B below ("the "Proposed Project").

A. Identity of Applicant/ Health Care Facility.

CHA is the Applicant and the Health Care Facility where the inpatient psychiatry beds are proposed to be added. CHA is a licensed acute care hospital currently operating two inpatient hospital campuses and 17 satellite locations, including the former Somerville Hospital campus, under a single acute care hospital license issued by the Depaitment (License No. VVA5.)

B. Description of the Proposed Project.

CHA has worked closely with the Depa1tment of Mental Health (" DMH") and MassHealth to develop a plan to address the growing demand for inpatient psychiatric care arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. Out of this collaboration, CHA has developed the plan described below to (I) add 64 new inpatient psychiatry beds, consisting of 42 net new youth beds and 22 new adult beds, and (2) provide new services to address the needs of special populations identified as priorities DMH and MassHealth.

1. Inpatient Center of Excellence for Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the CHA Somerville Campus

The Proposed Project will create a new patient- and family-centered child and adolescent inpatient psychiatry center of excellence at the CHA Somerville Hospital campus, resulting in an

expanded scope of services and adding 42 new youth beds. The following units and services will be located at this center of excellence:

- a. 21 Bed Adolescent Assessment Unit. CHA will relocate the current 14 bed Adolescent Assessment Unit (the "AAU") from the CHA Cambridge Hospital campus to a new 21 bed unit at the CHA Somerville Hospital campus for a net increase of 7 adolescent inpatient beds. CHA is presently assessing design options to maximize the number of single bed patient rooms and better maintain unit capacity.
- **b. Two 12 Bed Child Assessment Units.** CHA will relocate the current 13 bed Child Assessment Unit from the CHA Cambridge Hospital campus to two new 12 bed unit at the CHA Somerville Hospital campus for a net increase of 11 child inpatient beds. To better maintain unit capacities , all patient rooms will be single bed rooms.
- c. Two 12 Bed Youth Neuro-Developmental Units. To provide for patients with complex neurodevelopmental needs who are frequently sent outside Massachusetts for services, CHA will create two new 12 bed neuro-developmental units, one for children and one for adolescents through age 20. All patient rooms will be single-bed rooms.
- **d.** Evaluation Unit. On the main floor of the Somerville campus, CHA will build out an evaluation unit for assessing and triaging youth presenting in psychiatric crisis.

CHA is collaborating closely with DMH and MassHealth to ensure the Proposed Project meets the needs of patients in the Commonwealth. The specific mix of youth beds may be adjusted based on the ongoing discussions among CHA, MassHealth, and DMH.

2. 22 New Adult Psychiatry Beds at CHA Cambridge Hospital Campus.

- a. New 14 Bed Adult Inpatient Unit. CHA will remodel and convelt the existing Adolescent Assessment Unit at the CHA Cambridge Hospital campus to a new 14 bed adult inpatient psychiatry unit.
- **b.** New 8 Bed Adult Intensive Unit. CHA will remodel and convert the existing Child Assessment Unit at the CHA Cambridge Hospital campus to a new 8 bed inpatient psychiatry unit for more acutely ill adult inpatient psychiatry who require a more intensive level of psychiatric care. This new unit will have single bed rooms in an appropriate setting to care for complex patients who require specialized programming.

This unit will provide new access for the highest acuity patients who make up a high portion of the psychiatric patients boarding in emergency departments because of difficulties in placing these patients. By providing a distinct specialized setting to care for the highest acuity patients who require single rooms, this unit will also improve access to and improve the clinical environment of CHA's other adult units.

* CHA currently has a total of 35 licensed adult psychiatry beds attributed to its Cambr idge Hospital campus, of which 18 are in serv ice.

** CHA currently has a total of 20 licensed adolesce nt psychiat ry beds attributed to its Cambridge Hospital campus , of which 14 are in service.

- **4. Timeframe for Proposed Project.** The current anticipated timeline for the Proposed Project is as follows:
 - January 2021: Anticipated project sta11;
 - April-June 2021 (Month 4-6): Target date for opening the new Adolescent Assessment Unit;

December 2021 (Month 12): Target date for opening the new Child Assess ment Units and the new ne uro-dev elo pmental unit s; and

March-April 2022 (Month 15-16): Target date for opening the new adult unit s at the CHA Cambridge Hospital campus.

This timeline is based on conceptual designs and is subject to updates based on feedback from the outside architects, engineers and contractors being engaged by CHA.

CHA's objective is to bring the new/ expanded services on lin e as expeditiously as possible. Throughout the planning and construction process CHA will assess opportunities for expediting project elements and opening unit s on a more accelerated schedule.

C. Why the Proposed Project is Needed to Address COVID-19 Emergency.

Because it will add inpat ient psychiatric beds and thereby increase access to inpatie nt psyc hiat ric se rvice s, the Proposed Project is necessary to manage and treat the COVID-19 virus. As the Depati ment has determined, "[i]ndividuals with pre-existing psyc hiatr ic or substance use disorders are likely at higher risk for negative outcomes related to [] COVID-19" and " Emergency Depaitment boarding has increased exponentially for both adult and ped iatr ic pat ients needing psychiatric care." In add ition, in recent years the overall inpatient psychiatric bed capacity in the Commonwea lth has decrea sed by 270 beds. By adding 42 new inpatient psychiatric beds for youth, includ ing serv ice s for s pec ial population s, and 22 new inpatient psychiatric beds for adults the Proposed Project will directly reduce the Common nwea lth 's shortage of inp atient psychiatric beds and directly respond to the increased demand for mental health services caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. In additio n, establishing the new specialized unit for the most acute adult patients will further increase inp atient psychiatri capacity. The increased capacity resulting from the added beds and new se rvice off e r ings will reduce the stra ins on CHA and other ho s pitals as they strive to provide care simul ta neous ly for COVID-19 patients and patients with acute psychiatri c needs.

D. Location and Projected Costs of the Project.

- 1. Location. The Proposed Project will be located at two ex ist ing CHA sites:
 - **a.** The relocation and expansion of child a nd ado lesce nt inp atient psychiatry services and the add ition of new inpatient neuro-developmental services for youth will occur at the former CHA Somerville Hospital campus locate d at 230 Highland Street/ 33 Tower Street, Somerville, Massachusetts 02143.
 - **b.** The expansion of inpatient adult services, including the new intensive service for the most acutely ill patie nts will occur at the CHA Cambridge Hospital campus located at 1493 Cambridge Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts 02139.

2. Estimated Project Costs.

CHA currently estimates the Proposed Project will cost approximately \$33,250,000.

The following table provides a breakdown of the current estimated project costs.

(I) Non-Capita l Project Expenses: Phone and IT systems and hardware, minor equipment and furnishings, re loc ation, permitting and other fees.

(2) Unreimbursed Start-up Operational Costs: Recruitment and one month training costs for approximately 150 FTEs and two months ramp up for new youth neuro-developmental and adult psychiatry ICU units.

Although it factors in contingencies, this estimate is subject to revis io n based on further construction and enginee ring needs identified as final architectural and engineering plans are developed and other needs identified during the course of construction.

Capital costs (*i.e.*, construction expense) may also exceed the above amounts if CHA expedites some or all of the project elements to sooner bring beds on line.
