On Monday, March 21, 2022, the MBTA celebrated its Grand Opening of two new stations, the new Lechmere Station, and the Union Square Station in Somerville. Our Commissioner, Layla D'Emilia, was among the dignitaries who attended the ribbon cutting ceremony, along with the inspection team responsible for opening the stations, State Building Inspectors, Rob Scott, Brianna Skowyra, Rick Bienvenue, and State Electrical Inspector Ed Poulin. The contract for the project was awarded in 2017 and is scheduled for completion later this summer. The entire project includes 4 more stations, East Somerville Station, Magoun Station, Ball Square Station and College Station in Medford, as well as three traction power substations, and a new Vehicle Storage and Maintenance Facility as a part of their \$8 billion, five-year capital investment program.

The Capital Investment Transformation projects include renovations to existing stations, modernization to fare collection systems and improved accessibility for better quality of service for all riders.

Inspectors for the MBTA are responsible for all of the stations as well as the South Coast Rail Extension which began in July of 2019 and will continue through 2023. This work includes the construction of six new stations in Middleborough, Taunton, Freetown, Fall River Depot, and two stations in New Bedford, as well as many other system-wide improvements.
