#### ALL SEX OFFENDERS

All sex offenders are required to register:

- upon conviction/adjudication, if in the community,
- upon final classification, if in the community,
- prior to release from custody,
- every year upon the month of their birth,
- accurate address information, and
- (5)(4)(2)(1)changes to registration information.

Failing to register as described above is a felony crime.
