Introducing the Training & Learning Collaborative

- The Training & Learning Collaborative (TLC) is an OCA-led initiative that:
 - Brings together eight agencies from three secretariats to strengthen workforce training efforts for child-serving professionals.
 - Will develop a framework of core competencies for all family-serving staff with accompanying basic training.

Research Update: State Agencies' Trauma Training Requirements and Opportunities Project

High Level Findings: Training Content

Overall, reviewed documents (RFRs, regulations, federal legislation) do not sufficiently detail specific trauma-responsive training topics.

Examples of the varying levels of specificity on trauma-responsive principles within RFRs:

Vague Terminology

“Provider staff must participate in consistent trainings...that ensures competence and confidence in service delivery.”

Detailed Terminology

“Trainings to include working with girls, trauma responsiveness, Race Equity and Inclusion (REI), Positive Youth Development (PYD), the science of adolescent brain development, and the development of positive staff–youth relationships in accordance with Relational Theory, Trauma Theory, Social Learning Theory and Addiction Theory.”



“Staff members receive on-going appropriate training in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion principles e.g., intersectionality, LGBTQAI+, health equity, implicit bias etc.”

High Level Findings: Training Implementation

- Agencies tend to outsource training responsibility to contracted providers.
- Few agencies require concrete documentation outlining how contracted providers intend to implement and maintain trauma-responsive practices.
- Not all agencies have mechanisms to monitor training completion or training efficacy.

Recommendations to Improve State Employees and Contracted Providers' Competencies on Child Trauma and Resilience

Questions to Guide Discussion of Recommendations



What recommendations should the CTTF present to promote:

1. A common understanding of trauma, resilience, and trauma-informed and responsive practices across child-sectors?
2. Mechanisms to ensure the state knows who is receiving (and has completed) what trainings?
3. Structures that coordinate training efforts and resource allocation for organizations and professionals who provide state services?

Work Plan Discussion: Some Background

- The CTTF has completed most of its mandate, but there remains much to be done to build a TIR Commonwealth



- The leadership of the Center on Child Wellbeing & Trauma (CCWT) provides an opportunity for CTTF and CCWT to align strategies and promote TIR practices among professionals who provide state services to children & families

Proposed Work Plan for 2026

- Governor's [Council to Address Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, and Human Trafficking](#) recognized the need for child-serving professionals to provide trauma-informed care.
- In 2024, the Council made recommendations to:
 - Improve access to trauma-informed care for medical and behavioral health clinicians who work with youth and families
 - Improve family and caregiver awareness of youth behavioral health resources that provide trauma-informed care to support children exposed to domestic violence

Proposed Work Plan for 2026

- CTTF has worked on topics adjacent to the Governor's Council's recommendations:
 - 2023 project [Understanding the Landscape of Trauma Services](#)
 - 2024-2025 work on training requirements and opportunities

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Appendix A: Purpose and Methodology of Research on Contracted Providers' Training Requirements & Opportunities

Purpose: Analyze how state agencies *identify* and *monitor* training requirements and expectations for child-serving contracted providers

Methodology: Representative sample of procurement and re-procurement activity (from FY20-current), spanning a range of contracted service types and major agency functions*

Data: 25 documents analyzed across 7 agencies:

- 18 RFRs
- 2 pieces of federal legislation
- 5 regulations



**Note: This analysis reflects a representative sample, not an exhaustive review. See Appendix B for a list of select contracts and regulations.*
