Princeton University says database containing donor, alumni info breached

Information including names, email addresses, telephone numbers, and home and business addresses is stored on the database, in addition to donation information.



Full renewal of state and local cyber grants program passes in House

The PILLAR Act, which would renew federal cybersecurity grants to state and local governments for 10 years, passed by voice vote in the House.



Logitech discloses data breach after Clop claims

The filing comes one week after the Clop cybercriminal organization claimed it stole information from Logitech through a zeroday vulnerability in Oracle's E-Business Suite tool.



MI5 warns of Chinese spies using LinkedIn to gain intel on lawmakers

The alert identifies two specific LinkedIn profiles, featuring fake personas, that are being used by China's Ministry of State Security in an attempt to build relationships in Westminster and gain intelligence.



Pennsylvania attorney general says SSNs stolen during August ransomware attack

Social Security numbers and medical information were among the data stolen in an August breach of the networks of Pennsylvania's attorney general, officials said.



Airline data broker to stop selling individuals' travel records to government agencies


