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...first a bit about the MDAR Agricultural Composting Program



- MDAR encourages farms to compost!
 - Crop farms improve soil
 - Animal farms as part of nutrient management



- MDAR (or MassDEP) registration allows farms to accept organic material from offsite for purpose of composting.
- Registration (with MDAR or MassDEP) only necessary if bringing material from off-site – otherwise not required.
- If bringing material from off-site and not registered with MDAR, default regulatory authority is with MassDEP



- Located on an Agricultural Unit
- Submitted a completed application
- Must not prevent the ability to maintain as an agricultural unit
- Application includes practices to ensure it does not result in an unpermitted discharge to air, water, or natural resources.
- Site must be capable of handling the operation size and volume.
- Surface (pad) must be appropriate for operation size and nature.



- VOLUNTARY Program!
- Operates under an exemption in 310 CMR 16.00 (Mass DEP Site Assignment Regulations for Solid Waste Facilities)
- Offers a *conditional* exemption from MassDEP



MA DEP Exemption

From 310 CMR 16.03:

management practices in a manner that prevents an unpermitted discharge of pollutants to air, water or other natural resources of the Commonwealth, does not create a public nuisance, and does not present a significant threat to public health, safety or the environment



 MDAR Agricultural Composting Coordinator position – located within the Division of Agricultural Conservation and Technical Assistance (DACTA)

Regulation through technical assistance, until...



MA DEP Exemption

Activities Located at an Agricultural Unit ...provided that the owner...comply with the regulations and guidelines of the Department of Agricultural Resources.

If MDAR determines that the activity at a specific agricultural unit is no longer regulated by the MDAR, then the owner and operator shall be subject to 310 CMR 16.00.



- MDAR conducts site visits:
 - Random
 - by request of farm
 - complaints



- Agricultural Composting Improvement Program
 - Goal to help agricultural composters improve the overall management of their agricultural composting operations and facilitate on-farm compost use.
 - Screeners
 - Spreaders
 - Turners
 - Mixers
 - Windrow Covers
 - Compost Pads
 - Improved Technology Systems



New MDAR Regulations

330 CMR 25.00: Agricultural Composting Program

In effect as of February 21, 2020



- Volume restriction: 15,000 cubic yards
 - Includes finished compost
 - Can be increased if farm has need for more

Represents approximately 75 windrows of 6' x 12' x 100'







 Volume Restriction – 5,000 cubic yards per acre of compost site







- Volume Restriction:
 - Less than 75 Tons per week of Group 2 Material (high nitrogen) for composting
 - Previous was 15 Tons per day (105/week)





- Size Restriction:
 - Composting operation located on area no more than
 10% of Commercial Production Area
 - Less Than 10 Acres







Setbacks:

- 300 feet from residence (previous was 250 feet)
- 250 feet from well (same)
- 100 feet from property line (previous was 50 feet)





- Operational Changes:
 - Mandatory training –
 Pittsfield, North Grafton, Beverly, Wareham
 - Odor Management Plan
 - 25% Rule
 - 25% Inputs **from** farm OR 25% **used** on farm





- Operational Change:
 - Odor Management Plan: A plan that is appropriate for the size and type of the operation that will minimize the production and migration of odorous compounds...

More detail to follow...



- Operational Changes:
 - New operations must submit a copy of their registration to the local Board of Health at least 30 days prior to commencement of operations.
