Introduction to Survey on CBDS Services

In March, 2014, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) published its Final Community Rule. The Rule governs requirements for settings in which Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) are provided. The Rule, which was several years in the making, sets out CMS' expectations for settings in which HCBS services are provided. Up until the promulgation of the Community Rule, CMS defined "community" by what it was not. The purpose of the regulations was to clearly define what does constitute a community setting under the Waiver Programs and to ensure that individuals receive HCBS Waiver services in settings that are integrated in and support full access to the greater community. This includes opportunities to seek employment and work in competitive integrated settings, engage in community life, control personal resources, and receive services in the community to the same degree of access as individuals not receiving Medicaid Home and Community Based Services.

In order to assure that States are complying with the requirements of the Rule, States are required to prepare transition plans which detail how they plan to come into compliance with the Rule for both residential and non-residential supports. The transition plan for residential services was the subject of public forums and the final plan was submitted to CMS for review and approval on March 2, 2015

DDS is currently working on preparing a transition plan for non-residential supports, specifically employment and community based day services. Much work has been done in the area of integrated employment as evidenced by the "Blueprint for Employment." DDS and its provider community continue to make substantial progress towards transforming our segregated sheltered workshop settings. Our progress in this area will form a large portion of DDS' transition plan to CMS. The Employment Workgroup continues to work on this area, and has also begun to strategize about how to define quality standards and expectations for Community Based Day Services and what constitutes a meaningful day for individuals for whom work is not a primary goal. DDS will need to include a section in the transition plan that speaks to efforts in this area. Since there is a shared consensus regarding the need to define clear standards and enhance CBDS statewide, the DDS approach in its transition plan will be a systemic one. For this to happen, we need your assistance.

The survey attached is being sent to all providers of CBDS. The purpose of the survey is to gather data regarding program demographics, best practices, challenges, and qualitative and quantitative measures for CBDS. The survey also seeks to determine where on the continuum of quality you consider your services to be relative to compliance with CMS' expectations for community settings.

Measuring Compliance with the Community Rule

The CMS Community Rule focuses on the following domains: community integration and access, individualized services, choice and control, and rights and dignity. One of the State's tasks is to determine current compliance and to assure ongoing compliance. We would like your input on what qualitative and quantitative measures would be useful to evaluate these domains.

An example of a qualitative measure might be: Individuals participate in integrated community activities on a frequent basis

An example of a quantitative measure might be: Individuals participate in community activity activities at least 2 times a week.
