

I hope you're having a great November! The Federal Funds and Infrastructure Office (FFIO) would again like to thank everyone who made our first Municipal Partnership Meeting on 10:28 a huge success. Over 325 people attended that meeting, and we hope you will join us for our upcoming meeting on November 28th from 2-3pm (if you haven't registered already for our monthly 200m meetings you can do so here, the same link can be used for each meeting).

In this newsletter, you will find:

- 1. The agenda for our next Municipal Partnership Meeting on November 28th meeting, which will include presentations from experts on the following federal funding opportunities:
 - a. Building Resilient Infrastructure & Communities (BRIC) and Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA); and
 b. Climate Pollution Reduction Grants (CPRG)
- 2. Federal funding opportunities with links to relevant contacts, including more information on the above grants; and
- 3. Additional resources, including information on technical assistance opportunities.

But first, here's a brief update on a couple of major wins Massachusetts has secured for critical projects and programs. Most recently, the New Bedford Port Authority (NBPA) was awarded \$24.4 million of Port Infrastructure Development Program (PIDP) funding towards the Leonard's Wharf Reconstruction & Extension Project, which is designed to mitigate sea levels, support the domestic offshore wind industry, and bolster the city's resiliency to climate change. Also in October, MassDOT announced that approximately \$4.6 million will be awarded to four municipalities – Brockton, Haverhill, Lowell, and Somerville – as part of the first round of awards for the U.S. Department or





STATE MATCHING FUNDS / TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE LEGISLATION

- Proposal to create PAYGO Capital Investment and Debt Reduction Fund
 - Fund will leverage interest earnings on the state's Stabilization
 Fund to establish a permanent pay-as-you-go capital fund
 - Over the next three years, fund will unlock an estimated \$750
 million in resources to pursue federal funding opportunities
 - Includes \$50 million for municipal matching grants and a local infrastructure bank
 - Includes \$12 million towards local government technical assistance
- Adds to the over \$2 billion in existing resources
 Massachusetts has made available for state match
 - Current estimates show a potential need for \sim \$3 billion in state match to compete for \$17.5 billion in federal grants
 - This ready pool of funding will give Massachusetts a competitive edge in the pursuit of historic federal grant opportunities
- Legislation filed as An Act to provide for competitiveness and infrastructure investment in Massachusetts (S.2482) in the Senate

CLEAN SCHOOL BUS REBATES PROGRAM

About the program:

 The clean school bus rebate program offers rebates to public school districts and third-party transportation providers to replace existing buses with clean, zero emission alternatives.

Funding information:

- Upwards of \$500M available for this round of funding
 - 60% of awards will go to priority districts
 - There will be a minimum of 1 award per state

GREEN AND RESILIENT RETROFIT PROGRAM (GRRP)

About the program:

• The GRRP program "provides funding for projects that improve energy or water efficiency, enhance indoor air quality or sustainability, implement the use of zero-emission electricity generation, low-emission building materials or processes, energy storage, or building electrification strategies, or address climate resilience, of eligible HUD-assisted multifamily properties."

Funding information:

 Funding varies by award type, ranging from \$40K per unit up to \$20M per property

Projects must be on HUD-assisted multifamily properties

- Investment priorities include equity, recovery and resilience, workforce development, manufacturing, tech-based economic development, sustainable economic development, and exports and foreign direct investment

About the program:

• Under the Planning program, EDA makes Partnership Planning, Short-Term Planning, and State Planning awards to eligible recipients to create and implement regional economic development plans designed to build capacity and guide the economic prosperity and resiliency of an area or region.

ENVIRONMENTAL AND CLIMATE **JUSTICE** COMMUNITY CHANGE GRANTS PROGRAM

About the program

• These grants provide approximately \$2 billion dollars in Inflation Reduction Act funds to benefit disadvantaged communities through projects that reduce pollution, increase community climate resilience, and build community capacity to address environmental and climate justice challenges.

Funding information:

- The grant program has two tracks—one that will award \$10-20 million grants on climate action and pollution reduction, and one that will award \$1-3 million grants to support the engagement of environmental justice communities in governmental processes
- Note: Technical assistance for the application itself may be available to eligible applicants.

Eligibility:

- Requires either a partnership between two community-based nonprofit organizations (CBOs), or
- A partnership between a CBO and a Federally-Recognized Tribe, a local government, or an institution of higher education.
- Deadline: Rolling until November 2024

Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) Grant

Program Summary

MassDOT Office of Transportation Planning

Program Overview

- The <u>FY 2024 NOFO</u> states planning and construction activities are eligible for surface transportation infrastructure projects that will improve:
 - Safety
 - Environmental sustainability
 - Quality of life
 - Mobility and community connectivity
 - Economic competitiveness and opportunity including tourism
 - State of good repair
 - Partnership and collaboration
 - Innovation

Key Information (cont.)

Award Size	 For capital grants, the minimum RAISE grant award is \$5 million in urban areas and \$1 million in rural areas. There is no minimum award amount for planning grants. The maximum grant award for capital and planning grants is \$25 million.
Total Available	 For FY2024, there is \$1.5 billion in RAISE grant funding estimated to be awarded nationally (translates to roughly \$30 million per state if divided evenly)
Federal Cost Share	 The Federal share of the costs of an eligible project carried out using a grant provided under the RAISE grant program shall not exceed 80 percent unless the project is located in a rural area*, a historically disadvantaged community (HDC)*, or an area of persistent poverty (APP)*.
Other Match Notes	 Non-Federal sources include local funds originating from State or local revenue-funded programs, State funds originating from programs funded by State revenue, or private funds. Municipalities should <i>not</i> assume that state match is available without specific approval from the Commonwealth.



Other Information

- Half of the funding will go to projects in rural areas, and half of the funding will go to projects in urban areas.
- At least \$15 million in funding is guaranteed to go towards projects located in Areas of Persistent Poverty or Historically Disadvantaged Communities, and projects located in these areas will be eligible for up to 100 percent federal cost share.
- U.S. DOT is encouraging applicants to consider how their projects can address climate change, ensure racial equity, and remove barriers to opportunity.

Previously Funded Projects: Brockton


- **Project Title**: Downtown Brockton Infrastructure Improvement Project
- Funding Amount Awarded: \$7,843,750
- Description: The project will fund the preliminary design and engineering work to reconstruct approximately 5.2miles of roadway on approximately 20 streets in downtown Brockton, replace traffic signals, convert one-way roadways to two-way, replace water and sewer lines, replace storm water systems, and install approximately 5 miles of fiber optics within the project limits.





Previously Funded Projects: Lowell

- Project Title: Lowell Bridge Preservation
- Funding Amount Awarded: \$21,400,000
- Description: The project will fund final design, permitting, construction management, and construction activities for the rehabilitation or preservation of approximately four deficient bridges. Three bridges include vehicle, pedestrian, bicycle, and transit infrastructure and one bridge will accommodate pedestrians and bicycles only.






Previously Funded Projects: New Bedford

- Project Title: Blue Lane*
 Waterfront Connector
- Funding Amount Awarded: \$1,749,360
- Description: The project will fund pre-construction activities including topographic survey, engineering design, environmental permitting, benefit-cost analysis, and public outreach for an approximately 1.76-mile complete streets roadway rehabilitation project.

*The Blue Lane is a designation that describes the city's waterfront paths from the CoveWalk and HarborWalk along the South End peninsula to the Acushnet River in the North End.





Previously Funded Projects: Rt. 119 in Colorado

- Project Title: CO 119 Diagonal Highway Mobility Improvement Project
- Funding Amount Awarded: \$25,000,000
- Description: The project will construct multimodal improvements including intersection safety improvements, construct a regional bikeway and implement Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) along CO 119 between Boulder and Longmount.

Overview

Innovative Coordinated Access and Mobility (ICAM) Program



- Aims to improve access to public transportation by building partnerships among health, transportation, and other service providers
- Improved coordination enables providers to use resources more efficiently



Eligible Projects


Innovative <u>capital projects</u> for the transportation disadvantaged that improve the regional coordination of transportation service and non-emergency medical transport services (NEMT)

Examples:

- Regional or statewide mobility management projects
- Development of coordination technology
- Regional or statewide projects that create or increase access to one-call/one-click centers



Examples of Recent Awards



City of Salem, MA

- Award: \$367,225
- The North Shore Medical Transportation Coalition (NSMTC) project will allow providers to book scheduled and ondemand rides for distinct or recurring appointments.



Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, TX

- Award: \$160,200
- Purchase an accessible van and build a program for ride share/taxi vouchers.




Other Examples of Recent Awards



City of Winston-Salem, NC

- Award: \$320,000
- Building a notification and tracking system for para-transit services and a regional fare system.



Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (D.C.)

- Award: \$100,000
- Convene a consortium of regional stakeholders to move the existing Reach a Ride platform towards a one-call, oneclick Information and Referral/Assistance tool for transportation options.



Eligible Applicants

- Direct or designated recipients of FTA's Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Formula Program (5310)
- Applicants must serve as the lead agency of a regional or statewide consortium that includes stakeholders from the transportation, healthcare, human service, or other sectors.

- Applicants should not assume that state match is available without specific approval from the Commonwealth.
