



Website updated weekly on federal funding impacts



Government Shutdown



Latest update:

- On November 12th a continuing resolution was passed into law, ending the 43-day federal government shutdown.
- The bill extends government funding at current levels through January 30th, 2026, and funds full-year appropriations bills for military construction and veterans affairs, the Legislative Branch, and the Department of Agriculture.
- The bill also provides the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) with funding through September 30th, 2026. Congress must pass 9 remaining appropriations bills ahead of January 30, 2026 to avoid a partial government shutdown.




The Environment & Climate One Stop aims to make applying for grant funding easier and more efficient for our constituents.

- Streamlines the grant application process to one single point of entry (e.g., Common App)
- Aligns program requirements and application questions as much as possible
- Links projects to the best source of funding
- Implements a key strategic priority of the Resilient Mass Finance Strategy
- Will be able to grow to include more programs over time
- Is inspired by and learning from the EOED Community One Stop

We gathered feedback from our partners on what they wanted to see

- At a minimum, applicants want the grant management system to be modernized to make applying easier
- Applicants struggle with complex and inconsistent grant applications, and often do not know the landscape of available grants to apply for
- 3. A majority of partners strongly prefer a single application



Key Questions Asked

- Challenges and experiences when searching for and applying for state climate-related grants
- Perspectives on aligning climate-related grant applications
- Desired features of an improved grant management platform

The Environment & Climate One Stop pilot will include 7 programs

MVP Action

Offers financial resources to communities that are seeking to advance priority climate adaptation actions to address climate change impacts in alignment with the MVP Core Principles.

CZM Coastal Resilience

Provides financial and technical support for local and regional efforts to address coastal flooding, erosion, and sea level rise.

CZM Coastal Habitat and Water Quality

Provide financial resources for projects that assess and treat stormwater pollution and support comprehensive habitat restoration.

EEA Cooling Corridors

Offers financial resources for conducting tree planting and related activities to assist with mitigating extreme heat and to enhance the tree canopy within neighborhoods and public spaces.

EEA Planning Assistance

Supports sustainable land use practices, including zoning for diverse housing, climate change mitigation, and land conservation, in alignment with the state's Sustainable Development Principles.

EEA Dams and Seawalls

Offers financial resources to support projects for the repair and removal of dams, levees, seawalls, and other forms of flood control.

DER Culvert Replacement Municipal Assistance and Training

Supports replacing or removing an undersized, perched, and/or degraded culverts or small bridges located in an area of high ecological value.

^{*}Non-municipality applicants to MVP Action, aside from Tribal Governments, must apply for projects that align with an MVP plan and include a letter of support from the municipality/ies related to the project.

^{**}Projects applying to CZM Coastal Resilience must be located in a Massachusetts Coastal Zone.

^{***}Projects applying to CZM Coastal Habitat and Water Quality must be located in a Massachusetts Coastal Watershed. Non-municipality applicants must be directly partnering with a municipality.



ECO One Stop programs are streamlining match requirements to the greatest extent possible

- 10% local match required (calculated based on the amount of grant funding requested)
 - Example: If a project is requesting \$100K in grant funds it will need a \$10K match
- In-kind (e.g., applicant staff time) and cash match accepted
- No match is required for rural and small towns (as designated by the Office of Rural Affairs) and Tribal Governments


2025 - 2026 Timeline

- Late October 2025 Early January 2026
 - Conduct EOI feedback calls with potential applicants
- Mid January 2026
 - Post RFR and accept applications
- Late January 2026
 - Host two informational webinars and one on the GMS after the formal application is released
- March 2026
 - Close applications and start review
- June 2026
 - Announce awards; funding allocated and projects underway in July 2026




Grant Management System (GMS)







New Grant Programs



Community Culvert Grant Program



Background

- \$200M authorized for MassDOT to administer a grant program that funds:
 - Culvert repair, replacement, removal, modernization, and resiliency improvements
- 10-year investment
- Program developed in consultation with EEA
- Funds design and construction

Program Structure

- Competitive application program via Grant Central
- Grants awarded in two phases:
 - Design
 - Construction
- Design awards are advanced by MassDOT-led consultants:
 - Design fully funded
 - Designer assists with permitting
- *Up to \$150K provided in cases where design has already begun
- Projects with completed designs may apply for construction:
 - Construction grants up to \$1M
 - Construction implemented by municipality

Community Culvert Grant Program Cont.



Eligibility Criteria

- Culverts are defined as existing road or waterway crossing structure 10 feet or less in span
- Culvert must be municipally owned and maintained
- Roadway must be open to public
- Only municipal officials may submit applications
- Eligible expenses include design and construction costs related to:
 - Culvert replacement, removal, repair, modernization, and resilience
 - ROW acquisition and permitting costs
 - Replacing a culvert with a structure greater than 10 feet in span

Ineligible Projects/Expenses

- Projects not associated with a public roadway
- Culverts over coastal tidal waterway crossings
- Municipal administrative costs
- Legal costs
- Traffic or police details
- Insurance premiums
- Ongoing maintenance or operating costs

Unpaved Roads Grant Program



Background

- This is a pilot program funding equipment and improvements to municipally owned dirt and gravel roads created after its passage in the Massachusetts Supplemental Budget Bill in June 2025.
- Provides up to \$1 million in funding to support the maintenance, repair and improvement of locally owned dirt and gravel roads.

Program Structure

- Competitive application program via Grant Central.
- After a grant is awarded, MassDOT and the municipality will enter into a contractual agreement for the municipality to complete the approved project.
- Unpaved Roads grants are reimbursement-based, which means municipalities are reimbursed for approved costs after expenses are incurred.
- Municipalities can request reimbursement at any time during project implementation.

Unpaved Roads Grant Program Cont.



Eligibility Activities

Funding may support a wide range of maintenance and repair activities, including but not limited to:

Road surface work:

 Reconstruction, Surface grading, Crown and shoulder restoration, Removal of washboarding, Repair of potholes

Safety improvements:

Guardrail repair or replacement, and Signage repair or replacement

Drainage improvements:

Installation or restoration of swales

Equipment acquisition:

 Purchase or lease of equipment (such as graders, rollers, and loaders) to be used for the maintenance or repair of unpaved roads

Ineligible Activities

- Construction of new roadways
- Paving or converting unpaved roads to paved surfaces
- Landscaping or removal of vegetation not related to an eligible project
- Construction or repair of culverts or retaining walls
- Costs for police details or municipal employee payroll
- Costs related to right of way acquisition or easements
- Projects which are on unaccepted roadways within MassDOT's road inventory

Unpaved Roads Grant Program Cont.



Selection Criteria

Projects will be evaluated for funding based on the following criteria

- Current condition of roadway as described through text and photos
- Frequency of closures due to seasonal weather or storm events
- Critical locations accessed via the roadway, such as housing, schools, or hospitals
- Impacts of road conditions or closures on residents, emergency responders, school bus routes, service providers or other critical users
- Demonstrated feasibility to complete the project within one construction season and within the proposed budget
- Demonstrated ability to secure any additional funding necessary for the project if the project budget exceeds the \$1 million grant maximum
- A municipality's designation as a rural and/or an underserved community

Application Information

- Applications will be accepted through the **Fully Integrated Application (FIA)** for the Unpaved Roads Program from November 6, 2025, to January 9, 2026.
- Only municipal officials may apply, and official municipal Grant Central accounts must be used.






New Fully Integrated Application (FIA)!

- You will no longer need to know which program best suits your project!
- Submit a FIA and MassDOT staff will assign your project to the most applicable grant program.
- New, simplified, and consistent application questions have been developed across all six programs.
- Design is now an eligible expense and construction grants have doubled across all FIA programs.
- Communities can now add an external user (Consultant, MPO or RPAs) to their application to assist with the application process
- Communities with active transportation projects no longer need to adopt a Complete Streets Policy & Prioritization Plan prior to submission. However, applicants that meet these criteria will receive additional consideration in the selection process.

Simpler Application Interface!

 Everything related to your grant applications – attachments, funding awards, funding reimbursements, and close out forms – is in one easy-to-access place!



Increased Grant Max and Eligibility



- **Design grants** now available up to \$150,000 through the Unpaved Roads, Complete Streets, and Shared Streets and Spaces programs.
 - MassDOT-led design consultants will continue to support communities in the Community Culvert, Local Bottleneck Reduction, and Municipal Small Bridge Programs.
- Construction Grants up to \$1,000,000 through all programs noted above.
 - A \$500,000 increase from the prior grant maximum!
- Equipment Grants up to \$250,000 through some programs.

Program Guidance

Updated guidance for each program are now available on Grant Central which reflect the above changes and help applicants prepare for success.


Grant Central: What's NOT Changing?



- Chapter 90 & Municipal Pavement Applications are not included in FIA
- The purpose of each individual grant program remains consistent
- Individual program requirements are still important to consider
- The grant administration process for awarded projects within & outside of Grant Central remains unchanged
- MassDOT-led design teams will still advance most design awards
- The same prequalification and procurement rules apply to all state funded transportation projects




The Fully Integrated Application (FIA)





After logging in as a registered user, start a FIA by Clicking Apply for a New Grant.

Alternatively, to apply for the Chapter 90 Program, **Click Apply for Chapter 90**. The application layout for Chapter 90 will be refreshed, but the rest of the application is the same.




Submitting a FIA



After clicking on Apply for New Grant, you will be taken to the FIA guidance page. Click Apply Now.

Then **complete each step** of the FIA by filling out all fields and **Clicking Next** to proceed. Some steps are populated based on the project type(s) selected in the beginning of the application because each grant program has criteria specific to its application process.



Quick Tip! Municipal users do not have to complete the geoprocessing step anymore!










When you've reached the end of the application, **check the box** and **type your name** to confirm you have read and agree to the terms. Then, **Click Submit.**










On the Application page, you will see a progress bar, the Application Details, Map, Attachments, Funding Awards, Funding Reimbursements, and Closeout Form.





What is a Brownfield?

 A property might be a "brownfield" due to potential contamination from past uses that is inhibiting continued use or reuse of the site.
 Brownfields are often concentrated in historically underserved communities.

Brownfield sites might include:

- Former gas stations
- Former industrial sites
- Former dry cleaners
- Old buildings
- Vacant lots
- Rail yards / corridors
- Historic mills or factories




ELIGIBLE ENTITIES FOR EPA GRANTS

- General Purpose Unit of Local Government
- Land Clearance Authority
- Government Entity Created by State Legislature
- Regional Council or group of General-Purpose Units of Local Government
- Redevelopment Agency that is chartered or otherwise sanctioned by a state
- State
- Federally recognized Indian tribe other than in Alaska
- Nonprofit organization described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code
- Qualified community development entity as defined in section 45D(c)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986

SUMMARY OF GRANT PROGRAMS FOR ASSESSMENT AND CLEANUP

Grant Type	Description
Assessment (CW/Coalition)	To develop inventory, characterize, and conduct assessments to determine if sites are contaminated (if so, to what extent), perform community involvement, and plan for cleanup
Cleanup	For eligible municipalities and nonprofits to clean up contaminated properties
Revolving Loan Fund	For larger organizations to capitalize funds for issuing cleanup loans and subgrants
Multipurpose	For a flexible range of planning, assessment, and cleanup activities within a certain target area

 - Applications due: January 28, 2026
 - National review period and panel discussions
 February-April 2026
 - Awards announced in (late) Spring 2026

STATE AND TRIBAL FUNDING

- Under CERCLA 128(a), EPA provides noncompetitive grants annually to states and tribes to operate and manage a Brownfields Program.
- This funding allows them to conduct the following brownfields activities:
 - Inventory of sites on state or tribal land
 - Oversee brownfields resources and enforce state/tribal authority
 - Provide opportunities for local stakeholders' meaningful participation in brownfields decisions
 - Approve site cleanup plans, and verify/certify that cleanup goals are completed




