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Task Force Charge

"The task force shall study the commonwealth's mosquito control process established under chapter 252 of the General Laws and this act and <u>recommend comprehensive reforms of</u> <u>the commonwealth's mosquito control system</u>"

Section 3 of Chapter 120 of the Acts of 2020



Developing Effective Recommendations

- Task Force Recommendations will be delivered to the legislature
 - Good recommendations will be actionable by the legislature.



Four Components of a Recommendation

Background – summarize the status quo and need for changes

Recommendation – be SMART

Rationale – explain why this is the recommended action

Legislative language (optional) – note what specific legislation should be changed and provide suggested legislative language





1. Background

- In 2-4 sentences, explain the status quo and problems
- Already understood in most cases – be brief

Example:

In 2014 the Massachusetts State Legislature amended the M.G.L. Ch. 61A program by allowing an exception for cranberry producers to still remain in the program even if they are not producing a crop. The 61A program stipulates that a minimum of \$500 must be produced each year to remain eligible. With many cranberry growers not producing a crop, this eligibility cannot be achieved. The law was amended to enable growers to stay in the program through 2017, even with no income generated from the sale of a crop.





2. SMART Recommendations

- Specific (recommendation articulates exactly what action(s) needs to be taken)
- Meaningful (rationale explains how recommendations will make a positive difference)
- Authority (recommendation identifies who has the authority to make changes)
- Realistic (recommendation can be implemented)
- Time bound (not controlled by MCTF)







- Recommendation articulates exactly what action(s) needs to be taken
- Be explicit not everyone shares the same background knowledge or assumptions
 - Instead of: "This policy should be implemented in areas of high arbovirus risk."
 - Try: "This policy should be implemented in areas with high risk for the current mosquito season, as determined by ..."





Meaningful

- **Rationale** explains how recommendation will make a positive difference
- Support the recommendation by describing how this will change onthe-ground practices or decisions, and expected benefits
 - Instead of: "Adopting this recommendation would fix a long-standing problem."
 - Try: "Implementing this recommendation will solve [specify problems] by increasing timely information available to the Commonwealth to use in its decisions if and when to apply pesticides."







- Recommendation identifies who has the authority to make changes
- Remember that the primary audience is the legislature.
- For policy and program recommendations, identify organizations, policies, and programs that would be involved in carrying out the recommendation.
 - Instead of: "The state should..."
 - Try: "The SRB should..."





Realistic

- Recommendations are clear and accompanied by a road-map describing how changes fit into Massachusetts's legal framework
- Realistic recommendations are more likely to be adopted.
 - Instead of: "Add members to all decision-making bodies"
 - Try: "Include representatives of [group] and [group] in these decisions"





Time bound

- As recommendations require further action by the legislature, establishing timelines in recommendations may not be needed in every case
- For recommendations associated with recurring events, specific, recurring deadlines could be beneficial
 - Instead of: "each year"
 - Try: "by the end of each fiscal year," or "within six months after the final spray event each year"
- Consider whether recommended changes should be permanent or temporary
 - If temporary what triggers return to the status quo, or what triggers continuing with the new approach?





3. Rationale

- Explain why this action is recommended
- Make the case for this action

Rationale for extending cranberry farmer support

• With the dire near term financial outlook for many growers, there will be cranberry farmers not growing a crop beyond the 2017 harvest.



4. Legislative or Regulatory Language

- Provide appropriate legislative language changes needed to carry out recommendation
- EEA/MDAR may be able to provide expertise/assistance

Example

The Task Force recommends that Ch 61A section 12 be amended to insure no conveyance or rollback tax shall be assessed if the land involved, or a lesser interest in that land, is acquired for a natural resource purpose by a federal agency
