We Keep People Healthy and Communities Strong Just a few of the ways we did that in 2024:

We make it safe to eat and drink in Massachusetts.



Investigated more than **900** cases and **50** outbreaks of food-borne illness

Issued warnings to protect people from harmful chemicals in fish they might eat from **40** rivers, ponds, and lakes

We ensure that your environment is healthy and safe.



Supported the investigation of **7,000** homes for lead paint and provided case management services for **500** families to eliminate risk of lead poisoning for children



With local health, tested over **16,000** water samples for bacteria at **1,100** beaches



Inspected over **1,000** X-ray, laser and mammography machines to protect patients and the public

We prevent injury, illness, and premature death.



Answered more than **72,800** calls on the 988/Suicide and Crisis Lifeline supporting individuals in emotional distress or suicidal crisis

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Performed over **360,000** lab tests for infectious illnesses, such as flu, measles, and HIV



Provided over **405,200** naloxone kits and **365,500** fentanyl test strips to community organizations to help prevent opioid-related overdose deaths

Assisted almost **41,400** children under age 3 with a developmental delay or risk of delay through early intervention services

Supported robust child vaccination
rates, with 94% of kindergarteners
meeting all vaccine requirements
for school entry



Provided WIC benefits to more than **205,300** pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding people and their children

Issued and maintained more than **443,500** licenses, registrations, and permits for health care personnel

Provided health support, including vaccinations, for families in the emergency shelter system
