Dear Early Education and Care Providers:

Following the FDA and the CDC's authorization of COVID-19 vaccinations for children from 6 months to 5 years old, we are writing to provide you with the latest information and to strongly encourage child care providers, schools, and local communities to take an active role in promoting and administering COVID-19 vaccinations for this age group.

It is our shared goal to promote the health and well-being of all children and support their ability to consistently remain in early childhood classrooms. Vaccines for children are an extremely important tool to help keep them healthy and achieve that goal. The COVID-19 vaccine has been shown to be <u>safe and effective in preventing severe illness and hospitalization</u>, and we are asking for your help to urge parents to get their youngest children vaccinated as the best way to protect themselves and our community.

We wanted to make you aware of opportunities and resources to achieve increased vaccination rates in younger children and offer some considerations in planning your approach.

Promotion and Parent Engagement

Now is a good time to engage with parents to encourage vaccination and provide resources and information. We suggest:

- Sending a tailored version of the attached template letter to all parents/guardians
- Posting information about vaccine locations, vaccine safety information, and helpful Q&As (available at <u>www.mass.gov/covidvaccine</u>) to your **websites and message boards**
- Meeting with parent groups or networks to discuss ways to reach a parent audience

Mobile Vaccination Clinics

• While many families will choose to have their young child vaccinated by their physician or health care provider, we are also making vaccination convenient and easy for busy families. As we did with schools, we are making it possible for child care providers to host on-site vaccination clinics once children 6 months to 5 years are eligible. Age-Specific Considerations

For 6 months to 5 years of age, there are a few considerations when planning outreach and vaccination:

- Pediatric Primary Care Providers are a good resource for parents in this age group for information and vaccination. Child care providers may want to consider partnering with local pediatricians to invite them to attend meetings or to sign onto communications.
- If holding a clinic, schedule immediately before or after drop-off times, in the evening, or on weekends to make it most convenient for busy families.

As we move forward together to increase COVID-19 vaccination in Massachusetts and encourage vaccination among this youngest age group, we welcome your support and involvement in these vaccination efforts. We continue to urge all school and child care staff and children to get vaccinated to protect themselves, their families, and our communities.

We appreciate your assistance to keep all of our faculty, staff, volunteers, and young children safe and healthy this fall and all year long.
