The Awarding Agency will enter into House Doctor contract(s) with selected firm(s) at its sole discretion, based on the Awarding Agency's needs. The Awarding Agency may award up to **five (5)** contracts, each with a maximum total value of **\$2,000,000** to qualified designers. Awarding Agency may assign a House Doctor with which it has signed a contract to perform individual project(s) of the type described in this advertisement directly for another Commonwealth entity.

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AWARDING AGENCY INFORMATION

Berkshire Community College (BCC) is a public, community college offering associate degree and certificate programs, as well as other educational opportunities, primarily to the residents of Berkshire County and surrounding areas. Founded in 1960, BCC was the first community college established by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In 1971, the college moved to its present location occupying 250,494 GSF in 9 buildings on a magnificent 180-acre site, 3.5 miles from the center of Pittsfield. Campus buildings are constructed of a concrete frame with block infill.

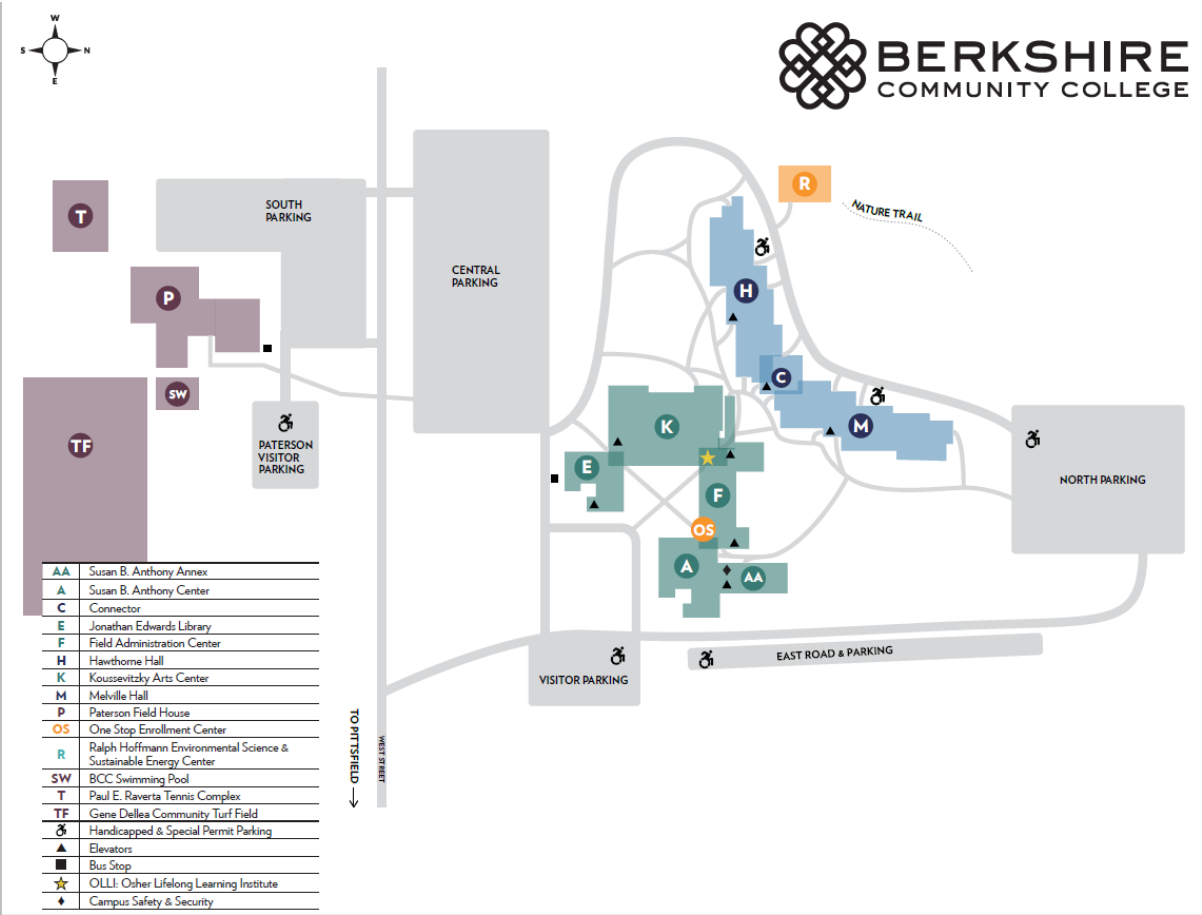
The campus was conceived and built as an integrated learning environment, complete with a large theater and swimming pool. It was designed by the noted architectural firm Benjamin Thompson & Associates and landscape architect Carol Johnson. The campus received an Award of Excellence from the American Institute of Architects Western Massachusetts chapter in 1974. It was designed with great care to relate to the existing landscape, capturing the surrounding views, while clustering programs around a central quad, with parking on the exterior of campus.

OVERVIEW AND SCOPE OF WORK

BCC is seeking architectural House Doctor services for repairs, renovations, additions or upgrades of existing buildings, rooms, systems, or site work up to a \$5,000,000 estimated construction cost. Projects will include feasibility and planning studies, cost analysis, design, preparation of bidding documents, bidding administration, project administration, asset identification for CAMIS, project close out, commissioning and other associated functions.

Services required may include, but are not limited to, architectural planning and design, interior design, code review, mechanical, HVAC, electrical, plumbing, and/or fire protection upgrades, as well as energy management systems and projects. Areas of work may include but are not limited to classrooms, lab spaces, library, offices, trade shops, public assembly spaces and other support spaces, in addition to building systems equipment, mechanical spaces, building envelope and site work projects.

The design team would be required to provide technical advice, creative problem solving, perform Massachusetts building code reviews, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Massachusetts Architectural Access Board (MAAB) compliance, Mass Historic submittals, certified study in the required format, complete study and design documentation, bidding documents and administration, construction administration and project oversight. Knowledge of the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance (DCAMM) Designer Procedure Manual¹ and effective schedule management and communication are also required. For each project, the selected team will be asked to prepare a scope of work, a fee estimate, and a proposed schedule for the project. After review and approval by the College, a notice to proceed will be issued to the House Doctor for each project.

Projects will be balanced against a backlog of deferred maintenance needs. All projects will have budgetary considerations. Projects may include, but are not limited to, relocating program occupants, upgrading academic or programmatic space in accordance with utilization studies and master plans, exterior envelope projects such as priority brick and masonry repairs, historic window replacements, roof replacements, upgrades or replacements of existing HVAC systems, electric systems, plumbing systems, conveying systems, utility and energy improvements, facility condition assessments, and site work with regulatory and deed restriction requirements.

The scope of work may include but is not limited to:

1. Investigating the nature and challenges or severity of the issues to be addressed under the task order.
2. Documenting existing conditions.
3. Recommending detailed repairs and magnitude of cost for such repairs, including energy costs, sustainability principles, expected remaining useful life of building systems and related life cycle costs.

4. Proposing alternate methods of repairs for resolution of the problem, including energy efficient alternatives.
5. Developing the preferred solution through schematic design and/or design development.
6. Preparing construction documents and specifications, cost estimates, and providing construction administration services.

If the selected House Doctor is appointed for final design, the general scope of services will be defined by the certified building study and the current version of the [DCAMM Designer Guidelines and Procedures Manual](#)² (dated May 2024).

APPLICATION EVALUATION

Applications will be evaluated based on the DSB criteria for selection of semi-finalists and finalist appearing on [the DSB Website](#).³ The application must include resumes for the consultants associated with the specific Personnel and Project Experience listed below. - The title “Architect” refers to design professionals that maintain a current registration with the Massachusetts Board of Registration of Architects; and
 - The title “Landscape Architect” refers to design professionals that maintain a current registration with the Massachusetts Board of Registration of Landscape Architects; and
 - The title “Engineer” refers to design professionals that maintain a current registration in any one of the engineering categories governed by the Massachusetts Board of Registration of Professional Engineers and of Land Surveyors; and

- The title “Environmental Professional” refers to design professionals with requisite experience in environmental consulting services, including but not limited to hazardous materials investigations, environmental site assessments, regulatory compliance, contamination assessment, remediation planning and oversight, environmental permitting, and related environmental health and safety services;
- The Title “Accessibility and Universal Design Consultant” refers to a professional consultant that can demonstrate requisite experience with inclusive or Universal Design strategies, existing conditions evaluation, and design review for state and federal accessibility requirements including the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and 521CMR.

Evaluation Factors

Applications will be evaluated based upon the requirements of M.G.L. C. 7C, § 49 and the work listed on DSB Application Form Sections 4 and 5 which illustrate current qualifications in the following areas:

•	The prime and their key team members demonstrate experience with designing fossil fuel free HVAC, low temperature hot water systems, and low carbon fuel systems including energy efficiency, climate resilience, Passive House principles, Net Zero buildings, and the reduction of embodied carbon. Teams should demonstrate the use of metrics to measure progress toward specific design goals. When needed, expertise can be augmented by specific additions to the team.
•	The House Doctor, through their Diversity Focus Statement (in Section 5), shall demonstrate their firm’s implementation of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) principles within its organization and within the design profession. The Statement shall: - document the firm’s track record for meeting /exceeding DEI goals, highlighting specific project examples; - summarize the firm’s approach toward assembling an inclusive team. Focus on the roles and responsibilities of diverse internal staff assigned and the SDO certified consultants. If two firms are partnering include the distribution of the work with the partnering firms; and - describe the prime design firm’s approach to DEI in terms of ownership, staffing, mentorship, equity in salary, and outreach efforts to broaden participation of underrepresented firms working on public projects.
•	Familiarity with current DCAMM certifiable study process, Massachusetts public procurement procedures, and expertise with ADA codes, NHPA Section 106 ⁴ , and NEPA ⁵ regulations are required.

- Demonstrated experience in developing studies and cost-effective solutions for deferred maintenance projects with complex MEP, HVAC, and exterior envelope repairs in occupied, higher education buildings of comparable age and condition.
- Demonstrated team experience in renovating occupied academic and administrative spaces to create flexible, cost-effective solutions within expedited schedules. Experience with accelerated study, design, and construction administration services for MA public agencies, institutions, or similar organizations is required. Prime firms in the western portion of the state are encouraged to apply.

Procurement Requirements

Procurement requirements for this public notice include, but are not limited to:

DCAMM Designer Guidelines and Procedures

The House Doctor must be familiar with the procedures established in [DCAMM’s Designer Guidelines and Procedures](#)⁶ which provides direction and guidance to Designers who work on DCAMM Projects.

The document is intended to set clear expectations, improve productivity, enhance communication, and ensure consistency to help Designers translate DCAMM requirements more efficiently into successful design solutions. Designers are expected to adhere to all applicable aspects of the Designer Guidelines and Procedures, including the following areas:

- **ENERGY, SUSTAINABILITY, AND CLIMATE ACTION**

Projects undertaken under this contract shall comply with the applicable requirements of [Executive Order 569 \(EO 569\)](#)⁷: Establishing an Integrated Climate Change Strategy for the Commonwealth, and [Executive Order 594 \(EO 594\)](#)⁸: Leading by Example – Decarbonizing and Minimizing Environmental Impacts of State Government, and are encouraged to apply embodied carbon reduction strategies.⁹ No building study shall be certified for final design unless all means, methods, and commitments required to mitigate the project’s impact on the environment, and the operating agency’s plan for meeting goals of the relevant Executive Orders are documented in the consensus solution, implementation plan and estimated construction cost.

- **BUILDING COMMISSIONING**

The Awarding Agency may include an independent third-party building commissioning agent as part of this project. The commissioning agent will develop in collaboration with the Awarding Agency an operations and maintenance plan as a reimbursable expense during the building commissioning

phase. The commissioning agent will meet with the Awarding Agency and the Designer's team during planning, design and construction to evaluate design proposals and make recommendations to ensure the maintainability and operational efficiency of the new building.

- **ACCESSIBILITY AND UNIVERSAL DESIGN**

The Designer's team is expected to utilize the [Goals of Universal Design](https://www.buffalo.edu/access/basics/universal-design/goals.html)¹⁰ and must comply, at a minimum, with 521 CMR, The Rules and Regulations of the [Architectural Access Board](https://www.mass.gov/orgs/architectural-access-board)¹¹ as well as the [2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design](https://www.ada.gov/law-and-regs/regulations/title-ii-2010-regulations/). The Designer's team is expected to understand and reflect in its design the civil rights obligations of the Commonwealth under [Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act](http://www.ada.gov/regs2010/titleII_2010/titleII_2010_regulations.htm)¹² to provide equal access to programs, services, activities and comply with ADA scope requirements for alteration of primary function areas, as applicable. as well as the [2010 ADA Standards for Accessible Design](https://www.mass.gov/info-details/deferred-maintenance). Deferred Maintenance Study Template

Study Format for DCAMM Certification

DCAMM strongly encourages House Doctors that are retained by the **Awarding Agency** to prepare Deferred Maintenance project documentation for certification to use DCAMM's Deferred Maintenance Study Template¹⁴ ([Deferred Maintenance | Mass.gov](https://www.mass.gov/info-details/deferred-maintenance)). The use of alternate formats or templates in the preparation and submission of a study for certification by DCAMM may result in the delay of study certification and in additional costs for the Awarding Authority.

In addition to the general project requirements found in the "Designer Guidelines and Procedures" and the "Deferred Maintenance Study Template" documents the Designer must also be familiar with the procedures, project requirements, and general conditions of this public notice including (but not limited to):

Workforce Goals (M.G.L. c. 149, s. 44A(2)(G))

Each state agency or state assisted design contract must include the participation goals of minority and women workers to be employed. These goals are consistent with Administrative Bulletin 14, are 15.3% for minorities and 6.9% for women. These goals shall not be construed as quotas or set asides but rather to be used to measure the progress of the Commonwealth's equal opportunity, non-discrimination and affirmative action program.

MBE/WBE Participation

The Commonwealth is committed to helping address the disparity in the participation of minorities and women in design. Along with the MBE and WBE participation goals which reflect ownership status set forth below, the DSB and the Awarding Agency are interested in learning about the applicant firm's approach and commitment to diversity in its HR policy, its overall business practices and in assembling this project team. Firms are encouraged to be creative in assembling their teams by considering dividing the work of a particular discipline, when appropriate, including work it would typically provide in house, partnering, offering opportunities to qualified firms with which it or its consultants have not previously worked or with firms that may have less experience working on public projects, and other means that provide additional opportunities for underrepresented firms in new ways and broadening the breadth of firms working on Awarding Agency projects.

Applicants, as the prime firm and team lead should include in their application, under Section 5, a Diversity Focus Statement directly addressing their approach to enhancing diversity and its commitment to broadening participation by actively engaging and including underrepresented subconsultants on their project teams.

In accordance with M.G.L. C.7C, §6 and Executive Orders 565 and 592, DCAMM has established minimum MBE and WBE participation goals of **5.4% MBE and 10.4% WBE** of the overall value of the study and final design contracts for this Contract.

Applicants must utilize both MBE and WBE firms whose participation meet these separate participation goals set for the Contract. The separate MBE and WBE participation goals must be met within the list of requested prime and sub-consultants and those MBE and WBE firms with which they team. MBE and WBE firms providing extra services, such as surveying or testing, can also contribute to the MBE and WBE participation on the project.

All applicants must indicate in their applications how it or its consultants will meet these goals and will be evaluated on that basis. Further information about the MBE and WBE participation program appears in the "Participation by Minority Owned Businesses and Woman Owned Businesses," in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Contract for House Doctor Services at Exhibit F, and a list of firms currently MBE or WBE certified appears on the [Supplier Diversity Office website](https://www.mass.gov/orgs/supplier-diversity-office-sdo).¹⁵

Applications from MBE and WBE firms as prime consultant are encouraged. Applicants that are themselves MBE or WBE certified may use their participation toward meeting the goal for the certification they hold and will be required to bring participation by additional firm(s) that holds the necessary Supplier Diversity Office certifications to meet or exceed the goals on this Contract. Applicants

are strongly encouraged to utilize multiple disciplines and firms to meet the MBE and WBE goals. Consultants to the prime can team within their disciplines in order to meet the MBE and WBE goals but must state this relationship in Section 5 of the application form. Please note that only firms that are currently Massachusetts Supplier Diversity Office certified as MBE or WBE can be credited toward meeting project MBE or WBE goals.

Additional Diversity Programs:

Veteran Owned Business Participation Goal – Ch. 108 of the Acts of 2012; Ch. 62 of the Acts of 2014

The Commonwealth promotes and monitors the participation of Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned and Veteran-Owned Business Enterprises (collectively “VBE”) on its design projects. The goal for VBE participation on DCAMM and other Executive Branch agencies design projects is 3% of the contract price. Please note that only firms that are currently Massachusetts Supplier Diversity Office certified can be credited toward meeting the project VBE goal.

In addition, the Commonwealth encourages the participation of Disability-Owned Business Enterprises (DOBEs) and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Business Enterprises (LGBTBEs) firms on its design projects.

Policies & Procedures

Environmental and Other Supplemental Services

Development of any hazardous materials assessments, specifications, and documents will be provided through the Environmental Professional team member identified above. The Awarding Agency reserves the right to obtain supplemental services through independent consultants who will collaborate with the Designer’s team. These supplemental services may include, but are not limited to, asbestos inspection and monitoring, and indoor air quality testing and monitoring.

Financial Statement

M.G.L. c. 7C, §51 requires that on public design contracts where the total design fee is expected to exceed \$30,000 and for the design of a project for which the estimated construction cost is expected to exceed \$300,000 the Designer shall:

- a) File its latest CPA or PA audited financial statement with DCAMM, and continue to do so annually throughout the term of the contract; and
- b) Submit a statement from a CPA or PA that states that they have examined management’s internal auditing controls and expresses their opinion regarding those controls to DCAMM.

Contract Requirements

DCAMM may elect to use a customized version of DCAMM's [Contract for House Doctor Services](https://www.mass.gov/doc/contract-for-house-doctor-services/download).¹⁶ A non-customized version is available at <https://www.mass.gov/doc/contract-for-house-doctor-services/download>

Applicants are advised that certain documents are required as a condition of contract execution, including, without limitation, evidence of professional liability insurance in an amount equal to the lesser of \$5,000,000 or 10% of the Project's Fixed Limit Construction Cost, but in no event less than \$250,000 per claim (i.e., minimum coverage of \$250,000 up to \$5,000,000 per claim depending on the construction cost). Evidence of pollution liability coverage in compliance with the Contract requirements may be carried by the Hazardous Materials Consultant identified above. All other coverage must be carried by the House Doctor.

Conditions for Application

Before a designer can apply for a project within DSB jurisdiction, they must file a written "disclosure statement" in accordance with M.G.L. c. 7C, § 48. The statement provides the basis for the DSB informational database and verifies that the designer meets certain general qualification and ownership requirements detailed in M.G.L. c. 7C, §§ 44 and 48. To help firms meet this requirement, the DSB provides an online registration system that can be accessed [here](https://dsb.formverse5.com/FORMVERSESERVER-DSB/WebApp/Login.aspx).¹³ Firms must register on this platform to submit the required disclosure statement; paper disclosure statement submissions are no longer accepted. As part of applying for a particular project, firms must verify that the information provided remains accurate and up-to-date or, if necessary, submit updated information.

No fewer than three (3) public agency evaluations and/or private sector references completed within the past five years are required to be submitted with the application. All evaluations and references should be submitted through the Designer Selection Network form for attachment to the application. The Designer Selection Board and Agencies reserve the right to check additional evaluations and references as part of the application review process.

In addition to the criteria described in the public notice, the Designer Selection Board will review the applications in pursuit of the principles described in [M.G.L. c. 7C, §44 \(a\)](https://malegislature.gov/Laws/GeneralLaws/PartI/TitleII/Chapter7C/Section44).¹⁷
