DCR-DWSP Deer Harvest Summary: 2024

The Department of Conservation, Division of Water Supply Protection (DWSP) manages 140,000-acres across the Quabbin, Ware River, Wachusett and Sudbury Watersheds. Forest health and tree regeneration are important land management goals for the Division because the forest acts as a biological filter for water quality. In response to high deer densities and deer impact on forest regeneration, DWSP opened watershed lands to deer hunting to restore and maintain balance in the forested ecosystem. These deer hunts are all regulated according to the Department of Fish and Game, Division of Fisheries and Wildlife's (MassWildlife) and DWSP's rules and regulations. Changes to the deer hunts may be applied annually based on an adaptive deer management approach. All 2024 hunts were the same as those implemented in 2023.

The following DWSP hunting zones were open in 2024:

- Quabbin Watershed:
 - Hardwick, New Salem, and Pelham Zones (two-week shotgun season deer hunts),
 - Prescott, Petersham and Quabbin Park Zones (two-day controlled deer hunts),
- Ware River watershed lands (all seasons)
- Wachusett Watershed lands (all seasons)
- Sudbury Watershed (all seasons)

Harvest data were reviewed and analyzed from the MassWildlife harvest database (MassFishHunt). All hunters are legally required to submit their harvest information in-person at a certified check station or online to MassWildlife. DWSP biologists review the data and based on information available a list of confirmed and possible (unconfirmed) harvests on watershed lands is compiled. Due to the nature of the analyses performed, the 2024 DWSP harvest totals must be displayed as a range of deer harvested in each hunting zone (exception: Prescott, Petersham and Quabbin Park Zones where an in-person check station was present). The harvest analysis provided the following summary (confirmed # – total possible #) for 2024:

Hardwick: 16-18 deer
New Salem: 12-22 deer
Pelham: 9-16 deer
Petersham: 59 deer
Prescott: 46 deer
Quabbin Park: 37 deer
Ware River: 3-65 deer

• Wachusett Watershed Lands, including Reservoir Zone (five-year permit): 6-114 deer

Sudbury: 13-26 deer

In total, there were 201 confirmed harvests across all DWSP lands in 2024 – an increase from 2023, reflecting continued interest and success in managing deer populations on our watershed lands. **The 2024 results by DWSP hunting area are further broken down in the table on the next page.**
