Dear Colleagues,

The Early Intervention Division is committed to providing high-quality research-based Part C/early intervention services designed to improve outcomes and results for infants, toddlers, and their families. This guidance is in direct response to questions surrounding the delivery of co-treatment services. The Early Intervention Division is issuing this guidance to clarify when co-treatment services may be provided and how they must be billed.

Definition and Requirements Regarding Co-Treatment

101 CMR 349: Rates for Early Intervention Program Services governs rates of payment to eligible providers for early intervention services. According to this regulation, the term “co-treatment” refers to a child visit or a center-based individual visit that involves two professional staff members and the client, the client’s caregiver, or both (p.2). By definition, co-treatment is allowable only when two early intervention service (EIS) providers render the same service to the same child or caregiver at the same time.

Reimbursement Policy Manual for Early Intervention and Autism Services

The Reimbursement Policy Manual for Early Intervention and Autism Services allows for co-treatment in home- and center-based visits no more than once per month billed by up to three different disciplined EIS Providers. The EIS providers performing the co-treatment must use service code T1015 for center-based individual visits or H2015 for visits to a child’s home, childcare center, or hospital.
