Let me comment quickly on 914387 and 931836. First off you'll see that 914387 is the catch-all for attempting to update the products manually. Please be very carefully when attempting to modify the registry. Also, seeing as we're fortunate enough to only operate in the Eastern Time Zone, you can ignore the need to add other time zones to the registry. Even though 931836 supersedes and replaces update 928388 but again, evaluate if you need to include other time zones before taking the steps outlined in 931836.

Microsoft Outlook

In January 2007, the Time Zone Data Update Tool for Microsoft® Office Outlook® (Time Zone Data Update Tool or "Outlook tool") is available from Microsoft Download Center. The Time Zone Data Update Tool can update calendar items in Outlook to accommodate the changes in DST during the extended DST period.

The Time Zone Data Update Tool is required to update calendar items that occur during the extended DST periods for the following versions of Microsoft Outlook:

- Microsoft Office Outlook 2007
- Microsoft Office Outlook 2003
- Microsoft Outlook 2002
- Microsoft Outlook 2000

Microsoft Office Outlook 2007 can automatically detect the DST change and prompt the process that updates a person's calendar to comply with the new daylight saving time rules. However, the Time Zone Data Update Tool contains enhancements that improve what is available in Outlook 2007 and should be run instead of the out-of-the-box Outlook 2007 experience.

The following table describes the situations in which you should download and run the Time Zone Data Update Tool.

Outlook 2007

Outlook 2003, Outlook 2002, Outlook 2000

You do not have to use the Time Zone Data Run the Time Zone Data Update Tool. Update Tool. However, we recommend that you

run the tool because it includes many improvements over the tool that is included in Outlook 2007.

In environments in which Microsoft Exchange Server is run, a special version of the Time Zone Data Update Tool may be used to update multiple Exchange mailboxes on the server. In environments in which Microsoft Exchange Server is run, a special version of the Time Zone Data Update Tool may be used to update multiple Exchange mailboxes on the server.

Note You do not have to run both the Outlook and Exchange Server versions of the Time Zone Data Update Tool. We encourage you to read all the documentation about each tool and then determine which tool will best suit your specific environment and needs.

The shift to daylight savings time occurs three weeks early this year, on Sunday March 11th. We have taken steps to remediate all servers, desktops, and applications to assure that everything runs smoothly on Monday.

However, there's no certainty that we have addressed every issue that may arise related to this time change. Microsoft Outlook is a particular area of concern. For example, it's possible that the meetings in your Outlook calendar may be off by one hour. To avoid any confusion during this three week period (March 11- April 1) we recommend that you:

1) Print your Outlook calendar before you leave Friday so that you have a reference for those three weeks.

2) Add the meeting start and end time to the subject field of all meetings and meeting invitations.

3) Reconfirm meeting times with external parties.

You may have to make manual changes in your Outlook calendar to reflect the correct times.
