- Other issues facing ash trees






EAB Impacts on Municipalities

- Removal costs
- Treatment costs








What Can You Do Now?

- <u>Educate</u> yourself on ash identification and signs and symptoms of EAB
 - Report suspected findings
- Monitor for signs and symptoms of EAB
 - Is pest monitoring part of your routine tree management?
- **Develop a plan** to respond

 Written document outlining objectives and approaches to address and mitigate the impact of EAB on the urban forest





1. Administration

- Who will be in charge of the response?
 - Tree warden, arborist, forester, landscape professional
- Coordinate with state and federal officials





2. Communication

- Brief public officials
- -Set a regular schedule for **informing** officials of the **status** of the infestation and response
- Keep the public informed



3. Inventory

- All public trees (and private trees that could impact public property)
- Only ash trees if time or resources do not allow a complete inventory
 - Know what is at stake
 - Estimate costs

4. Education & Outreach

- To residents and stakeholders
 - Newspaper, presentations, internet, meetings
- Volunteers
- Train town and municipal employees in EAB

5. Update or enact ordinances

- Infested/diseased trees or wood
- Limit movement of firewood
- Promote tree preservation
- Clarify actions for private trees that endanger the public
- Enact or modify ordinances to be broad enough to address future pests

 - Mulch, lumber, cogeneration
- Potential staging areas for processing
- Quarantine restrictions
- Train employees and businesses that utilize trees on proper handling of ash

Prioritize work

Response Scenarios

Remove and replace all ash

Remove some, treat some (to buy time for removal) Remove some, treat some to preserve; treat some to buy time until removal

Treat all trees

Other scenarios...



Considerations

- Cost
 - Treatment application \$3-\$10 per DBH inch (Central NY Estimate)
 - Removal can cost hundreds to over a thousand dollars
- Liability and safety
- Aesthetics / Benefits of trees





Chemical Treatment


- Healthy trees
- Trees with light infestation may not show signs
- Prioritize treatment
- When to start
 - 10-15 miles






Insecticides for Treatment

Replanting



- Replant non-ash
- Start planting now
- Improve diversity
- Use inventory
- 10-20-30 guideline
 - No more than
 - 10% of a species
 - 20% of a genus
 - 30% of a family




