Echoes of the Pocasset & the Falling River

Celebrate the rich history of the First People of Fall River and the Quequechan by exploring wayfinders along the river. This is a trailways initiative created by the Fall River Arts and Cultural Coalition and the City of Fall River, in partnership with the Pocasset Wampanoag Tribe.

Copies of these way finders will be on exhibit at Heritage Park through the Summer. Also enjoy our in-Lobby StoryWalk® which tells of the fate of the Quequechan.

StoryWalk®: Quequechan—the Forgotten River

From pristine waterway to industrial lifeblood. This is a story of nature, industry, neglect, and rebirth. This is a delightful inspirational book by Fall River native Jeanne L. Prevost, illustrated by Linda Crockett. Read along and learn as you look out our windows at the mouth of the Quequechan River.

Water + Granite + Gravity = Fall River
