
What's the Fire Risk in February?

Fire Data Based on MFIRS Reporting, February 2009 – 2018

- 7% of all fires throughout the year
- Average of 26 civilian injuries
- Average of 38 fire service injuries
- Average of 7 civilian deaths
- Average of \$23.6 million in dollars lost



There is a slight increase this month in cooking, electrical and smoking fires. On the average, heating fires have gone down this month, but only by 1%. Heating continues to be the second leading causes of fires in February.

Educational Opportunities

Burn Awareness week in February 2-8, 2020.

Burn Awareness Week is an opportunity to promote burn awareness and prevention in our communities. Scalds are the leading cause of burn injuries. In 2018, scalds caused 156, or 45% of the burn injuries reported to M-BIRS. Cooking liquids causes the majority of scald burns. Young children were the most frequent victims of scald burns. 46% of the 156 scald victims were under fire years old, and most were less than one year. Hot beverages posed the



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greatest risk to these young children. Open Burning

In 2018, 3,061 brush fires were reported to the Mass. Fire Incident Reporting System (MFIRS) causing one civilian death, two civilian injuries and two firefighter injuries. This is a 28% drop in brush fires from the 4,233 reported in 2017. Spring weather conditions drive the number of brush fires each year. The Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) limits open burning for public health and safety reasons, beginning January 15 through May 1.
