ABOUT THE FEDERAL FUNDS AND INFRASTRUCTURE OFFICE (FFIO)

Officially created by Executive Order No. 624, and tasked with implementing a whole-of-government to compete for federal funding by:



Identifying and tracking key federal funding opportunities and Massachusetts applications through the State Clearinghouse



Leading bi-weekly meetings of the interagency Advisory Council on Federal Funds and Infrastructure



Leading the Massachusetts Federal Funds Partnership and other meetings to support local governments in their applications for federal funding




Implementing the Federal Match legislation (Chapter 214 of the Acts of 2024)

SUCCESSFUL GRANT APPLICATIONS



\$156 million award through Solar for All program

The Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources (DOER), the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center (MassCEC), MassHousing, and the Boston Housing Authority were awarded \$156,120,000 for clean energy investments to up to 31,000 low-income and affordable homes from the EPA's Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund.



\$342 Million in Massachusetts Awards for Reconnecting Communities from USDOT

The U.S. Department of Transportation announced awards for the Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhood Grant Program. This includes \$335 million to replace the Allston Viaduct and create new and improved access to expanded waterfront parks and open space in Boston, as well awards for Haverhill, Lynn, Everett, Cambridge and Chelsea.



\$993 Million Award for the Cape Cod Bridges

\$993 million in funding from the USDOT's **Bridge Investment Program (BIP)** towards MassDOT's replacement of the Cape Cod Bridges. Adds to over \$700 million in existing federal funding for the project. Phase 1 of the project will begin with the replacement of the Sagamore Bridge.

SUCCESSFUL GRANT APPLICATIONS



\$175 Million for Rail Improvements in MA

MassDOT was awarded \$36,800,000 from the DOT-FRA Consolidated Rail infrastructure & Safety Improvements program. Funds will be used to advance West-East Rail, building on the \$108,000,000 award from last year. 2 other Massachusetts entities were also awarded over \$30,000,000.

SCHOOL BUS

\$147 Millions for Broadband

Massachusetts awarded over
\$147,000,000 from the National
Telecommunications and Information
Agency's Broadband, Equity, Access,
and Deployment program to expand
high speed internet access in unserved
and underserved locations in the state.



Clean School Bus Program

\$105 million to Massachusetts entities from the Environmental Protection Agency's Clean School Bus Program for low and zero emission school buses

SUCCESSFUL GRANT APPLICATIONS

\$450 Million Multi-State Award for Heat Pump Adoption

Massachusetts selected as part of a five-state coalition led by Connecticut that proposed a regional heat pump market transformation program called the New England Heat Pump Accelerator, funded under the competitive portion of the **EPA's Climate Pollution Reduction Grants**.





\$45 Million for Conservation in Massachusetts

Mass Audubon was awarded \$25,000,000 and EEA was awarded \$20,835,000 from the USDA Regional Conservation Partnership Program. Funds will be used to protect thousands of acres of land and boost climate resilience in Massachusetts.

\$472 Million for North Station Draw Bridge

The MBTA was awarded \$472,300,616 from USDOT as part of the Multimodal Project Discretionary Grant Program (MPDG). The project will allow for more train capacity, faster and more reliable rides, and increased safety on MBTA commuter rail and Amtrak trains.



FEDERAL FUNDING: BERKSHIRE WINS

\$4.67 Million (combined) to Berkshire Regional Transport Authority in Low or No Emissions Grant Program for replacing aging diesel buses with hybrid electric buses; replace the 20-year-old HVAC system at its intermodal transit centre in Pittsfield; and new hydraulic heavy duty vehicle repair lifts at its maintenance facility.





\$198,593 to BRPC and \$310,060 to Pittsfield in Safe Streets and Roads for All Planning Grants.

\$750,720 to North Adams in Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program for a Rural Planning Grant.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT ENGAGEMENT

MASSACHUSETTS FEDERAL FUNDS PARTNERSHIP

The Partnership provides key federal grant information to the local governments of MA.



- Provides grants for surface transportation infrastructure projects with significant local or regional impact.
- **Round 1:** DOT is reserving a portion of the \$1.5 billion for FY 2024 highly rated applications that were not selected for funding and designated FY 2024 Projects of Merit.
- Round 2: Remaining funds, including any additional FY 2025 appropriations that may be available, will support new projects.

About

 This grant can help address digital equity gaps in your community such as internet access, device access, and digital literacy. We're also happy to connect you with the Massachusetts Broadband Institute (MBI) who manage the state version of these funds if you have any questions.

PROTECT GRANT PROGRAM

Eligibility:

About

• The program "provides funding to ensure surface transportation resilience to natural hazards including climate change, sea level rise, flooding, extreme weather events, and other natural disasters through support of planning activities, resilience improvements, community resilience and evacuation routes, and at-risk coastal infrastructure."

Deadline: 2/24/2025

ENERGY IMPROVEMENTS IN RURAL OR REMOTE AREAS

Eligibility:

- Communities with 10,000 people or fewer
- **Tribes**, state, municipality, NGO, for profit, electric companies, labor unions, universities, etc.

Award Size: \$2-50 million

Cost Share: 5-50% depending on topic chosen

About

- Provides support for rural and remote communities to build clean energy projects that benefit their communities.
- 4 categories:
 - Open category
 - Dual use and co-location
 - Smaller scale community centered
 - Isolated microgrids and unelectrified buildings
- Total of \$400 million in funding available

Deadline: Concept Paper 2/27/2025

FEDERAL MATCHING FUNDS LEGISLATION

MASSACHUSETTS FEDERAL MATCH LEGISLATION

Matching Funds

- Unlocks up to \$750M for matching funds for federal programs
- Eligible entities, including RPA's can now apply for match via the <u>FFIO</u>
 <u>Match Request Form</u>
- Learn more on the new Massachusetts Matching Funds Website

Other Financial Assistance for Municipalities

- Allocates up to \$50M in the form of grants, loans, or other financial assistance, which may be directed to municipalities.
- Explore providing start-up capital for Direct Pay-eligible projects, etc.

Technical Assistance for Municipalities

- Allocates up to \$12M for technical support to munis for grant application development and implementation assistance for successful awards
- Leverage existing municipal outreach (partnership meetings, upcoming community tour, etc.) to understand municipal needs

MATCHING FUNDS PROCESS

Eligible applicants:

- State agencies
- Independent governmental state or public entities (quasis)
- Municipalities (cities and towns)
- Tribes
- Regional planning agencies (RPAs)
- Community development corporations (CDCs)
- Other development authorities or agencies
- Private entities (under review)

Application process:

- 1. Fill out Federal Matching Funds Form
- 2. Email supporting materials to fedfundsinfra@mass.gov
- 3. Questions on form or materials: reach out to Bob and Sam
- 4. If your agency works with munis on a federal program, have the muni who would be award recipient apply for match

Timeline:

- Three (3) weeks prior to federal application submission
- FFIO and ANF review on a rolling basis (for now)
- Still reviewing how to process retroactive requests

What is Direct Pay?

- The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) makes the largest investment in clean energy in United States history, and much of that investment is delivered via tax incentives.
- Under the IRA, tax-exempt and governmental entities such as municipalities- that
 do not owe Federal income taxes are, for the first time, able to receive a payment
 equal to the full value of tax credits for building qualifying clean energy projects or
 making qualifying investments. This is called Direct Pay (also known as Elective Pay).
- By filing a return and using Direct Pay, these entities can receive a cash refund from the IRS for certain clean energy projects.
- Under current law, Direct Pay lasts for a decade; it applies to projects put into service January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2032 creating a decade of tax opportunity to save money on necessary infrastructure replacements and upgrades.
- The overall potential of these tax credits is unlimited. In most cases, the Investment Tax Credit results in a refund equal to 30% of the project investment.

The Commonwealth's Approach to Direct Pay

Understand and execute the IRS filing process on behalf of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts



2. Based on that experience, provide actionable guidance and resources to cities, towns, and taxexempt orgs (TEOs)



3. Build strategy for incorporating tax credits into asset and facility planning for the state/TEOs



4. Develop new bridge lending/financing mechanisms for capital projects for municipalities

Energy investment tax credit (ITC)



Credit Amounts

- The most common credit is the Investment Tax Credit (ITC). The amount of the ITC is calculated as a base credit of 6% on the investment basis of the project.
- For the replacement of existing municipal vehicle fleets with new electric vehicles, entities can receive up to \$7,500 per light vehicle and up to \$40,000 per larger vehicle.

Some Basics on Bonuses

Please Note: Additional details apply

Low-income Communities

10-20% bonus

... if project is in a lowincome community with extra bonus if residential or econ benefit project

ITC only

Energy Communities

10% bonus

...if project is in historical "energy community" (i.e., closed coal mine, some brownfield sites)

Applies to both ITC tax basis and PTC rate

Prevailing Wage and Apprenticeship**

5x bonus

...if reqs for prevailing wages and registered apprentices are met

Applies to both ITC tax basis and PTC rate

Domestic Content* **

10% bonus

...if 100% of applicable steel and iron and an applicable share of 'manufactured products" produced in U.S.

Applies to both ITC tax basis and PTC rate

* - On December, 28, 2023, IRS issued new guidance on this rule for projects beginning in 2024 (see Notice 2024-9)

Next Steps for Elective Pay: 2024 Projects

1. Identify projects in the pipeline with in-service dates of 2024 or later:

- Build an internal team by working with financial advisors and counsel to confirm eligibility, gather documentation, address key questions.
- Complete pre-registration for each project in the IRS Pre-registration portal. This should be completed
 120 days prior to the tax filing deadline.
- File Tax Forms generally 4.5 months after the end of the tax period.
 - May 15th for calendar year filers and November 15th for fiscal year filers.


2. Inventory capital needs (new construction, retrofits or vehicles) over the next decade:

- Include tax credit value into real estate and vehicle fleet planning.
- Ensure architects, designers, and facilities managers are aware of tax credit opportunities.


3. Make a plan for how your municipality will get its share of refunds over the next decade.

2023 Massachusetts Projects

In July, ANF successfully registered more than 80 Direct Pay-eligible projects with the IRS, including:
