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About the Farmland Partnership Program (FPP)

Goal and Approach

The Massachusetts Farmland Partnership Program is a grant program to help implement the Farmland Action Plan at the local, regional or statewide level.

The goal of the Program is to build networks of partners who work together collaboratively and in coordination to protect farmland, enhance farm viability, and ensure access to farmland.

This is achieved by providing funding to eligible partners to work with farmers, farmland owners, agricultural service providers, municipalities and other organizations/entities to protect farmland, enhance farm viability, and ensure access to farmland.

The following are key characteristics of this program:

- Rooted in partnership and collaboration
- Fostering systems change
- Grounded in implementing tasks of the Farmland Action Plan
- Building capacity of partner organizations and staff
- Filling gaps between other funding programs and initiatives

Most of what is outlined in the Farmland Action Plan is there because there is something that needs to be done that hasn't been easy to address. This program is not about doing things the way they've always been done. Instead, it is about reaching to do more or changing how we do things.

2026-2027 Grants awarded and partners funded

In December 2025, MDAR announced the award of the FY2026 Farmland Partnership Projects which will be implemented over two years from 2026 – 2027. All projects must be completed by October 31, 2027.

A total of \$1.9 million in grants were awarded for individual projects and common activities.

- Seven groups were awarded grants which includes 19 partner organizations and over 80 people.
- 29 projects will be implementing 22 tasks

What is the Farmland Action Plan?

The Massachusetts Farmland Action Plan 2023-2050 (MFAP) is a long-range strategic initiative intended to guide actions to ensure that farmland and farming are available and viable for current and future generations in Massachusetts. It focuses on three overlapping goals to address challenges – protection, access and viability. This FPP Program Overview assumes a basic understanding of the MFAP and its implementation so far.

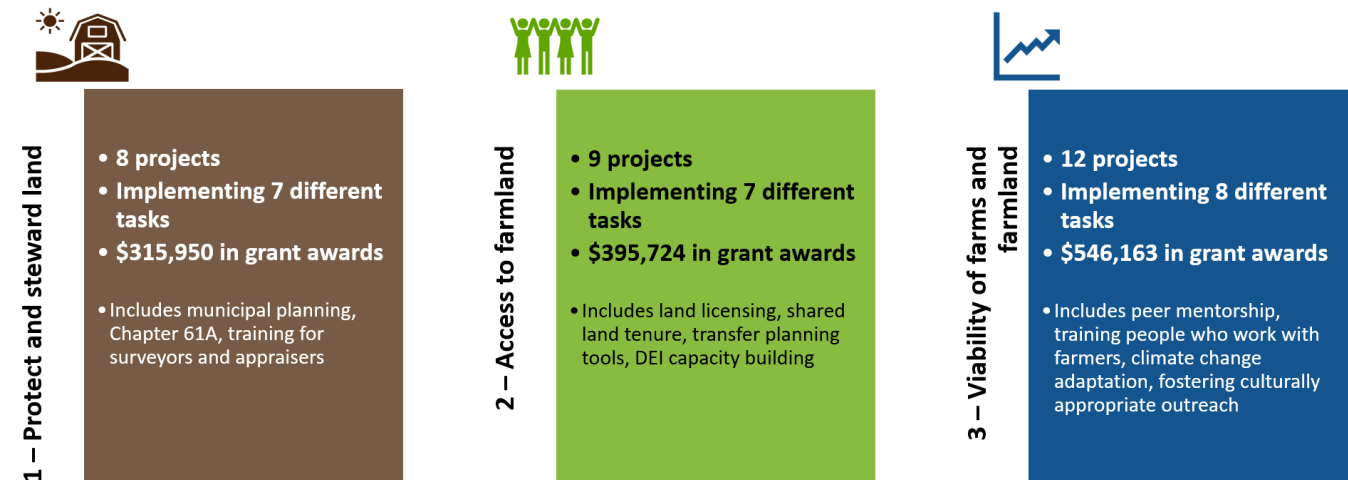

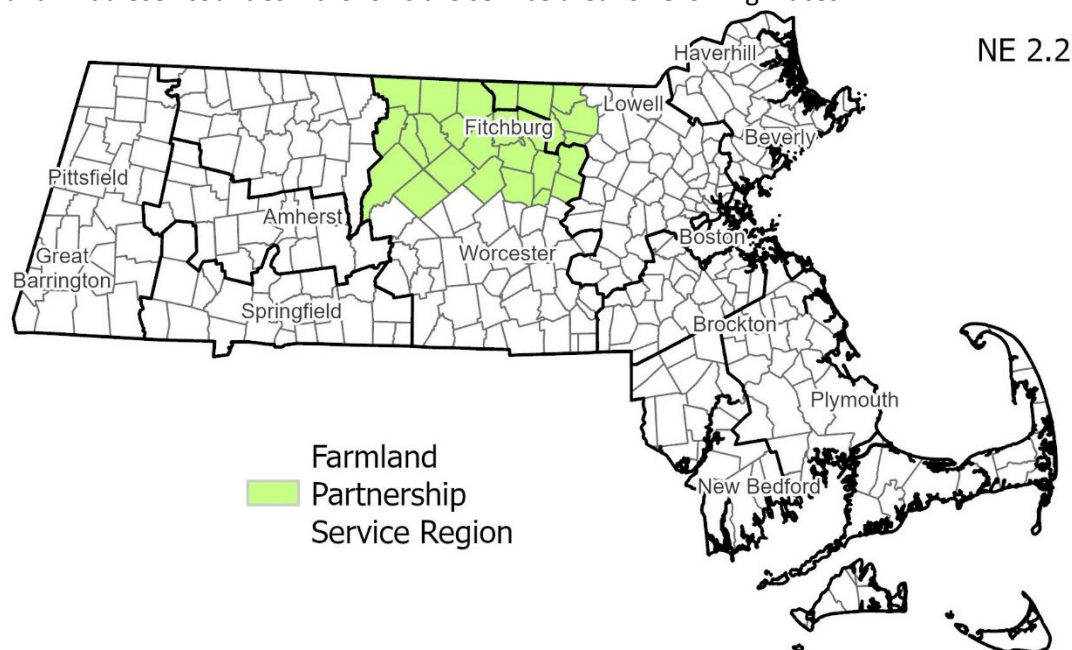
