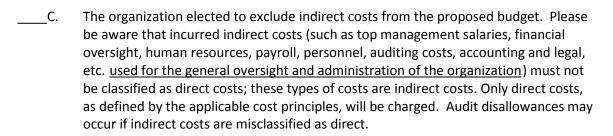

However, costs such as needs-related payments, stipends, subsistence allowances, and/or any monetary payment provided directly to participants for any service, must receive written prior approval from the Grant Officer.

This list of supportive services is not all-inclusive. Questions regarding whether any additional supportive service requires written prior approval should be directed to the Federal Project Officer assigned to the grant. As a reminder, if it is determined that prior approval is needed, the Grant Officer is the only official with the authority to provide written prior approval.

#### h. Pre-Award

Pre-award costs are those incurred prior to the effective date of the Federal award (2 CFR 200.458). The effective date of the award is the start date of the period of performance (2 CFR 200.209). All costs incurred by the recipient prior to the effective date specified in the award issued by the Department are *incurred at the recipient's own expense.* 

#### i. Reports

All ETA recipients are required to submit quarterly financial reports for each grant award.

A. Quarterly Financial Reports. All ETA recipients are required to report quarterly financial data on the ETA 9130. ETA 9130 reports are due no later than 45 calendar days after the end of each specified reporting quarter. Reporting quarter end dates are June 30, September 30, December 31, and March 31. A final financial closeout report is required to be submitted no later than 90 calendar days after the grant period of performance ends. ETA requires all grant recipients to submit the 9130 form electronically through an online reporting system. Expenditures are required to be reported on an accrual basis, cumulative from the beginning of the life of a grant, through the end of each reporting period.

#### j. Managing Subawards

Subaward means an award provided by a pass-through entity to a subrecipient for the subrecipient to carry out part of a Federal award received by the pass-through entity. It does not include payments to a contractor or payments to an individual that is a beneficiary of a Federal program. A subaward may be provided through any form of legal agreement, including an agreement that the pass-through entity considers a contract.

The provisions of the Terms and Conditions of this award will be applied to any subrecipient under this award. The Brockton Area Workforce Investment Board (BAWIB) became aware of several layoffs in their services areas, through Massachusetts Rapid Response. The local operator CareerWorks started working with RR and the affected workers and employers. The following companies are part of the layoffs in the Brockton service area: <a href="Dresser a subdivision of GE Oil(Dresser/GE Oil)">Dresser/GE Oil Oil(Dresser/GE Oil)</a> in Avon Massachusetts had a mass layoff starting in early April 2016. Although the company filed a WARN to the State Rapid Response Manager on February 8, 2016, some layoffs have occurred prior to the WARN. The grant operator CareerWorks has conducted outreach and provided services to members of the earlier group. Dresser/GE Oil also had temporary workers that were included in the TRADE certification 90166 & 90166a. <a href="New England art Publishers">New England art Publishers</a> issued a WARN in January 2016 which affected many employees in a complete shutdown of their facility in Abington starting early March 2016 through the end of May. This sudden influx of Dislocated Workers in the Brockton service delivery area overwhelmed the current capacity of the Career center staffing.

## Demographics/Barriers:

<u>Dresser/GE Oil</u>, has an experienced and well paid workforce with an average wage of \$26.00 per hour and an average tenure of 16 years, the average age is 48. 65% of the employees are male. Production employees are represented by the United Auto Workers union. The primary challenge will be replacing their hourly wage in the Brockton area. There are few union manufacturing facilities of that size in the area. The workforce at Dresser was older, therefore may need training in current technologies.

New England Art Publishers has a dramatically different demographic make-up. Most of the affected employees were women, about 70%. The average age is 50 with an average wage of \$17.00 per/hr. Several of the employees have been with the company for over 10 years. Significant barriers to employment include age and skill sets that are specific to the printing industry which is on the decline in the Brockton area. Additional barriers will include a lack of transferable skills as the printing industry in this area has dwindled over the past several years.

The above stated barriers will result in the need for skills upgrade or re-training for a portion of the employees in order to replace their previous wage. Dresser/GE Oil has been certified for TRADE 90166 and 90166a (temporary workers) and as such will follow all limits on cost and duration as specified by the TRADE program. Grant customers will have the flexibility to obtain more enhanced training that may be necessary for the populations from New England Art publishers. The principal occupation for which re-training is likely are; printing press operators, type setters, machine operators, general office workers and assemblers.

### **Employment Outlook:**

The unemployment rate in the Brockton area currently stands at 4.5%. However according to the Massachusetts Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development the short term Industry projections for both Manufacturing and Printing and related industries in the Brockton

Workforce Investment area are expected to decline in the next two years. Manufacturing -2.4% and Printing and Related Support Activities -8.9%. Areas of growth in the Brockton area continue to be the medical field as well as transportation and warehousing.

# Participant Recruitment:

CareerWorks will conduct outreach to potential participants upon receipt of the Rapid Response layoff referral notice. Career Center staff may accompany the Rapid Response team to future orientations to provide a name and face at the center after layoff. Customers will be provided the opportunity for UI claims to be taken in person at CareerWorks the week following their layoff. Job seekers interested in job search only will be introduced to the Job Ready team to review job leads and potential OJT opportunities. Letters will be sent to former employees in both English and Portuguese. Letters will be followed up with phone calls and email when available.

# **Career Center Specific:**

An outreach plan: Staff from the CareerWorks will be on site with the Rapid Response Team to make appointments for affected workers to come in to the career center the week following their layoff to file for unemployment insurance and in the case of Dresser/GE Oil complete their TRADE form 1666. While at the career center customers will be provided an appointment to attend the career center seminar where they will complete a career action plan and register on Mass Job Quest. Anyone who does not attend either of those sessions will be sent an outreach letter inviting them to contact the center to make an appointment. In the event an e-mail address has been obtained the center will also send the letter via email. An outreach phone call will also be placed to affected workers of each company to remind them of the services and to invite them to the career center.

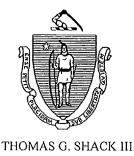
<u>A Service plan:</u> Services planned for employees covered in this proposal include the following: assessment, completing the individual TRADE application, Filing for Unemployment Insurance, Completing a career action plan, Job search workshops, skills training, job development and job placement.

<u>Career Center Services</u>: Career Center staff will help dislocated workers in the preparation of a career action plan (CAP) and registration on Mass Job quest for job matching purposes. When training is deemed necessary, staff will follow standard operating procedures for both local and TRADE to execute contacts in order for customers to attend appropriate training program. Project staff will work with customers to ensure job readiness through workshops including resume assistance, interview training, applying on line, and creating a personal employment plan using TORQ.

<u>Job Placement Strategy:</u> Job search activities will include attending necessary workshops and training to ensure that participants are job ready. Business Service Representative (BSR) will target industries and jobs based on skill sets of customers for those looking to transition skills into another job and for those who complete training and have new skill sets. Job matching will be conducted by both the vocational counselor and the CareerWorks job ready team.

The rate was negotiated in accordance with OMB Circular A-87 and with regulations promulgated by the Secretary of Administration and Finance under Administrative Bulletin #5(A&F5), dated May 1, 2008, entitled *Fringe Benefits, Payroll Taxes and Indirect Costs*.

The automated indirect cost recovery program used to assess EOL's Federal grants and other non-budgetary accounts will reflect the FY2016 rate of 3.67% of salaries (subsidiary AA object codes) beginning with the closing of Period 01 (July), BFY2016.

- A. <u>LIMITATIONS</u>: Use of the rate(s) contained in this agreement is subject to any statutory or administrative limitations and is applicable to a given grant or contract only to the extent that funds are available. Acceptance of the rate(s) agreed to herein is predicated upon the conditions:
- (1) that no costs other than those incurred by the grantee/contractor or allocated to the grantee/contractor via an approved central service cost allocation plan were included in its indirect cost pool as finally accepted and that such incurred costs are legal obligations of the grantee/contractor and allowable under the governing cost principles;
- (2) that the same costs that have been treated as indirect costs have not been claimed as direct costs;
- (3) that similar types of costs have been accorded consistent treatment, and
- (4) that the information provided by the grantee/contractor which was used as a basis for acceptance of the rate(s) agreed to herein is not subsequently found to be materially inaccurate.

The elements of indirect cost and the type of distribution base(s) used in computing provisional rates are subject to revision when final rates are negotiated. Also, the rates cited in this Agreement are subject to audit.

- B. <u>CHANGES</u>: The grantee/contractor is required to provide written notification to the indirect cost negotiator <u>prior to</u> implementing any changes which could affect the applicability of the approved rates. Changes in the indirect cost recovery plan, which may result from changes such as the method of accounting or organizational structure, require the <u>prior written approval</u> of the Division of Cost Determination (DCD). Failure to obtain such prior written approval may result in cost disallowance.
- C. <u>FIXED RATE(S)</u>: Any fixed rate contained in this agreement is based on an estimate of the cost which will be incurred during the period for which the rate applies. When the actual costs for such period have been determined, an adjustment will be made in the negotiation following such determination, to compensate for the difference between the cost used to establish the fixed rate and that which would have been used were the actual costs known at the time.
- **D.** <u>NOTIFICATION TO FEDERAL AGENCIES</u>: A copy of this document is to be provided by this organization to other Federal funding sources as a means of notifying them of the Agreement contained herein.

#### E. SPECIAL REMARKS:
