

1987 – Granite Building Study

2000 – Design for separate museum building underway

2001/02 - New exhibit design development in existing Visitors

Center (VC)

2002 - 04 – New Plan: Design for VC renovation and another new exhibit development





2003 2009



Recent History

2014 – Friends receive DCR Partnership Grant

2015 – Conditions Assessment of VC, start of exhibit design; massive mold bloom

2016 – VC renovation plans - roof prioritized

2017 – Rest of VC renovation and exhibit designs underway





SITE ANALYSIS / OBSERVATIONS

AN ABUNDANCE OF DIFFERENT/DISCONNECTED CHARACTER ZONES CREATS A CLUTTERED AND CONFUSING ENTRY

EVERGREEN SCREEN IS FAILING IN THE WET PARKING LOT EDGE CONDIDITIONS, VEGETATION CONDIDITIONS, VEGETATION CONDIDITIONS, VEGETATION RESIDENTIAL PLANTS, NOT APPROPRIATE FOR A STATE PARK.

THIS "FRIEND'S" DESIRE LINE IS USED

FREQUENTLY BUT NOT MARKED ON ANY MAP OR MAINTAINED.

QUARRY REMAINS ARE HIDDEN BY DENSE UNDERGROWTH IN THE 4 SUMMER, NO PROPER ACCESSIBLE PATH OR TRAIL PROVIDED AND NO INTERPRETIVE SIGNAGE.

THERE IS NO SIGHT LINE FROM THE MAIN TRAIL TO THE VISITOR CENTER-THIS IS A CRITICAL POINT FOR SIGNAGE AND CLEARING.

THIS CLEARING IS CONFUSING TO VISITORS COMING UP GAFFELD AVE. IT IS TOO OPEN TO THE ROAD AND APPEARS AS THE MAIN DESTINATION.

VISITOR CENTER IS CONFUSING TO NAVIGATE, WITH THE DOOR IN THE # BACK MORE DIRECTION IS NECESSARY. THE SPACE IS LACKING IN AREAS FOR GROUPS TO GATHER.

THE EDGE BETWEEN SCRUB AND CLEARING IS NOT DEFINED, SCRUBBY FOREST IS PREDOMINANTLY VOLUNTEERS AND INVASIVES, SOME ROUGH CLEARING ATTEMPTS MADE THEN STOPPED.

TRAILS SYSTEM IS LACKING A

CONNECTOR TRAIL TO COMPLETE THE
CIRCUT AROUND THE QUARRY.

PROPOSED CHARACTER MODIFICATIONS

- WELCOME THRESHOLD CREATES AN EXPERIENCE FOR VISITORS THAT MAKES IT KNOWN THAT THEY ARE ENTERING THE PARK, SINGLE LANDSCAPE CHARACTER ESTABLISHED ON BOTH SIDES OF THE ROAD.
- REORGANIZED CIRCULATION, PARKING AND SIGNAGE CREATE A CLEAR ARRIVAL, EASY TO NAVIGATE TRAILHEAD AND GATHERING SPACE.
- NEW TRAILS ARE DELINEATED TO BRING MORE AWARENESS TO SIGNIFICANT SITE FEATURES AND PROVIDE CONNECTIVITY.
- QUARRY REMAINS WITH SELEVITIVE CLEARING OF UNDERSTORY TO REVEAL VIEWS TO FEATURES, NEW TRAILS AND SIGNAGE LEAD VISITORS TO IMPORTANT SITE FEATURES.
- THE MAIN TRAIL BREAKS AT A SINGLE POINT WITH SIGNAGE DIRECTING VISITORS TO A TRAIL OR TO THE VISITOR CENTER VISIBLE THROUGH THE ORCHARD EDGE CONDITIONS
- ORCHARD EDGE LINES THE DRIVE TO THE VISITOR CENTER. HICING THE © CLEARING WHILE DIRECTING THE VEHICLES AND PEDESTRIANS TOWARDS THE VISITORS CENTER FIRST.
- VISITOR CENTER IS CLEARLY DEFINED.
 THE ENTRY IS EASY TO ACCESS AND
 GATHERING SPACE IS CREATED.
- VIEWSHED FROM THE VISITOR CENTER IS CLEARLY DEFINED AND ALLOWS FOR IPANORAMIC VIEWS. OPEN LAWN MAINTAINED TO ALLOW FOR LARGER GATHERING AND SMALL GROUPS.
- THE PATH CONNECTION IS CREATED COMPLETING THE CIRCUT AROUND THE
 QUARRY, THIS SECTION OF TRAIL TO BE
 "MODERATE" AND MARKED
 ACCORDINGLY.
- MARITIME SHRUBLAND IS A SUSTAINABLE LANDSCAPE IN THESE CONDITIONS - CLEAR OUT INVASIVES ONLY.
- OVERFLOW PARKING SPACES AVAILIBLE BY MOWING THE UPPER SECTION OF THE MEADOW.




