# HER and HEAR Federal IRA Home Rebates Overview for Public Input:

March 1, 2024



- Massachusetts is allotted \$146 million by the Department of Energy (DOE) from the Inflation Reduction Act over multiple years:
  - > Home Efficiency Rebates (HER) \$73.2 million
    - Previously called "HOMES"
  - > Home Electrification Appliance Rebates (HEAR) \$72.8 million
    - Previously called "HEEHRA"
- State Offices have until January 2025 to develop a plan for these funds and request funding – DOER plans to apply this Spring
- DOE asks DOER to prioritize at least 41% of funds to low-and-moderate income residents for HER and HEAR
  - > This aligns with DOER's equity goals
- DOE also requires that at least \$11.68 million of HER and HEAR funds must go to low-and-moderate income *multi-family building* residents



## DOER's Approach to HER and HEAR

#### Equity

- Healey/Driscoll Administration's equity goals and commitments support DOE directives
- HER+HEAR funds are maximized for residents under 80% Area Median Income

#### Enhance and Supplement MassSave and MLP

- HER+HEAR funds are a small % compared to Mass Save<sup>®</sup> budget
- Supplement growing investment in electrification through MLP & Mass Save® offerings

#### Market Transformation

- Continue Massachusetts' leadership on efficiency and electrification
- HER+HEAR can be deployed as a targeted intervention





### Summary of DOER Proposed Programs

### Municipal Light Plant Program

• Approximately \$22 million in HER funds

# Affordable Housing Decarbonization

• Approximately \$50 million in HER Funds Moderate Income Program Enhancement

• Full \$72.8 million from HEAR

- DOER, as the State Energy office, will be the lead in running HER and HEAR programs. Partners include Mass Save<sup>®</sup>, MassHousing, and MLPs
- DOER is proposing the above three programs for HER and HEAR funding. Programs and budgets can be refined throughout implementation period. DOER may seek additional stakeholder feedback to complete that refinement
- A focus on leveraging existing Commonwealth and Federal opportunities like Mass Save<sup>®</sup> instead of stand-alone direct point-of-sale rebate
- Roll out beginning in Fall 2024



# **HER Summary:** Home Efficiency \$73.2 Million

DOE Requirements for State Energy Office Program Design

Provide rebates for showing home energy savings vs. prior year from energy efficiency improvements, e.g., insulation, heating, etc.

#### Table 1: Maximum HER rebate levels per household:

| Income level  | Energy Savings > 20% | Energy Savings > 35% |
|---|----------------------|----------------------|
| Household with income >80%<br>Area Median income    | \$2,000              | \$4,000              |
| Household with income <80% of<br>Area Median Income | \$4,000              | \$8,000              |

- Existing homes only need to show historical energy use
- Requires utility-bill-calibrated home energy assessment
- Requires dedicated pool of qualified contractors
- > Option to increase rebates for <80% AMI households



# **DOER Program Proposal: HER**

Support delivered fuel customers in MLP communities and affordable housing deep energy retrofits

#### Affordable Housing Decarbonization Grants

- Expand existing DOER grant program by funding additional measures
- Target decarbonization in existing income restricted multi-family units
- Leverage multiple funding sources outside of HER
- Exceed maximum rebate by DOE to target greater energy savings for low-income units

#### Municipal Lights Plants (MLPs)

- Sustainable home electrification with a focus on heat pumps
- Assist the approximate 15% of Commonwealth without access to Mass Save<sup>®</sup>
- Leverage matching funds from MLPs and RGGI
- Pair with a DOER funded financing package much like the Mass Save<sup>®</sup> Heat Loan for MLPs



### DOER's Affordable Housing Decarbonization Program



The Boston Housing Authority will retrofit 159 affordable units at the Mildred C. Hailey apartments in Jamaica Plain with the grant money. (Courtesy of the Boston Housing Authority)



The Allston Brighton Community Development Corporation will retrofit and decarbonize 33 apartments on Carol Avenue in Brighton. (Courtesy of the Allston Brighton Community Development Corporation)

- In 2023 DOER established a \$50 million grant program for the retrofit of affordable housing
- HER Funds used for retrofitting existing affordable housing;
  - Deep energy retrofit and efficiency upgrades
  - > Building system electrification
  - > Onsite renewable generation
- To date, DOER has awarded 10 decarbonization retrofit projects \$27.35 million in funding, representing more than 700 affordable housing units
- Funds from HER would be utilized to expand this opportunity to more affordable housing decarbonization projects across Massachusetts, fill funding gaps and expand the measures covered

### Municipal Light Plants - \$22m in HER funding + \$9.8m match



- The Commonwealth's 40 Municipal Lights Plants (MLPs) do not currently offer the full breadth of home efficiency programs as Mass Save<sup>®</sup>
- DOER is proposing HER funds to be used to assist MLP customers;
  - Target moderate income residents with whole home heat pump incentives
    - Matching funds from MLPs
    - Co-fund 'concierge' support for homeowners to pick contractors/scope
  - Low interest to 0% financing product, supported much like the Mass Save<sup>®</sup> HEAT Loan
    - Matching funds from DOER and Federal loan fund
    - Financing would be available for a variety of energyefficient upgrades—including insulation, heat pumps, and potentially more.

# **DOER Program Proposal: HEAR**



- For each measure, moderate income customers will be offered either HEAR or Mass Save rebates to maximize incentivizes
- Use federal funds to expand electrification scope for moderate income Mass Save customers with focus on panel and wiring upgrades to help expand electrification potential
- Program Administrators would disburse to optimize participation by moderate income customers
- Would increase the Commonwealth's total spend on energy efficiency for moderate income customers

#### DOE Requirements for State Energy Office for Justice 40

Within the Justice40 section of the Community Benefits Plan, States must provide an overview of benefits to disadvantaged communities that the home efficiency rebates can deliver, supported by measurable milestones. The MA program must include:

- 1. The Commonwealth's definition of disadvantaged communities
- 2. The Commonwealth's method of encouraging delivery of home efficiency rebates to disadvantaged communities
- 3. A description of how the Commonwealth will ensure that applicable benefits flow to disadvantaged communities

DOER will be seeking to apply our existing definitions of <u>environmental justice populations</u> and gateway cities

The foundation for the DOER program design is to leverage existing programs that have an established track-record of securing measurable benefits for disadvantaged communities

DOER is developing a Community Benefits Plans that will:

- Leverage community group input through the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs: Justice40 and Equitable Investments Working Group
- Coordinate with existing equity programs such as Mass Save<sup>®</sup>, the Mass Save stakeholders, and the federally-funded State-Based Home Energy Efficiency Contractor Training Grant Program (TREC)
- Collect meaningful data and metrics that demonstrate energy savings for disadvantaged communities, leveraging existing experience in energy assessments and building energy reporting

We anticipate a launch of the HER/HEAR programming sometime in the Fall of 2024.

DOER is seeking public input on this proposal before submitting our application to DOE. DOER plans to submit the initial HER and HEAR application in late April. A further planning blueprint will be submitted over the summer.
