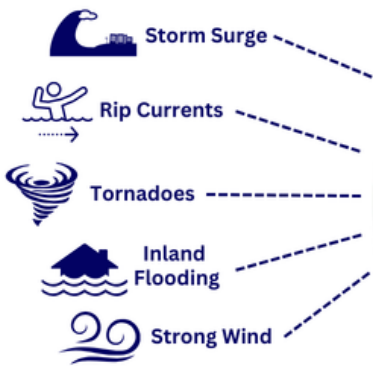
HOW TO USE THIS TOOLKIT

Why prepare?



Hurricanes have the power to cause widespread devastation, and can affect both coastal and inland areas. Threats from hurricanes include:

- Storm surge
- High winds
- Heavy rainfall
- Inland flooding
- Tornadoes
- Rip currents

Although the Atlantic hurricane season is officially June 1 through November 30, the most active time for these storms in Massachusetts is late August through September.

ACCESS AND FUNCTIONAL NEEDS: REACHING INDIVIDUALS WHO MAY HAVE INCREASED RISK

Remember everyone's needs!

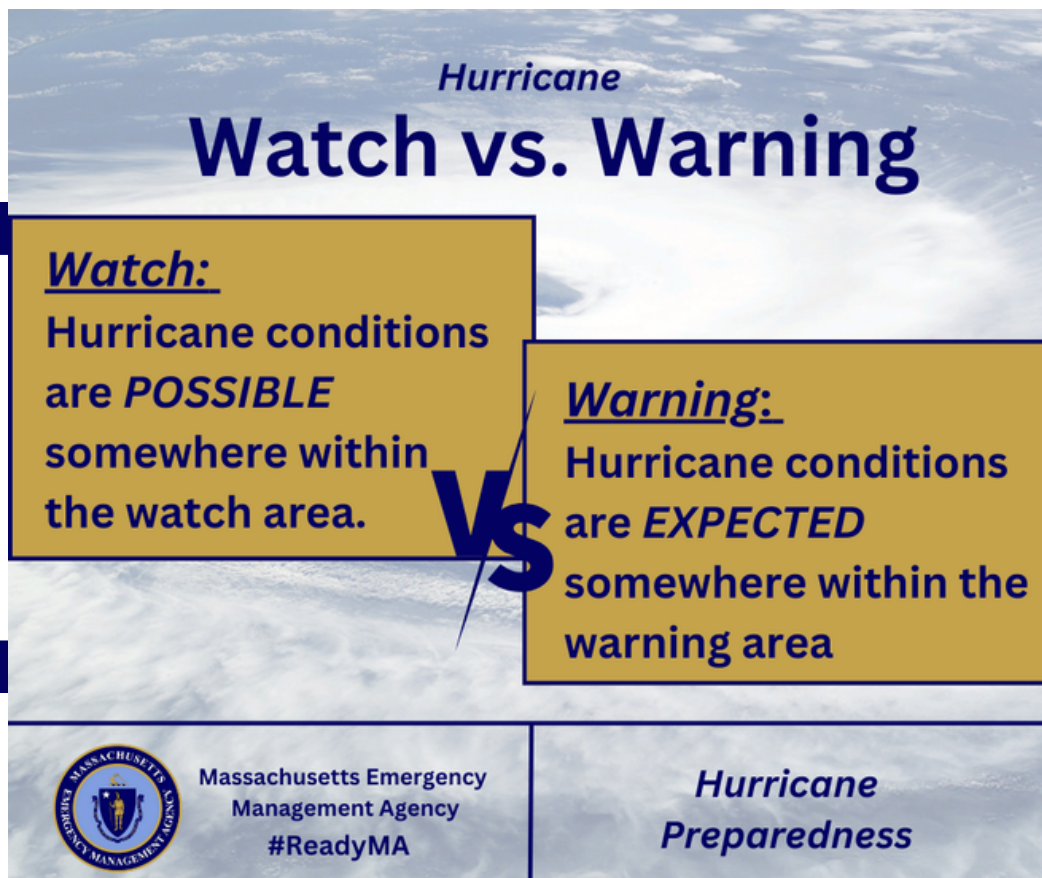
- Language Access: MEMA has both physical and digital copies of general disaster preparedness flyers translated in seven languages, which are available here: [Remember everyone's needs!](#).
- Access & Functional Needs: Be sure to include alternative text for your graphics on social media, and consider that not everyone in your community uses social media. Reaching individuals with access and functional needs is especially important since this population may need to take extra steps to ensure they are prepared for emergencies. Consider reaching out to or posting summer preparedness messaging within the following: places of worship, senior/community centers, housing authorities, public transportation (i.e. bus shelters).

KEY MESSAGING POINTS

HURRICANE WATCH VS. WARNING

- Know what Hurricane terms mean:
- **Hurricane Watch** = hurricane conditions (sustained winds >74 MPH) possible within 48 hours - be prepared!
- **Hurricane Warning** = hurricane conditions expected within 36 hours - take action!

KEY MESSAGING POINTS

BEFORE A HURRICANE

- Be informed by receiving alerts, warnings, and public safety information before, during, and after emergencies.
- Know your risk: Explore the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) flood maps to find out whether your home is located in a flood zone.
- Utilize your local resources:
 - Contact your local Emergency Management Director to find out if your home or workplace is at risk of flooding.
- Create and review your family emergency plan.
 - Have a plan to go to higher ground quickly if necessary.
 - Create an evacuation plan.
- Assemble an emergency kit.
- Document your personal property by taking pictures and saving them in a safe place.
- Prepare your home for flooding.
 - Reduce potential property damage by elevating utilities and installing sewer backflow valves.
 - Use flood damage resistant materials.
- Consider flood insurance: **Flood losses are not typically covered under renter and homeowner's insurance policies. Consider purchasing flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Flood insurance is available in most communities whether or not your building is in a flood-prone area, but there is a 30-day waiting period before it goes into effect.**



KEY MESSAGING POINTS

When a Hurricane or Tropical Storm Is Approaching

- Listen to a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio or to a local news station for the latest information.
- Review your family emergency plan.
- If you live or work in a flood zone or in an area that is prone to flooding, be ready to evacuate.
- If you are not in an area prone to flooding and planning on riding out the storm at home, gather adequate supplies in case you lose power and water for several days and you are unable to leave.
- Prepare for power outages by charging cell phones and electronics and setting your refrigerator and freezer to their coldest settings. If you use electricity to get well water, fill your bathtub with water to use for flushing toilets.
- Keep your car's gas tank full. Pumps at gas stations may not work during a power outage.
- Prepare your home.
- Secure or bring in outdoor objects (patio furniture, children's toys, trash cans, etc.) that could be swept away or damaged during strong winds or flooding.
- Clear clogged rain gutters to allow water to flow away from your home.
- If damaging winds are expected, cover all of your windows. If you don't have storm shutters, board up windows with 5/8" exterior-grade or marine plywood.
- Go Tapeless! Taping windows wastes preparation time, does not stop windows from breaking in a hurricane, and does not make cleanup easier. In fact, taping windows may create larger shards of glass that can cause serious injuries.
- Turn off propane tanks if you are not using them.
- Prepare for flooding by elevating items in your basement, checking your sump pump, unplugging sensitive electronic equipment, clearing nearby catch basins, and parking vehicles in areas not prone to flooding.

KEY MESSAGING POINTS

When a Hurricane or Tropical Storm Is Approaching

- If instructed, turn off your gas and electricity at the main switch or valve.
- If you have a boat, remove it from the water. If you cannot, prepare your boat for the storm to reduce damage.

During a Hurricane

- Avoid driving or going outdoors during a storm. Flooding and damaging winds can make traveling dangerous.
- If you must be out in the storm:
- Do not walk through flowing water. Six inches of swiftly moving water can knock you off of your feet.
- Remember the phrase “Turn Around, Don’t Drown!” Don’t drive through flooded roads. Cars can be swept away in just two feet of moving water. If your vehicle is trapped in rapidly moving water, stay in the vehicle. If the water is rising inside the vehicle, seek refuge on the roof.
- Do not drive around road barriers.
- Continue to monitor media for emergency information.
- Follow instructions from public safety officials.
- If advised to evacuate, do so immediately. Take only essential items, and bring your pets if possible.
- If told to shelter in place:
- Stay indoors and away from windows.
- Listen to local television or radio for updates.
- Conditions may change quickly; be prepared to evacuate to a shelter or neighbor’s home if necessary.

KEY MESSAGING POINTS

After a Hurricane

- Continue to monitor the media for emergency information.
- Follow instructions from public safety officials.
- Call 9-1-1 to report emergencies, including downed power lines and gas leaks.
- Call 2-1-1 to obtain shelter locations and other disaster information.
- Stay away from downed utility wires. Always assume a downed power line is live.
- Remember the phrase “Turn Around, Don’t Drown!” Don’t drive through flooded roads. Cars can be swept away in just two feet of moving water.
- Stay out of damaged buildings and away from affected areas and or roads until authorities deem them safe.
- If you have evacuated, return home only when authorities say it is safe to do so.
- Listen to news reports to learn if your water supply is safe to drink. Until local authorities proclaim your water supply safe, boil water for at least one minute before drinking or using it for food preparation.
- Check your home for damage:
- Never touch electrical equipment while you are wet or standing in water. Consider hiring a qualified electrician to assess damage to electrical systems.
- Have wells checked for contamination from bacteria and chemicals before using.
- Have damaged septic tanks or leaching systems repaired as soon as possible to reduce potential health hazards.
- If you believe there is a gas leak, go outdoors immediately, and do not turn electrical switches or appliances on or off. If you turned off your gas, a licensed professional is required to turn it back on.
- If your home or property is damaged, take photos or videos to document damage, and contact your insurance company.

KEY MESSAGING POINTS

After a Hurricane

- If your home or property is damaged, take photos or videos to document damage, and contact your insurance company.
- If your power is out, follow our [power outage safety tips](#).
- Report power outages to your utility company.
- Use generators and grills outside because their fumes contain carbon monoxide. Make sure your carbon monoxide detectors are working as it is a silent, odorless, killer. See more [Generator Safety Tips](#).
- If a traffic light is out, treat the intersection as a four-way stop.
- If phone lines are down, use social media or texting to let others know you are OK.
- Look before you step. After a hurricane or flood, the ground and floors can be covered with debris, including broken bottles and nails.
- Avoid entering moving or standing floodwaters. Floodwater and mud may be contaminated by oil, gasoline, or raw sewage.
- Clean and disinfect anything that got wet, and take steps to prevent and detect mold. Consider using professional cleaning and repair services. See more tips to recover from [flooding](#).
- Throw away food (including canned items), that has come into contact with floodwaters, was exposed to temperatures above 40 °F for more than two hours, or has an unusual odor, color, or texture. When in doubt, throw it out!
- Be a good neighbor. Check on family, friends, and neighbors, especially the elderly, those who live alone, those with medical conditions and those who may need additional assistance.

Hurricane Preparedness for People with Access/Functional Needs

- 1  Create an emergency kit tailored to your needs: medications, medical supplies, mobility aids, batteries, etc. Don't forget a communication plan! 
- 2  Stay informed! Follow local authorities for updates and evacuation orders. Use accessible sources for information.
- 3  Register with your local emergency management agency to receive assistance during evacuations and sheltering. 
- 4  Plan your evacuation route in advance. Consider accessible transportation options and locations with necessary accommodations.
- 5  Notify neighbors, friends, and family about your situation and emergency plan. Stay connected for support and updates.

Before a #flood:

- Elevate items stored in the basement and other low-lying flood prone areas to minimize damage from flooding.
- If you have a sump pump, check that it is functioning properly.

Follow instructions from public safety officials. If told to evacuate, do so immediately. If you must evacuate your home, take only essential items, including your emergency kit, and bring your pets.

During strong winds in a hurricane, take shelter in a basement or an interior room (closet, interior hallway) on the lowest level of a building away from windows, doors, and outside walls.

Do not drive or walk into floodwater. It only takes 6 inches of swiftly moving water to knock you off your feet!

Need Help Evacuating? Here's What to Do:



Call 911 and inform them about your situation. Clearly state that you need help with evacuation.

Provide your exact location and any relevant details about your access or functional needs.

@Mass211 provides shelter information in various languages. Visit their website or call 2-1-1 for language-specific guidance.

If you lose power and need to plug in your medical device, call 2-1-1 or your local public safety officials to find a shelter location.

Power Outage Safety Tips:

- Avoid downed power lines & assume they are live
 - Call 9-1-1 to report downed lines
- Call your utility company to report power outages.
 - Keep #generators outside & away from building

- Get a professional to check for loose wires, mold and hidden damage before re-entering.

MENSAJES IMPORTANTES:

Antes de Un Huracán:

- Conozca su área: Averigüe si vive usted en una zona de evacuación de huracanes.
- Averigüe si su propiedad está en riesgo de o propenso de inundaciones por mirar el Mapas de Inundaciones por el Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).
- Elabore un plan de emergencia familiar.
 - Si usted vive o trabaja en una zona de inundación, Zona de evacuación de huracanes, o una área al riesgo de inundaciones, usted necesita estar preparado para evacuar.
 - Si recibe usted servicios médicos en casa, trabaje con su proveedor médico para mantener estos servicios si no puede salir de su vivienda durante un huracán u otra emergencia.
- Construya un equipo de emergencia para desastres con necesidades que pueden sostener usted y su familia si no puede dejar su vivienda.
- Prepare su Casa:
 - Eleve hornos, calentadores de agua, y paneles eléctricos a pisos superiores.
 - Asegure que los detectores de monóxido carbono (CO) y detectores de humo funcionen.
- Inundaciones costeras y de terrenos adentros son muy peligrosos durante una tormenta tropical o huracán. Las pérdidas por inundaciones generalmente no son incluidas en pólizas de seguros para dueños o inquilinos de casa. Considere comprar seguros para inundaciones por el Plan Nacional de Seguros para Inundaciones (NFIP).
 - Los seguros para inundaciones están disponibles en la mayoría de comunidades ya sea que su edificio está o no está en una zona de inundación, pero generalmente hay un período de espera de 30 días antes de que la póliza entre en vigor.

MENSAJES IMPORTANTES:

Cuando un Huracán o Tormenta Tropical Está Acercándose

- Escuche a estaciones de noticias locales y oficiales públicas para información y novedades recientes.
- Siga instrucciones de oficiales de seguridad pública. Si hay una orden de evacuación, hágalo inmediatamente. Si usted necesita evacuar su vivienda, solo tome cosas esenciales, incluyendo su equipo de emergencia, y sus mascotas.
- Si no sea pedido a evacuar y se va a quedar en casa durante la tormenta, recoge suministros adecuados en caso de que se perdiere electricidad o acceso a agua, y si no pudiere dejar.
- Prepare para apagones: cargue celulares y electrónicas, ponga su nevera y congelador en los ajustes más fríos. Si usas electricidad para conseguir agua de un pozo, llene su bañera con agua para usar a tirar el baño.
- Prepare su vivienda:
 - o Ate o traer adentro cosas fuera de casa (muebles de jardín, juguetes, basuras, etc.) que puede ser arrastrados o dañados por vientos fuertes o inundaciones.
 - o Si vientos fuertes son esperadas, cubra los ventanas con 5/8" madera contrachapada del grado exterior o marino.
 - Prepare para inundaciones por elevar cosas en su sótano, checar su bomba de sumidero, desenchufar aparatos electrónicos sensibles, limpiar los sumideros de la calle, y aparcar los coches en lugares que no son propensos a inundaciones.

MENSAJES IMPORTANTES:

Durante un Huracán

- Siga instrucciones de oficiales de seguridad pública. Si hay una orden de evacuación, hágalo inmediatamente. Si usted necesita evacuar su vivienda, solo tome cosas esenciales, incluyendo su equipo de emergencia, y sus mascotas.
- Evite conducir o dejar la casa durante una tormenta. Inundaciones y vientos fuertes pueden hacer viajes muy peligrosos.
- Durante vientos fuertes en un huracán, tome refugio en un sótano o habitación interior (armario, pasillo interior), en el piso más bajo de un edificio. Quédese lejos de ventanas, puertas, y paredes exteriores.
- Si usted necesita evacuar o está viajando durante un inundaciones, recuerde:
 - No conduzca o camine en agua en movimiento. La mayoría de ahogamientos ocurren en las riadas. ¡El agua se mueve rápidamente y puede hacerse perder los pies!
 - Nunca conduzca por una calzada inundada - ¡Dése vuelta, no se ahogue! Los coches pueden ser arrastrados en solo 2 pies de agua en movimiento. Si su vehículo está atrapado en una riada, quédese en el vehículo. Si el nivel de agua se está levantando dentro del vehículo, busque refugio en el techo.
 - No conduzca alrededor de las barreras de la calle. Calles y puentes pueden ser destruidos o defectuosos.
- Si usted se refugia en lugar, escuchen a medios de comunicación locales para novedades. Las condiciones pueden cambiar muy rápidamente, entonces sé preparado a evacuar si se vuelve necesario.

MENSAJES IMPORTANTES:

Después de Un Huracán
