Subject: Income Inclusions/Exclusions for Low-Income Determination

Purpose: To notify Local Workforce Development Boards, One-Stop Career Center

Operators and other local workforce development partners of income inclusions and exclusions for the purpose of determining low-income eligibility for participation in Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title I

activities.

Background: WIOA requires that individuals who must be low-income as a condition of

eligibility or priority of service are in accordance with the definition of low-income provided in WIOA sec. 3 (36) A. When calculating whether an individual is low-income based on the Poverty Income Guidelines or 70 percent of the Lower Living Standard Levels (LLSIL) certain types of income must be included

while other income must be excluded from the income calculation.

The attached list of WIOA Title I Income Inclusions and Exclusions contains the types of income to include or exclude when calculating income for the purposes of low-income eligibility determination. Pending further guidance from the USDOL on income inclusions and exclusions, the attached listing must be considered in the determination of income eligibility for WIOA Title I activities.

Senior Community Service Employment Program

The Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) is a community service and work-based job-training program for older Americans. Authorized by the Older Americans Act of 1965 Title V, the program provides training for low-income, unemployed seniors. Participants also have access to employment assistance through American Job Centers. SCSEP participants who participate in Title V projects carried out jointly under Title I are eligible under the WIOA Title I Adult program due to their low-income status.
