

A Holistic Approach to Trauma Identification and Support





Part 1: Recommendations on Trauma Identification and Referral for All Organizations

- 1. Identifying trauma should be part of a broader, holistic approach to meeting children's behavioral health needs
- Organizations developing and implementing a trauma identification and referral process should do so in a trauma-informed and responsive way (as described in report)
- 3. To help ensure high quality implementation, the state should support organizations who are implementing trauma identification practices
- 4. The state should increase the availability of services and supports needed to recover from trauma

For organizations who select a *screening* approach, the report also lays out recommendations for effective, equitable, and healing-centered trauma screening implementation (+ Appendix on how to select a screening tool).




- This presentation looks at FY22 admissions data, and the changes in admissions since FY21, FY19 (pre-COVID) and FY18 (pre-CJRA)


Juvenile Court process data (FY22)

Estimated percent of cases not reaching adjudication (FY18-FY22)




Estimated % of applications for complaint not making it to adjudication ——Estimated % delinquent filings not making it to adjudication


Percent change since FY21 across juvenile justice system process points




Percent change since FY19 (pre-pandemic)

Percent change since FY19 across juvenile justice system process points




Percent change since FY18 (pre-Criminal Justice Reform Act- CJRA)


Percent change since FY21 by offense severity

Percent change since FY21 across juvenile justice system process points by offense severity




Percent change since FY18 by offense severity

Percent change since FY18 across juvenile justice system process points by offense severity




Percent change since FY21 by race/ethnicity

Percent change since FY21 across process points by race/ethnicity





Race/ethnicty distribution data by process point (FY22)





Gender distribution data by process point (FY22)












