Honorable Chairs and Ranking Minority Members of the Committees on Ways and Means:

Pursuant to Section 6 of Chapter 14 of the General Laws<sup>1</sup>, the Department of Revenue (DOR) hereby submits its mid-month tax revenue report for the month of March 2020, the ninth month of fiscal year 2020. The attached table shows March 2020 month-to-date tax revenue collections through March 13, 2020, along with changes from the equivalent period in March 2019.

Revenue collections are uneven and weighted toward month-end, and the brief period covered in the mid-month does not provide sufficient data for comparison to prior years. Therefore, the Department urges that mid-month figures should not be used to assess trends or project future revenues.

## **Context for March revenues**

March is a mid-size month for revenue collections, ranking #6 of the twelve months in nine of the last ten years. The tax filing season is well underway; historically, the amount sent out in refunds is substantially greater than payments with returns during March.

## Highlights

- **Total Tax** collections for the month-to-date period were \$1.160 billion, up \$249 million or 27.4% versus the same period in March 2019. Some of the month-to-date increase may have been due to timing factors.
- **Income Taxes** totaled \$547 million, up \$130 million or 31.3% versus the same period in March 2019.
- Sales & Use Tax collections were \$85 million, up \$11 million or 15.3% versus the same period in March 2019.
- **Corporate & Business Taxes** were \$479 million, up \$113 million versus the same period in March 2019.
- **Other Taxes** totaled \$49 million, down \$6 million or 10.3% versus the same period in March 2019.

## Detail

**Total Income Tax** of \$547 million for mid-month March comprises the following:

- Withholding of \$652 million, up \$148 million from mid-month March 2019.
- Estimated Payments of \$7 million, down \$2 million from mid-month March 2019.
- **Returns/Bills** of \$45 million, up \$1 million from mid-month March 2019.
- **Refunds** of \$157 million, up \$16 million from mid-month March 2019. Because refunds are an outflow, this represents a negative variance from the prior year.

**Sales & Use Tax** collections of \$85 million for the March month-to-date period are \$11 million or 15.3% more than the equivalent period last year. Only a small proportion of expected Regular Sales and Meals tax remittances, subcategories of Sales & Use Tax, are received by the mid-month date; the bulk of these payments are expected on or after the  $20^{\text{th}}$  of the month.

- \$40 million in Regular Sales Tax collections, up \$10 million from mid-month March 2019.
- \$10 million in Meals Tax revenues, virtually no change from mid-month March 2019.
- \$35 million in Motor Vehicle Sales Tax revenues, up \$1 million from mid-month March 2019.

**Corporate & Business** tax revenues were \$479 million, up \$113 million from mid-month March 2019. March 16<sup>th</sup> was the due date for corporate & business estimated payments for the third quarter of the fiscal year.

All Other includes a number of tax categories including motor fuels, cigarettes, estate taxes, and deeds. All other revenues totaled \$49 million, which is \$6 million less than the mid-month March 2019. Some of the decrease in all other is timing related and may improve in the remainder of the month.

Because collections are weighted to the end of the month, we do not use the mid-month figures to project full-month revenue. Comparisons to prior-year periods are unreliable because of normal fluctuations and calendar differences in the short 15-day window of incremental data.
