\$342 Million in Massachusetts Awards for Reconnecting Communities from USDOT

The U.S. Department of Transportation announced awards for the **Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhood Grant Program.** This includes \$335 million to **replace the Allston Viaduct** and create new and improved access to expanded waterfront parks and open space in Boston, as well awards for **Haverhill**, **Lynn, Everett, Cambridge** and **Chelsea**.



SMART

\$1.9 million for Curb Usage Data Inventory in Boston

The City of Boston was awarded funding from USDOT's **Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) Grants Program** to develop a curb data inventory using machine learning to digitize street signs and update inventory in real time.




State Revolving Fund Application Process Overview





Advantages of Borrowing through the Trust

Fixed Low-Interest Rates

- These rates are established by law and offer a stable planning tool for communities.
- Loans with a 20-year term will have an interest rate of 2%
- Loans with a term over 20 years will generally have an interest rate of 2.4%
- Certain projects qualify for reduced or 0% interest

Interim Loans (Construction Loans)

• The Trust offers interim loans with no fees or interest. These loans allow for one-stop financing through the Trust.

Flexible Repayment Terms

• Loans can be financed up to 30 years.

Disadvantaged Communities Additional Subsidy (Loan Forgiveness)

- The Trust uses a percentage of its annual grant and state funding as **additional subsidy** each year. This subsidy comes in the form of loan forgiveness to disadvantaged communities.
- Eligibility is determined by **an annual affordability calculation** which ranks communities into affordability tiers. The amount of loan forgiveness is **based** on a community's affordability tier.
- The below table is what the Trust has offered over the past number of years but may not be what is offered in future years.


BIL Grants Impact on Loan Forgiveness

How will the Trust apply Loan Forgiveness to Future Projects?

- In the past few years, the Trust has set a fixed percentage for loan forgiveness when the IUP is published.
 - We understand that cities and towns need clarity on the overall cost of projects as they move through the borrowing authorization process, and we have tried to provide that information.
- The BIL grants have increased the amount of funds available to be provided as loan forgiveness, but it has also:
 - Created strict rules regarding who qualifies:
 - Only disadvantaged communities, other than the Emerging Contaminants grants.
 - Increased demand for loans:
 - The 2021 IUPs committed to **\$817 million in projects with \$1.8 billion in applications**
 - The 2022 IUPs committed to \$1.326 billion in projects with \$2.2 billion in applications
 - The 2023 IUPs committed to \$1.33 billion in projects with \$2.8 billion in applications (Not all applications will receive financing).
 - The 2024 draft IUPs are expected to commit to **\$1.48 billion in projects with \$2.78 billion in applications** (Not all applications will receive financing).
- The increase in demand, the increase in construction bid costs, and the federal requirements to apply loan forgiveness only to disadvantaged communities makes it more difficult to commit to a fixed percentage for loan forgiveness.
- The Trust will continue to monitor loan demand and available funds and hopes to be able to provide timely and accurate updates on how much loan forgiveness borrowers can expect.

What is known is that BIL grants will increase the amount of loan forgiveness to Disadvantaged Communities beyond the standard offerings. MASSACHUSETTS CLEAN WATER TRUST AND MASSDEP

Other Subsidy Programs Offered by the Trust



- LSL Planning Grant Program. The Trust is providing grants to assist public water suppliers with completing planning projects for LSL inventories and developing LSL replacement plans for compliance with Lead and Copper Rule Revisions.
- Asset Management Planning Grants. The program provides a 60% grant or \$150,000, whichever is less, to assist communities with completing or updating asset management plans for wastewater, drinking water, stormwater utilities, or any combination of the three to ensure the operational integrity of the water utility.
- 0% Lead Service Line Replacement Loans. This loan program is meant to incentivize communities moving forward with lead service line replacement projects and to lower the cost of implementing LSL Replacement Programs developed with LSL Planning Grants.
- 0% Nutrient Enrichment Reduction Loans. This loan program is for CWSRF loans that are primarily intended to remediate or prevent nutrient enrichment of a surface water body or water supply which can cause environmental degradation of the surrounding water bodies.
- 0% Interest PFAS Mitigation Loans. Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a family of chemicals that are classified as emerging contaminants and are known to cause health issues when found in drinking water. Projects that have the purpose of reducing PFAS in water below the established Maximum Contamination Level of 20 parts per trillion, are eligible for 0% interest loans.
- Income-Based Community Septic Management Program (CSMP) Loans. The Trust is now offering 0% interest CSMP loans to communities that provide reduced interest rate loans to homeowners based on their annual income as compared to the Area Median Income (AMI).
- Housing Choice Loan Program. Communities that have achieved the "Housing Choice" designation under the Housing Choice Initiative will be eligible for an interest rate reduction up to .50% from the standard below market rate of 2% offered by the Trust.

Other Assistance Available From Massachusetts

- Free Technical Assistance for Small, Rural, and Tribal Publicly Owned Treatment Works
 - Through a new provision in the BIL CWSRF grants, the Trust, in coordination with MassDEP, has entered into an
 agreement with RCAP Solutions to provide free technical assistance to systems with less than 10,000 or fewer
 people and an average daily flow of less than 1 million gallons.

- Public Water Suppliers (PWSs) Cyber Security Improvement Grants
 - Grants will go to PWSs to improve their cybersecurity if they have operational technology at risk and have a cybersecurity assessment completed with the last two years.
 - Eligible grantees are small PWSs serving under 10,000 and Disadvantaged Communities.
 - Grant amounts are based on the size of population served with a not to exceed amount of \$50,000.

FINANCING AVAILABLE

- WIFIA can finance up to 49% of the eligible project costs (or up to 80% of costs for small communities defined as population served under 25,000)
- Borrowers must provide an investment grade rating from a national credit rating agency prior to closing the loan



Broad eligibility allows for wide variety of borrowers and projects, plus special program for SRF borrowers (SWIFIA)



NEPA, Davis-Bacon, American Iron and Steel, Build America, Buy America, and all federal cross-cutter provisions apply



ELIGIBILITY



 Broad eligibility and can provide financing to a variety of credit-worthy borrowers, including local and tribal governments, state infrastructure financing authorities, corporations, and partnerships, among others



 Can fund water infrastructure projects that support clean and safe water access and help communities address a variety of challenges, including regulatory compliance, water quality issues, drought or flooding, and aging infrastructure needs



 Eligible activities include project planning, design, development, and construction, land or equipment acquisition, a variety of carrying costs during construction, and financing-related costs



LOAN PROCESS – PROJECT SELECTION



- Project Selection: 6-8 weeks
- Project Approval: 7-9 months generally
- Project Monitoring: post-close



SMALL LOAN EXAMPLE

SHARYLAND WATER SUPPLY CORPORATION, TX

- WIFIA Loan: \$17,992,000
- Project: 1) replace and relocate water pumps; and 2) upgrade plant infrastructure
- Population served: 87,000
- Other financing: Cash on hand, grants, state revolving fund loan

Interesting facts:

- Co-funding from the state revolving fund and cash on hand
- Loan closed prior to all loan funding being closed
- Inter-creditor agreement executed with USDA
- Debt service reserve funded over a five-year period

Revolving Funds for Financing Water and Wastewater Projects

Water & Wastewater Loans and Grants



Purpose

Provides funding for clean and reliable drinking water systems, sanitary waste water and solid waste disposal, and storm water drainage to households and businesses. Funds can be used to buy, build, repair, and improve public water and waste treatment and collection systems.



Eligibility

Government organizations, nonprofits, and federally recognized Tribes

Rural areas with populations fewer than 10,000, Colonias and Tribal lands.



Funding Limits

Program Type: Loans, grant (if available) Terms and Conditions: The loan term will not exceed 40 years.

OPEN

Water & Wastewater Predevelopment Planning Grants (PPG)



Purpose

Helps low-income communities with the initial planning and development of applications for USDA Rural Development Water and Waste Disposal Direct Loan and Grant or Loan Guarantee programs.




Eligibility

Government organizations, nonprofits, and federally recognized Tribes.

NOTE: The area must have a median household income below the poverty line or less than 80 percent of the statewide non-metropolitan median household income.

Rural areas with populations fewer than 10,000, Colonias and Tribal lands.



Funding Limits

Program Type: Grant Terms and Conditions: Maximum grant amount is \$30,000, or 75 percent of predevelopment planning costs.

OPEN

Special Evaluation Assistance for Rural Communities and Households Grants (SEARCH)



Purpose

Helps small, financially distressed rural communities pay for predevelopment feasibility studies, design, and technical assistance on proposed water and waste disposal projects. Funds can be used to support proposed projects to build or improve rural water, wastewater, solid waste disposal, or storm water disposal facilities, or to make public or private improvements. Government organizations, nonprofits, and federally recognized Tribes.

Eligibility

NOTE: Eligible service areas must be rural, considered financially distressed, and: • Be located in cities, towns, or unincorporated areas with populations of 2,500 or fewer, according to the most recent U.S. Census data • Have median household incomes either below the poverty line - or less than 80 percent of the statewide, nonmetropolitan median household income.
