Massachusetts Bill of Rights for Survivors of Sexual Assault



You have rights and this document explains those rights and how to get the information and assistance you may need.

All survivors of sexual assault shall have the right to:

1. You have the right to consult with a sexual assault victim advocate.

- You have the right to request a consultation with a sexual assault victim advocate who shall have confidentiality and privilege **prior** to the administration of a sexual assault evidence collection kit or an interview with a law enforcement officer regarding the assault. A Sexual Assault Victim Advocate is a person employed or is a volunteer at a rape crisis center or rape crisis program
- If you choose not to speak with an advocate at first, you can always speak with an advocate at a later time.

2. You have the right to information about disclosing an assault to law enforcement and having a sexual assault evidence collection kit tested.

- The decision of whether to report a sexual assault to law enforcement is your decision.
- If you choose to report the assault to law enforcement, you do not need to write out your report or go to the law enforcement agency, although you may do so.
- If you choose to report a sexual assault, your kit must be tested at the relevant crime lab.
- If you choose not to report the sexual assault to a law enforcement agency, your kit will not be tested but will be stored appropriately by the law enforcement agency. Your kit can only be tested if you report the sexual assault to a law enforcement agent.
- You have the right to receive information about how to file a report with the appropriate law enforcement agency, which will result in the testing of your sexual assault evidence collection kit by a crime laboratory.
- Each law enforcement agency that is located in the city or town where the sexual assault occurred has a dedicated liaison that can assist you with this information request or any questions you may have.

3. You have the right to information regarding your sexual assault evidence collection kit.

- You have the right to know the location, testing date, results of the kit, and when the kit may be destroyed.
- The location and testing date of your kit is available through <u>https://ma.track-kit.us</u> or the District Attorney or law enforcement agency can provide you with this information.
- Either the District Attorney's Office or law enforcement agency can provide you with the testing results from your kit.

• All kits must be held for at least 15 years, either the District Attorney's Office or law enforcement agency can provide you with information on when your kit may be destroyed.

4. You have the right to information on the status of your case.

- If there is a criminal case pending, you have the right to know any change in the status of your case, and if the case has been closed or reopened at any time.
- The District Attorney's Office handling the case or the law enforcement agency that is located in the city or town where the sexual assault occurred can assist you with this information request.
- The Massachusetts Victim Bill of Rights provides additional rights pertaining to your case.

5. You have the right to apply for victim compensation funds.

• The Massachusetts Office for Victim Assistance (MOVA), mass.gov/mova, the District Attorney's Office that is handling your case, or the liaison at the law enforcement agency that is located in the city or town where the sexual assault took place can assist you with this information request.

6. You have the right to designate someone to obtain this information for you.

• You may choose another person to receive any or all of the information described in this brochure.
