## MASSACHUSETTS PRPOPOSED GOALS FOR PROGRAM YEAR 2014 WIA TITLE I ADULT, DISLOCATED WORKER, AND YOUTH AND WAGNER – PEYSER

The following sections outline Massachusetts proposed goals for Program Year 2014 for WIA and Wagner-Peyser.

The basis for the proposed goals rests primarily on program performance over the last several years in light of improving economic conditions. Overall, economic conditions in Massachusetts continue to be positive. As illustrated in the table below, the state's unemployment rate has shown improvement since the beginning of 2014. The expectation is for continued modest gains in employment and a gradual decline in the unemployment rate during Program Year 2014.

## Proposed PY 2014 Goals for Wagner-Peyser

In PY 2013, the number of Wagner-Peyser participants being served at the State's One-Stop Career Centers has fallen below the 266,512 served in PY 2012, due largely to funding cuts in Wagner-Peyser and WIA. We anticipate that the 1.2% increase in Wagner-Peyser funding for PY 2014, coupled with the increases in WIA funding, will result in an increase in the number of individuals who can be served in PY 2014. The table below shows the number of participants who have received services at One-Stop Career Centers over the past several years.

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Massachusetts proposed PY 2014 goals for Wagner-Peyser are presented in the table below. Actual performance levels for PY 2009 through PY 2012 are shown on the table, as is the most current performance for third quarter PY 2013. Massachusetts is proposing a modest increase in the six-month average earnings goal from \$17,300 to \$17,500.

## Proposed PY 2014 Goals for WIA Adult, Dislocated Worker and Youth

The proposed goals for PY 2014 are shown on the following page. Massachusetts is proposing to maintain PY 2013 goal levels for all measures with the exception of Youth Attainment of Degree or Certificate, where we propose an increase from 72% to 75%, and Placement in Employment/Education, where we propose an increase form 81% to 83%. The proposed goal levels exceed or align closely with the (GPRA) regression targets. Additionally, based on third quarter PY 2013 performance, the proposed goals are both realistic and attainable.
