Other Ways to Get Involved with the Massachusetts Safe Routes to School Program

Marketing/Media

- Create a short safety video for pedestrians or cyclists
- Write an article for the school newsletter or newspaper on the benefits of walking and/or biking
- Create a poster campaign focusing on a walking or rolling safety tip
- Create marketing materials for the launch of an SRTS Travel Survey

Education

- Conduct a <u>Bike Rodeo</u> at an elementary or middle school or at a community event
- Conduct a <u>Bike Safety Assembly</u>
- Conduct a <u>Pedestrian Safety Session</u> at school or elementary-aged afterschool program
- Conduct a bike maintenance session

Transportation Planning

- Have an informational interview with your municipality's Transportation
 Planner
- Map a safe walking or rolling route in the community
- Attend a public meeting with your municipality related to a transportation project
- Create an informational map of bike parking located on school property

Event Planning

- Participate in <u>SRTS flagship events</u>
- Organize a student-led <u>Walking School Bus</u> or Bike Train
- Start or join a School Club Bike, Pedestrian, Vision Zero, Architecture, Engineering, or Sustainability Club

Engineering

- Participate in a Safe Routes to School <u>Arrival</u> and <u>Dismissal Observation</u> and/or <u>Walk Audit</u>
- Provide feedback on a district <u>SRTS grant</u> application (Bike Rack, Signs & Lines, or Infrastructure)
- Assist in planning, implementing, and/or running of a <u>Traffic Garden</u>
- Help create a pedestrian plaza or paint a mural outside your school to make walking, biking, and rolling more inviting

Community Organizations

- Collaborate with a local bike shop to provide bike maintenance at a community event
- Conduct a Bike Rodeo, or Pedestrian and Bike Safety Session at a community organization (YMCA, Boys & Girls Club, PMC Kids Ride, etc.)
- Hold a Bike Corral or Bike Valet at a local event, Farmer's Market, Library or Park
- Conduct helmet checks at a local event
