Notice is hereby given that the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP), under authority granted by the Massachusetts Clean Waters Act, M.G.L. c. 21, §§ 26 – 53, is proposing to revise the Fact Sheet for the 2023 Draft Massachusetts Permit to Discharge Pollutants to Surface Waters issued to the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) for: the Deer Island Treatment Plant's pollutant discharges to Massachusetts Bay ("Other Waters under 314 CMR 4.00); discharges from four (4) Combined Sewer Overflow Treatment Facilities at 5 locations; and discharges from Combined Sewer Overflow Outfalls at 6 locations (State Permit). Public Notice of the Draft State Permit's issuance was published on May 31, 2023, and a comment period extended until November 28, 2023.

Comments submitted during the comment period following this Notice should be limited to the revisions made to the Fact Sheet. These revisions include: a statement incorporating by reference the Fact Sheet for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) proposed 2023 Draft NPDES Permit (Federal Permit) (MA Permit No. MA0103284) for the same discharges; and discussion of MassDEP's determination to include municipalities with satellite sewage collection systems, combined sewer overflow treatment facilities, and combined sewer overflow outfalls as co-permittees on the Draft State Permit. The revised Fact Sheet in tracked changes format and the Draft State Permit to which no changes have been made are available at https://www.mass.gov/service-details/massdep-publichearings-comment-opportunities. The final federal Clean Water Act (CWA) section 401 certification for EPA's proposed 2023 Draft Permit was issued on March 22, 2024, and is available for review at https://www.mass.gov/info-details/massachusetts-final-individual-surface-water-discharge-permitsand-associated-documents. #### **RECEIVING WATER AND CLASSIFICATION:**

This Fact Sheet incorporates by reference the entire Fact Sheet for the 2023 Draft NPDES Permit No. MA0103284, issued by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Region 1, to the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority on May 31, 2023, including all attachments and appendices to the Fact Sheet. In addition to the information contained in the EPA Fact Sheet incorporated herein by reference, MassDEP includes the supplemental information that follows.

#### PER – AND POLYFLUROALKYL SUBSTANCES

MassDEP is implementing a number of actions to address the potential health effects of exposure to per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).<sup>1</sup> According to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA),<sup>2</sup> PFAS are a group of man-made chemicals that includes perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA), perfluorooctane sulfonic acid (PFOS), GenX, and many other chemicals. PFAS have been manufactured and used in a variety of industries around the globe, including in the United States since the 1940s. PFOA and PFOS have been the most extensively produced and studied of these chemicals. Both chemicals are very persistent in the environment and in the human body – meaning they do not break down and they can accumulate over time. There is evidence that exposure to PFAS can lead to adverse human health effects.

PFAS can be found in:

- **Food** packaged in PFAS-containing materials, processed with equipment that used PFAS, or grown in PFAS-contaminated soil or water.
- **Commercial household products**, including stain- and water-repellent fabrics, nonstick products, polishes, waxes, paints, cleaning products, and fire-fighting foams (a major source of groundwater contamination at airports and military bases where firefighting training occurs).
- Workplace, including production facilities or industries (e.g., chrome plating, electronics manufacturing or oil recovery) that use PFAS.
- **Drinking water**, typically localized and associated with a specific facility (e.g., manufacturer, landfill, wastewater treatment plant, firefighter training facility).
- Living organisms, including fish, animals and humans, where PFAS have the ability to build up and persist over time.

Certain PFAS chemicals are no longer manufactured in the United States as a result of phaseouts including the PFOA Stewardship Program, in which eight major chemical manufacturers agreed to eliminate the use of PFOA and PFOA-related chemicals in their products and as emissions from their facilities. Although PFOA and PFOS are no longer manufactured in the United States, they are still produced internationally and can be imported into the United States

in consumer goods such as carpet, leather and apparel, textiles, paper and packaging, coatings, rubber and plastics.

Given that PFAS are persistent in the environment and may lead to adverse human health and environmental effects, MassDEP has identified a comprehensive approach for addressing PFAS in wastewater discharges. Additionally, based on review of recent data for residuals produced from wastewater treatment and other processes, MassDEP has concerns regarding the levels of PFAS in residuals land applied in Massachusetts. All residuals products sold, distributed, and applied in Massachusetts are subject to an Approval of Suitability (AOS), which classifies residuals for different uses based on the chemical quality and treatment to reduce pathogens. Therefore, MassDEP began including a requirement for PFAS testing in all new or renewed AOSs in January 2019, and as of July 2020, MassDEP began requiring all AOS holders to test their products for PFAS on a quarterly basis.

MassDEP is also concerned about the potential impacts PFAS discharges from wastewater treatment plants may have on downstream drinking water, recreational, and aquatic life uses. The Massachusetts Surface Water Quality Standards do not include numeric criteria for PFAS. However, the narrative criterion for toxic pollutants at 314 CMR 4.05(5)(e) states:

All surface waters shall be free from pollutants in concentrations or combinations that are toxic to humans, aquatic life or wildlife.

In addition, this narrative criterion is further elaborated on at 314 CMR 4.05(5)(e)2(e) which states:

Unlisted Pollutants; Combinations of Pollutants. Any pollutant or combination of pollutants within the meaning of 314 CMR 4.05(5)(e) for which 314 CMR 4.05(5)(e)1. does not establish a generally applicable criterion shall not be discharged to surface waters in a quantity or manner that would: i. exceed safe exposure levels for aquatic life as determined by toxicity testing using methods approved by MassDEP pursuant to 314 CMR 4.03(6); or ii. cause adverse human health effects due to the ingestion, inhalation or dermal absorption of such toxins attributable to such waters during their reasonable use as designated in 314 CMR 4.00; or iii. result in a human health excess lifetime cancer risk level greater than 10 for -6 individual carcinogens.

To assess whether PFAS discharges from the MWRA DITP are occurring and whether they may be contributing to a violation of the narrative toxics criteria, MassDEP is including conditions in the Massachusetts Surface Water Discharge Permit for the permittee to monitor its Significant Industrial Users' discharges for PFAS.

#### CO-PERMITTEES

<u>Through incorporation of terms and conditions of EPA's Draft NPDES Permit into the Draft</u> <u>Surface Water Discharge Permit (SWDP), MassDEP is adding the four CSO communities listed in</u> <u>Attachment A and the thirty-nine non-CSO communities listed in Attachment B as co-permittees</u> <u>to the Draft SWDP. These forty-three communities own and operate sanitary wastewater</u> <u>collection systems that discharge flows to the MWRA DITP. These municipalities are co-</u> permittees for certain activities pertaining to proper operation and maintenance of their respective collection systems (See Part I.C. and I.D of EPA's Draft NPDES Permit). Adding them to the Draft SWDP ensures that they will comply with requirements to operate and maintain the collection systems to avoid discharges of sewage from the collection systems.

The co-permittees with CSOs all submitted permit applications to MassDEP in a timely manner. Prior to publication of the public notice of this revised fact sheet in the newspaper these four co-permittees were sent written notification that their existing individual permits were being integrated into MassDEP's MWRA SWDP, consistent with EPA's intent relative to the MWRA NPDES permit. The other co-permittees did not submit permit applications to MassDEP and were sent, prior to publication of the public notice in the newspaper, written notification that MassDEP waived the application requirements for them prior to the beginning of the public notice and comment period.

314 CMR 3.03(1) provides legal authority for including the co-permittees to the SWDP. This regulation prohibits any person from operating or maintaining a treatment works without a SWDP. The definition of Treatment Works at 314 CMR 3.02 includes sewage collection systems that convey wastewater to a treatment plant. Four of these communities operate CSOs and currently hold individual jointly issued federal NPDES and state SWDPs which will terminate upon the issuance of the final MWRA-DITP NPDES permit and the final SWDP.

Please note that this submittal practice is for all future applications.

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) issued public notice of its draft Surface Water Discharge Permit (SWDP) and an accompanying fact sheet on May 31, 2023, for the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority Deer Island Treatment Plant (MWRA DITP), including the collection systems from all member communities. The purpose of this letter is to inform you of our plans for incorporating all co-permittees, including the City of Somerville Department of Public Works, into the MWRA DITP SWDP. Your previous SWDP was issued jointly with EPA's National Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit No. MA0101982. Please note that MassDEP's SWDPs and EPA's NPDES Permits are no longer jointly issued and that the EPA's Draft NPDES Permit for the MWRA DITP also contains a provision for inclusion of the City of Somerville as a co-permittee in the permit.

MassDEP will republish notice of a revised fact sheet for comment from May 1, 2024, through May 30, 2024. Comments must be limited solely to the revisions made to the fact sheet: incorporation by reference the entire 2023 Fact Sheet for the 2023 Draft NPDES Permit No, MA0103284 issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency on May 31, 2023; and the addition of co-permittees to the MWRA DITP SWDP.

The City of Somerville Department of Public Works owns and operates a satellite collection system that contributes wastewater to the MWRA DITP. The City of Somerville Department of

Public Works is currently permitted under NPDES Permit No. MA0101982 to discharge from 4 Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) outfalls. EPA is in the process of changing its approach to permitting these CSOs and MassDEP is doing likewise. Specifically, MassDEP plans to incorporate the 4 CSO outfalls and specific conditions from SWDP No. MA0101982 into the MWRA DITP SWDP. The City of Somerville Department of Public Works will then be added as a CSO-responsible co-permittee under the MWRA DITP SWDP Permit No. MA0103284. Upon the effective date of the MWRA DITP SWDP permit, MassDEP will terminate the City of Somerville Department of Public Works's coverage under SWDP No. MA0101982.

In the past, you filed a timely application for renewal of a SWDP. MassDEP has determined that moving forward, the City of Somerville Department of Public Works will not be required to submit a Surface Water Discharge Permit Renewal (WM07) application since MassDEP will not be reissuing an individual permit to the city. Instead, MassDEP has determined your submittal of a copy of the NPDES application filed with EPA will be sufficient. Re: Waiver of Permit Application and Signatory Requirements for Municipal Satellite Sewage Collection System to the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) Deer Island Treatment Plant (DITP)

Your municipality's sewage collection system sends wastewater collected within your municipal boundaries to a Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTW) separately owned and operated by the MWRA. The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection's (MassDEP's) regulation at 314 CMR 3.03(2) requires all Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTWs) to obtain a Surface Water Discharge Permit (SWDP). Additionally, 314 CMR 3.03(1) prohibits any person from operating or maintaining a treatment works without a SWDP. The definition of a Treatment Works at 314 CMR 3.02 includes sewage collection systems that convey wastewater to a treatment plant. MassDEP has authority to require satellite sewage collection systems sending wastewater to treatment plants owned and operated by another municipality to obtain a separate SWDP. MassDEP has determined that the most efficient way to regulate your municipality's collection system is to include it, along with all other Municipal Satellite Sewage Collection Systems to the MWRA DITP, listed in Attachment A, as co-permittees on the renewal SWDP to be issued for MWRA's POTW treatment plant. Please note that EPA's Draft NPDES Permit for the MWRA DITP also contains a provision for inclusion of the all the municipalities listed in Attachment A as co-permittees in the NPDES permit as well as the four CSO copermittees.

314 CMR 3.10(1) provides that any person required to obtain a SWDP must complete and submit the appropriate application form. MassDEP has determined to waive the SWDP permit application and signatory requirements applicable to your satellite sewage collection system because a single permit application executed by the MWRA's POTW treatment plant should provide the same information and will be more efficient than requiring separate applications from each municipal satellite collection system owner sending wastewater to the treatment plant. Municipal satellite collection system owners are expected to consult and coordinate with the POTW treatment plant receiving their wastewater to ensure that any information provided to MassDEP about their respective entities is accurate and complete. 314 CMR 3.03(1) authorizes MassDEP to require permit applicants to provide information MassDEP considers necessary to determine whether the applicant complies with applicable regulations. In the event that MassDEP requires additional information regarding your municipal satellite

collection system, it may use this authority to obtain it. This notice reflects MassDEP's determination based on the specific facts and circumstances in this case. It is not intended to bind the agency in future determinations where a separate permit for municipal satellites would not be duplicative or immaterial.

MassDEP will republish notice of a revised fact sheet for comment from May 1, 2024, through May 30, 2024. Comments must be limited solely to the revisions made to the fact sheet: incorporation by reference the entire 2023 Fact Sheet for the 2023 Draft NPDES Permit No, MA0103284 issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency on May 31, 2023; and the addition of co-permittees to the MWRA DITP SWDP.

- 3. This permit supersedes the permit issued on May 20, 1999, and subsequently modified on July 10, 2000.
- 4. This permit incorporates by reference: Part IA., Effluent Limitations and Monitoring Requirements for Outfall T01; Part IB., Combined Sewer Overflows (CSOs); Part IC., Unauthorized Discharges; Part ID., Notice of Elimination; Part IE., Operation and Maintenance; Part IF., Alternate Power Source, Part IG., Industrial Users and Pretreatment Program, Part IH., Sludge Conditions; Part II., Special Conditions; Part IJ., Reporting Requirements; Part IK., State 401 Certification Conditions; and Part II, Standard Conditions, as set forth in the 2023 Draft NPDES Permit No. MA0103284, issued by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Region 1, issued to the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority on May 31, 2023 (the 2023 Draft NPDES Permit) and attached hereto by reference as Appendix A and available on EPA's website at <a href="https://www.epa.gov/npdes-permits/massachusetts-draft-individual-npdes-permits">https://www.epa.gov/npdes-permits;</a>; provided, however:

a. that the notification required by Part IA.8 shall also be provided to MassDEP;

- b. that the reporting required by Part IC.3 shall be in accordance with 314 CMR 3.19(20)(e) (24 hour reporting);
- c. that a copy of the requests, reports, and information required by Part IJ.5 to be submitted to EPA shall also be submitted to MassDEP electronically to <u>massdep.npdes@mass.gov</u>;
- d. that, if there is a conflict between the definitions in 314 CMR 3.02 and/or 314 CMR 4.00 and the definitions in Part IIE, the definitions in 314 CMR 3.02 and/or 314 CMR 4.00 shall control, as applicable;
- e. that the notification required by 4.a. above shall be provided to <u>massdep.npdes@mass.gov</u>, or as otherwise specified.
- 5. This permit incorporates by reference the Standard Permit Conditions set forth in 314 CMR 3.19.
- 6. The permittee shall commence annual monitoring of all Significant Industrial Users<sup>2,3</sup> discharging into the POTW using Draft Method 1633 within six (6) months of the effective date.
- 7. Notwithstanding any other provision of the 2023 Draft Federal NPDES permit to the contrary, all PFAS monitoring results (influent; effluent; sludge; SIUs; and specific industries as specified in the 2023 Draft Federal NPDES permit) shall be reported to MassDEP via the eDEP portal, or as otherwise specified, within 30 days after the permittee receives the sampling results, in addition to the 2023 Draft Federal NPDES Permit reporting requirements. Information regarding the submittal of data via eDEP may be found at <a href="https://www.mass.gov/how-to/submit-wastewaterresiduals-pfas-data-via-edep">https://www.mass.gov/how-to/submit-wastewaterresiduals-pfas-data-via-edep</a>.
- 8. On or before January 31, 2024, the permittee shall submit to MassDEP at <u>massdep.npdes@mass.gov</u> a listing of all industrial dischargers and their addresses to be sampled in accordance with both the 2023 Draft Federal NPDES Permit and this permit and shall include:
  - a. All industries included in the categories listed Part IG, Industrial Users and Pretreatment Program, Paragraph 3 of the 2023 Draft Federal NPDES Permit; and
  - b. All Significant Industrial Users as required by Paragraph 6 of this permit.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Significant Industrial User (SIU) is defined at 40 CFR part 403: All industrial users subject to Categorical Pretreatment Standards under 40 CFR 403.6 and 40 CFR chapter I, subpart N; **and** any other industrial user that: discharges an average of 25,000 GPD or more of process wastewater to the POTW, contributes a process wastestream that makes up 5% or more of the average dry weather hydraulic or organic capacity of the POTW, or designated as such by the POTW on the basis that the industrial users has a reasonable potential for adversely affecting the POTW's operation or for violating any Pretreatment Standards or requirement.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> This requirement applies to all Significant Industrial Users and not just those within the sectors identified by EPA in the NPDES permit.

The listing shall be maintained by the permittee and updated with any changes. Whenever necessary, a copy of the updated listing reflecting changes shall be forwarded to MassDEP at <u>massdep.npdes@mass.gov</u> on or before the next January 31.

The cities and towns listed in Appendices B and C are co-permittee(s) for Part IC., Unauthorized Discharges, Part IE., Operation and Maintenance of the Treatment and Control Facilities, and Part 1F., Alternative Power Source, as set forth in the 2023 draft Federal NPDES Permit. In addition, these sections include conditions regarding the operation and maintenance of the collection systems owned and operated by the municipalities.

Operation and maintenance of the sewer system shall be in compliance with the General Requirements of Part II and the terms and conditions of Part IC., Part IE., and Part IF. of the 2023 draft Federal NPDES permit. The Permittee and co-permittees are severally liable under Part IC., Part IE., and Part IF. for their own activities and required reporting with respect to the portions of the collection system that they own or operate. They are not liable for violations of Part IC., Part IE., and Part IF. committed by others relative to the portions of the collection system owned and operated by others. Nor are they responsible for any reporting that is required of other Permittees under Part IB., Part IC., and Part ID. The responsible municipal departments are found in Appendices B and C.

Those cities listed in Appendix C are also CSO-responsible co-permittees for Part 1B., Combined Sewer Overflows (CSOs), and Part 1D, Notice of Elimination. These communities are authorized to discharge stormwater/wastewater from the CSO outfalls listed in Attachment A of the 2023 draft Federal NPDES Permit. Operation and maintenance of the CSO structures shall be in compliance with the General Requirements of Part II and the terms and conditions of Part IB. of the 2023 draft Federal NPDES permit. The Permittee and co-permittees are severally liable under Part IB., Part IE., and Part IF. for their own activities and required reporting with respect to the CSOs that they own or operate. They are not liable for violations of Part IB., Part IE., and Part IF. committed by others relative to CSOs owned and operated by others. Nor are they responsible for any reporting that is required of other Permittees under Part IB. The responsible municipal departments are found in Appendix C.

In addition, the permittee and all co-permittees are responsible for all public notifications, public health warnings and all other applicable requirements of 314 CMR 16.00 as they relate to their own collection systems including any approved CSO Notification Plans and/or SSO Notification Plans.
