SEPTEMBER 2022 KICK-OFF MEETING: A FEW HIGHLIGHTS

- 30% of ALL discarded materials in MA are from C&D activities. We dispose of ~1.6M tons of C&D annually- goal is to reduce by 260K tons by 2030.
- **Embodied Carbon** in the built environment comes from emissions from extraction, manufacturing, transportation, installation, maintenance, and disposal of materials.
- As buildings become more energy efficient, an estimated 49% of GHG emissions from buildings built between 2020-2050 will be from embodied carbon as operational emissions fall.
- Mandatory deconstruction ordinances, executive orders, incentives, plans, and advisory groups are popping up all over the US and Canada.
- What is needed to enable more reuse in this sector: understanding benefits, technologies, training opportunities, partnerships and assistance.



Solid Waste Infrastructure for Recycling Grant Program

What infrastructure activities are eligible for funding?

- The SOS 2.0 Act and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law broadly define projects that are eligible for recycling infrastructure funding.
- The EPA Administrator may provide grants to:
 - Implement the strategy developed under section 301(a)
 - Support improvements to local post-consumer materials management, including municipal recycling programs; and
 - Assist local waste management authorities in making improvements to local waste management systems.









Recycling Education and Outreach Grant Program and Model Recycling Program Toolkit

What outreach and education activities are eligible for funding?

- Public service announcements
- Door-to-Door education and outreach campaigns
- Social media and digital outreach
- Advertising campaigns
- Toolkits for municipal and/or commercial recycling programs
- Labeling/Signs
- Information on the benefits of recycling
- Business recycling outreach
- What happens after the recycling bin
- Information on the importance of quality in the recycling stream
- Other activities determined appropriate to carry out to meet the goals of the grant program







What is the Model Recycling Program Toolkit?

- A standardized set of terms and examples to describe materials that are accepted by a residential recycling program
- Information that can be widely applied across residential recycling programs
- Best practices for the collection and processing of recycled materials
- A community self-assessment guide to identify gaps in existing recycling program
- Training modules that enable States and nonprofit organizations to provide technical assistance to units of local government
- Access to consumer educational materials that states, tribes, and units of local government can adapt and use in recycling programs

- ☐ **Up to \$5,000** to for-profit and non-profit organizations, regional authorities, and eligible municipalities for short-term waste reduction projects.
- Projects need to specifically promote source reduction, reuse, or repair in Massachusetts.
 Recycling and composting initiatives are not eligible.
- MassDEP accepts applications on rolling basis, evaluates quarterly until all available funds are obligated.
- Grant funds will be distributed in one lump sum upon conclusion of your project.
