

- Governor's Transportation Bond Bill An Act Authorizing and Accelerating Transportation Investment
 - Reauthorizes and creates a half-dozen programs that support municipal investments in roads and bridges, Complete Streets and transit
 - Complete Streets (\$20 million in *new* authorization for the Complete Streets Program, originally authorized at \$50M over 5 years)
 - Municipal Small Bridges (originally authorized at \$50M over 5 years)
 - \$100 million for a new Municipal Pavement Partnership Program
 - \$50 million for a new Local Bottleneck Reduction Program
 - \$50 million for a new Transit Infrastructure Partnership Program
 - Pending legislative action

Small Bridge Grant Program



- Provides financial support to cities and towns for small bridge replacement, preservation and rehabilitation projects
- 5 year program to assist cities and towns to replace or preserve bridges on public ways with spans between 10' and 20' that are structurally deficient or load posted
- Each municipality may qualify for up to \$500,000 per year
- These small bridges are not eligible for federal aid under existing programs
- The total reimbursement is actual costs up to \$500,000. Any costs over \$500,000 are the responsibility of the municipality. This program provides for state reimbursement to municipalities of up to 100% of the total design and construction cost of eligible projects. MassDOT and each selected municipality will enter into an agreement to reimburse funds for approved projects.
- This \$50 million program provides reimbursable assistance to cities and towns over a 5 year span. The program will go from fiscal year 2017 through fiscal year 2021. Each municipality may receive up to \$500,000 per year to aid in the replacement and preservation of municipally owned bridges.

Complete Streets Grant Program

- A Complete Street is one that provides safe and accessible options for all travel modes walking, biking, transit, and motorized vehicles for people of all ages and abilities.
- Complete Streets Funding Program provides technical assistance and construction funding to eligible municipalities.
- Eligible municipalities must pass a Complete Streets Policy and develop a Prioritization Plan.
- Complete Streets improvements may be large scale, such as corridor-wide improvements
 that include a separated bicycle lane, new crosswalks and new bus stops; or a small scale
 improvement, such as a new bus shelter to encourage transit use. Other Complete Street
 project examples include improved street lighting, minor changes to traffic signal timings,
 new bicycle or pedestrian facilities, a median refuge island, or improved connection to
 transit.
- The Complete Streets Funding Program, now in its fourth year, has awarded 124 Construction grants across the Commonwealth totaling \$38 million. For Round 7, first for FY20, we are awarding 18 municipalities with grants totaling \$5.1 million. In total, 81% of applicants have been funded.





Industrial Rail Access Program (IRAP)

- The MassDOT Industrial Rail Access Program (IRAP) is a competitive grant program first created by the Massachusetts State Legislature in 2012.
- Public/private partnership that combines funding to help eligible applicants invest in industry-based freight rail infrastructure improvement projects.
- Goals of the program are to stimulate economic development, grow
 Massachusetts corporations, keep manufacturing jobs and create new jobs
 through increased efficiency, production capacity, and improved distribution
 logistics.
- Grants offered on cyclical basis, solicit new candidate projects in early November each year. Projects are expected to be completed within 2 years from start up.
- Implemented through IRAP Grant Agreements with industry rail shippers and/or freight railroads. No more than 60% of project costs are supported with state IRAP funds; at a minimum the remaining 40% of projects costs must be provided by the railroad operator and/or industry project sponsor. The maximum IRAP grant award cannot exceed \$500,000.





RTA Discretionary Grants

- MassDOT expects to award \$3.5 million in Discretionary Grants to the Regional Transit Authorities by December.
- Funds were made available in the FY20 budget and are being awarded under a competitive process.
- Applications were received from thirteen of the fifteen RTAs and collectively sought \$9,563,265.
